

PHILADELPHIA BECKONS KAPPAS TO CITY OF FUN AND "BROTHERLY LOVE"

oday, on paper, we are taking a tour of Philadelphia guided by Ruth Branning Molloy, BA-Pennsylvania, so you can know what special treats are in store for you when you attend Kappa's biennial convention in June 1986.

We shall see: the site that made national headlines in 1985 and another that caused panic in 1976 . . . exciting murals painted both by professionals and the rankest of amateurs ... carved objects that New York once owned . . . where Rocky ran, where George Washington prayed . . . where Dolley Madison lived and Jeannette MacDonald went to high school . . . where the mother of Princess Grace taught physical education ... see the sites of some of the pies Benjamin Franklin had his finger in . . . where William Penn towers over (almost) all ... the Parkway where the Beach Boys banner in July 1985 proclaimed "From Sea To Shining Sea."

You must know that the Adam's Mark Hotel is a big, well-equipped, comfortable hotel, with great convention facilities, but it is not what I think of when I think of Philadelphia ... What do you think of? The Liberty Bell . . . Yes! I will tell you that since 1976 the Bell has been living in its own structure on Independence Mall, across from Independence Hall, its former address.

As we tour the city we see that many of our West Philadelphia houses were built during the last half of the 19th century. (I live over to the right a bit, a few blocks from Woodlands mansion and Woodlands Cemetery where every year I hold my Adopt-A-Grave picnic and walkabout as a program of the University City Historical Society . . .)

We're now on the University of Pennsylvania campus ... Penn is always proud to announce that it was founded by Benjamin Franklin, our renowned citizen-actually we must share him with Boston and the rest of the world . . . He had his finger in every historical institutional pie in the city, as well as on his kite string ... I once asked a new acquaintance if he knew much about Philadelphia. He said, "Oh, yes ... the home of Benjamin Franklin and Grace Kelly!" The Princess's mother taught physical education to the girls at Penn before she was married, and her sister was Beta Alpha Chapter president-Lizanne Kelly LeVine . . . I'm pretty sure Franklin has no Kappa connection ... but who knows?

For 87 years a Kappa chapter, Beta Alpha, helped shape women's history at the University of Pennsylvania. Beta Alpha made a valuable contribution . . . we can pass by our last chapter | Fireworks explode over Art Museum.

house, an attractive small 75-year-old house in which our alumnae took much pride. Did you realize that five women who can truly be called Pennsylvanians became Kappa's Fraternity or Grand Presidents? They were Tade Hartsuff Huhns, M-Butler; Mary Dechert Griffith Canby, BA-Pennsylvania: Florence Burton Roth, BΔ-Michigan; Helena Flinn Ege, FE-Pittsburgh; and Rheva Ott Shryock, BA-Pennsylvania, the last of the "Grand" Presidents.

As we cross the bridge over the Schuylkill River, the dividing line between West Philadelphia and Center City, I want you to notice the eagles at the four corners. They were a gift from New York, taken from the demolished Penn Station . . . and if you look up the river you'll see the Philadelphia Museum of Art. Standing at the top of the inside main staircase is the statue of Diana, goddess of the hunt, which came from New York's old Madison Square Garden. In 1985 our Art Museum housed the marvelous Chagall exhibition ... at almost the same time our famous Pennsylvania Academy of the Fine Arts, the country's first such school, held a retrospective Red Grooms exhibition. Broad Street, which this building faces, is the longest straight street in the world. We have

other Firsts and Longest too but what does that matter unless excellence is also part of the picture? The first zoo, in Fairmount Park, the largest municipal park in the country, is also a first class zoo and students from all around the world come to it for study and observation . . . Fairmount Park is a beautiful and much-enjoyed park ... Music centers, Robin Hood Dell east and west are there, the Schuylkill River runs through it and there oarsmen can be seen any day almost, racing or rehearsing or re-creating themselves! The fabulous Exposition of 1876 was celebrated in Fairmount Park. On the east bank of the Schuylkill the group of Victorian buildings known as Boat House Row can be seen at night with little lights dotting the outlines of these houses. Next to the houses stands the complex known as The Water Works which is an amazing mechanism! ... later the main building became an aquarium . . . more recently it has been taken over as a project by the Junior League ... A restaurant serves lunches and teas both publicly and privately as part of the project.

As our tour goes southeast on the Parkway you can see other museums-the Rodin, the Museum of Natural History, the Franklin Institute, and I hope you notice




the little Victorian guard house that was left over from 1876 . . . If you look back you'll see again the famous front steps of the Art Museum . . . do you remember also a fine little film called "David and Lisa" in which two disturbed young people found some comfort in the same place where Rocky found renewed strength?

City Hall is the pivotal point of Broad Street. It is the building which says "I am Philadelphia" just as Independence Hall says "I belong to the country." The City Hall tower is topped by the William Penn statue ... In the center of the courtyard a painted compass points in all the recognizable directions and houses and streets are theoretically numbered from this juncture. An unwritten law dictated the height of Philadelphia buildings "no higher than Billy Penn's hat" . . . but like all laws it was subject to discussion and in 1984-85 traditionalists lost out, so plans were soon underway to build a taller building!


You will want to see Germantown and Chestnut Hill ... full of delightful buildings and historic sites ... the great northeast, the stadium, the beautiful Philadelphia suburbs where most of our alumnae live, or even the airport. There are wonderful old roads like Lancaster Pike where covered wagons left for the west and points between, where taverns sprang up, and inns, and towns along the way . . . Old streets like Second Street, full of commerce, which, going north, turned into York Road to let you know you were really on your way to New York, across New Jersey, a two nights' journey ... Second Street further south is called Two Street and is the area the Mummers call home. If you were here on New Year's Day you could watch the Mummers do their famous strut up Broad Street.

Two blocks south on Broad Street is the famous Belle-

vue-Stratford Hotel which was completely cleaned out and restored and its name changed to the Fairmont after the 1976 Legionnaires Disease and panic . . . In a few years the name became Bellevue-Stratford again. Just down the street is the Old Lady of Locust Street, the Academy of Music, which has perfect acoustics, and is home to the Philadelphia Orchestra.

Your tour will give you a sense of the flavor of Colonial history-you can choose where you want to go and what a choice! ... The imaginative restoration on the site of the Franklin house ... the portrait gallery ... the Atwater Kent Museum of Philadelphia History . . . the Maritime Museum ... the Balch Institute ... the Bourse . . . the Toy Museum ... the reproduction of the house where Jefferson wrote the Declaration of Independence, Carpenters Hall, Independence Hall, the famous old churches . . . Old Pine . . . St. Peter's . . . Christ Church where Washington worshipped ... The Friend's Meeting House ... St. Joseph's in Willing's Alley, St. Mary's where Captain John Barry, the "Father of the Navy" is buried . . . the Mikveh Israel graveyard where Rebecca Gratz lies . . . known as the prototype of Rebecca in Scott's Ivanhoe . . . Elfreth's Alley, the oldest continuously residential street in the country . . . the old hospitals ... Jefferson Hospital and Thomas Jefferson University . . . Pennsylvania Hospital, the nation's first . . . the Delaware River waterfront, with its museums, its marinas, its restaurants . . . I've left out many wonderful things, I know . . . How could I have forgotten the Mint and Betsy

Ross?
But Kappas, why don't you discover Philadelphia treasures for yourselves? When we all meet you can tell me what you found, and Philadelphia will be a city for you to remember and cherish!

THE SILENT EPIDEMIC

here is no rash. No lumps appear. You don't feel weak or sick. It's invisible and insidious, but you may be part of the **silent epidemic**, one of the 20 million Americans who suffer from a major health problem.

You may have, or be at risk for osteoporosis.

Although it is termed a silent epidemic and most of us know very little about osteoporosis, we have been hearing more about it recently in magazines and on television. Osteoporosis literally means "porous bones". It is a painful, crippling and disfiguring disease that is eight times more common in women than in men, one which contributes to approximately one and one half million fractures annually. one which may cause a loss in height and the unsightly condition known as "dowager's hump". When loss of bone density has advanced to the point where 30 to 40% of the bone mass has been lost, the vertebrae start to collapse, eventually leading to the stooped posture called "dowager's hump". Loss of height can be as much as five or eight inches. One out of every four American women is now, or will be, a victim of osteoporosis.

We usually think of bone as a lifeless, solid mass. Wrong! Healthy bone is more like swiss cheese, or a honeycomb, and is in a constant state of change—always under construction. Old bone is broken down and removed through a process known as resorption, while new bone is added. Each year, between 10 and 30% of our entire skeleton is remodeled in this way. If we think of our bone structure as resembling

swiss cheese, then osteoporosis is a degenerative condition in which the holes become larger than normal, causing the bones to become brittle and weak. This lack of bone mass or density allows fractures to occur from such simple movements as bending, lifting, or getting up from a chair or bed. We sometimes hear that, "Greataunt Susie fell and broke her hip." However, the actual fact may be that her hip fractured spontaneously, causing her to fall.

What causes osteoporosis?

There is no specific cause . . . no bacteria or virus which can be isolated and attacked with a new wonder drug., We cannot go to a doctor or laboratory to discover if we have a mild case of osteoporosis. Before it can show on a conventional x-ray, there will have been a 25% loss of bone mass, a major loss that is not reversible. Rather than talk of causes, we must think in terms of "risk factors" of two types: those we can control and those over which we have no control. To get some idea of your own risk factor... your chances for developing osteoporosis...try answering the following questions:

1. Do you have a family history of osteoporosis?

2. Are your ancestors from the British Isles, northern Europe, China or Japan?

3. Are you very fair-skinned?

4. Are you small-boned?

5. Are you over 35?

6. Have you had your ovaries removed?

7. Did you breast-feed your baby?

8. Are you allergic to milk and milk products?

9. Is your daily routine stressful?

10. Do you smoke?

protein?

11. Do you drink alcohol?

12. Do you avoid milk and cheese in your diet?

13. Do you get very little exercise?14. Do you drink a lot of soft


drinks? 15. Is your diet high in

The higher number of "yes" answers to these questions, the greater the risk of de-

veloping osteoporosis in the future. However, risk need not become reality. While there is no magic cure, there are preventive measures to avoid or retard the development of osteoporosis.

By what means do we control our risk factors? Let's go back to the basic picture of bone . . . good bone is dense bone; bone which has finer honeycombs, smaller holes in the swiss cheese. How does that happen?... through adequate intake and proper absorption of calcium in our daily diet. Bones serve as a calcium bank. A diet with an adequate daily intake of calcium enables our bones to store it and release it into the bloodstream as needed for various parts of the body. Calcium is also stored for later years when our bodies are no longer able to absorb calcium from our food as efficiently even though it is still needed for bone strength and density. As children and teenagers we absorb calcium and build our bone density to its maximum. Age 25 is generally regarded as the time of full bone growth and strength for most people. For about 15 years after that we maintain status quo. From age 35 on we absorb calcium somewhat less efficiently. From age 50 on (or at menopause) when estrogen production declines, our bones begin to weaken and become thinner as our bodies draw on the calcium in the bone bank for other needs. Since women generally live longer than men and have about 30% less bone mass to begin with, the drain on their stored calcium and consequent risk for osteoporosis is much greater.

Does the thought occur to you now that osteoporosis is not an "old folks disease" as it may have seemed to be? Is it a little scary to think that by the time you graduate from college your bone density is the best it will ever be? Your bones are going to get thinner and you're not even "over the hill" yet! Before we face that sobering thought, let's review those 15 questions and examine our risk factors.



Questions 1 through 8 are factors you cannot control. Skin color, bone structure, family history, allergies, early menopause are all genetic or medical situations for which we are not responsible. Questions 9 through 15 relate to diet and personal habits which we can control or modify. For example, a high protein diet (perhaps to lose weight) increases the excretion of calcium from the body. Stress means that less calcium is absorbed by the body. Lack of exercise, caffeine, alcohol and cigarettes are definite factors in the possible development of osteoporosis. While those of us who are fair-skinned and small-boned cannot do anything to change that, we can try to eliminate or cut down on cigarettes, alcohol, caffeine and stress and be sure we get the proper amount and kind of exercise and


Probably the major factor in taking measures to prevent the development of osteoporosis, or to retard its progress, is to include sufficient calcium in your daily diet. We never "outgrow" our need for calcium and it has been found that two out of every three women over the age of 17 don't get enough. The RDA (Recommended Daily Allowance) was set at 800 milligrams generally; 1,000 to 1500 for post-menopausal or osteoporitic women. Low calcium intake is common, especially among the elderly in the United States, with the usual daily intake at only 450 to 550 mg. Dairy foods are the best source of calcium, but many adults declare they don't like them or are wary of the added calories. However, an eight ounce glass of skimmed milk contains 296 mg of calcium and 88 calories, as opposed to whole milk with twice the calories but only 8 mg more of calcium! Low-fat vogurt is another excellent source of calcium, as are canned sardines and salmon (eaten with the bones): ovsters, fresh or canned; and leafy green vegetables such as dandelion, turnip, collard

and mustard greens, kale, and that delicious munchy, broccoli.

Proper exercise is a must for many aspects of good health and it is a definite factor in osteoporosis prevention or control. Even light to moderate exercise is beneficial, but it must be "weightbearing" exercise such as jogging, walking, biking, aerobics or jumping rope. Swimming, although good for other health problems, does not qualify here, since the water provides buoyancy and it is not, therefore, a weight-bearing exercise. NASA physicians found evidence of measurable bone loss in the first astronauts after just a short time in space due to weightlessness.

WARNING TO YOUNG WOMEN!

Excessive exercise can be harmful. Strenuous and continuing exercise such as long stints of running or practice for ballet dancing can contribute to the condition known as athletic amenorrhea in which the body ceases to produce estrogen due to the temporary cessation of menstrual periods. Since estrogen helps keep bones from dissolving and aids calcium absorption, a lack of estrogen contributes markedly to the loss of bone density and the tendency toward bone fractures. Medical records also show that young women with eating disorders such as anorexia nervosa who are also subject to amenorrhea, show larger than average incidences of bone fracture, from hairline fractures appearing on an xray, to actual breakage. The anorexic and the overly zealous athlete are both at high risk for developing osteoporosis later in life. Teenagers need more calcium than adult women - 1200 to 1500 mg daily during this peak bone-building time. Recent studies show many younger women, especially those engaged in vigorous exercise, get only 200 mg daily. Young women and their mothers are strongly encouraged to follow good nutrition guidelines for their calcium intake.

In addition, if maximum bone density is not obtained during a woman's younger years; if, in fact, she is drawing on the calcium in her bone bank because of poor eating habits and/or excessive exercise, she is adding significantly to her risk of developing osteoporosis. Rather than contributing to bankruptcy in later years, make daily deposits in your bone bank account through proper diet and a good health regimen in your teens and twenties. Like every savings account, you'll be glad of the benefits later.

One of the reasons for this article is the interest generated in osteoporosis among members of the Philadelphia Alumnae Association. One of their members has extremely brittle bones and is at great risk of spontaneous fracture. Through her, the members became more aware of the threats of the disease and also of a testing process by which they might be more informed about their own risks. Yes, we did say earlier that there are no laboratory or blood tests to detect osteoporosis itself, but there are tests to determine

bone density. A CAT scan, or single or dual photon absorptiometry test can show the relation of your bone density to that of the average for women of your age (single photon testing is cheapest and best for screening osteoporosis risk). Repeated tests may show if you are losing bone density and how fast, but these are not tests for diagnosing the disease, merely means of showing your relationship to the average. They cost upwards of \$100 and are available only in major medical centers and teaching hospitals.

One such place is The Center for the Mature Woman, a part of the Department of Obstetrics and Gynecology of The Medical College of Pennsylvania in Philadelphia. Although devoted to a comprehensive health care program for women, a major focus of the center is osteoporosis. Dorothy M. Barbo, M.D. F.A.C.O.G., the director of the center, discussed numerous aspects of osteoporosis with me and explained the work being done at the center, including the test administered to a number of Philadelphia Kappas.

The patient gives her medical history and answers questions similar to those in this article. She then confers with the nurse and a profile is drawn up of positive and negative factors, with a plus given for such things as being a non-smoker, and a minus for lack of dairy products in the daily diet. Exercise, medications taken regularly, and other factors are taken into consideration. The patient then undergoes a single photon absorptiometry test; single being the test applied to the forearm, dual to the vertebrae. It is easy, brief and safe. The machine, as shown in the photo, takes a scan of the bone on the arm opposite to your preferred hand usage. A printout is produced, which is then interpreted by Dr. Barbo and transposed to a chart which shows the patient's bone mineral content and the correlating spontaneous fracture index for her age. A report is then sent to the patient's doctor. Any woman may obtain such testing by asking her own physician where there is a medical center or teaching hospital nearby that offers such testing.

A brochure describing the services and background of The Center for The Mature Woman would seem somewhat familiar to any Kappa since it features a picture of a rose similar to that used with information about our own Rose McGill Fund, our Kappa-to-Kappa philanthropy. Dr. Barbo points out that the center pictures a mature rose, fully open and

fragrant. It was chosen to symbolize the mature woman, one who is at the most positive, happy and productive period of her life, a concept which the center fosters in its patients. Screening and identifying persons at high risk of osteoporosis is one of the center's concerns; concerns which change yearly as more is learned about the disease. She stressed the need for prevention, since osteoporosis is not curable and the only thing that can be done for it, once begun, is to arrest its progress.

Since prevention is the best medicine, Dr. Barbo also stressed the need for young women to become aware of their need for calcium and their need to ensure that excessive exercise or poor eating habits do not deprive them of the opportunity to build strong bones in their early years.

Kappas of all ages will be able to learn more about osteoporosis from Dr. Barbo at our convention in Philadelphia in June, 1986. She will speak at the Philanthropy Dinner on Sunday night and with her assistant Florence Crawford, R.N., will offer a workshop for convention-goers. Kappa's philanthropy is all forms of rehabilitation, but Dr. Barbo hopes to stress prevention, thus eliminating the need for rehabilitation, in dealing with osteoporosis.

Whether we are in that magical 20-or-under age bracket, in the holding pattern of 20 to 35 or at an age when loss of bone density is already occurring, the only magic word we can say to negate the effects of osteoporosis is calcium. A conference conducted by the National Institutes of Health in April 1984 determined that the RDA as previously established was too low. Young women should have a daily intake of 1,000 to 1500 mg of calcium as a preventive measure. Post-menopausal women should take in 1500 mg unless they are on estrogen therapy, in which case 1,000 mg is adequate. There is little risk of absorbing too much calcium unless you exceed 2500 mg daily. However, those who show a tendency toward kidney stones should consult a doctor about adding more calcium to their daily intake.

Since the basic dietary intake of calcium is too low in most women, calcium supplements may be used, and there are many tablets on the market from which to choose. But be sure to read the label carefully. Some forms of calcium are absorbed much more readily than others and the calcium combinations vary greatly in the percentage of calcium included. Calcium carbonate contains a higher percentage of calcium (40%) than calcium lactate (13%) or calcium gluconate (9%). Calcium phosphate, new on the market, is also good. "Chelated" calcium tablets provide no added advantage and are more costly. Consumer Reports, October 1984, published a chart of calcium supplements rated on a costwise basis which compared calcium content per tablet with cost per tablet. The best

source, with 200 mg per tablet and a cost of 12¢ per 1,000 mg was Tums Antacid! The best ratings among the various calcium supplements were Lederle's Caltrate 600, Miles' Biocal, Lilly's Cal-Carbonate, and Os-cal. Os-cal was the first marketed calcium supplement and remains a strong standard.

At this point in my research into osteoporosis, I began to do a little personal calculating. I am fairskinned, small-boned, of British Isles ancestry. I don't like any form of exercise, do drink some alcohol, and am 55 years old. My diet contains a fair to good supply of dairy products: I love broccoli and don't lead a very stressful life. But since American women generally don't take in enough calcium, I am probably "Annie Average". I figured I should probably take a calcium supplement of about 600 mg daily to bring the total to 1,000 mg.

Off I went to my local drugstore, where I found that label reading and comparison was time consuming but very educational. After eliminating everything on the shelf ... and there were many . . . that were not calcium carbonate combinations, I checked the number of milligrams per tablet, number of tablets per bottle, and bottle cost of each brand. I found that the store's own brand sold at \$2.99 for a bottle of 60 tablets, each containing 600 mg of calcium carbonate. Based on one tablet per day, this worked out to a daily cost of only 5¢ for a two month supply. (I even discovered a special . . . two bottles for the price of one that week!) Not much to pay for a straight back and a continuing height of 5'4".


Nashville Kappas turned out to support the event, planned by Ann Rodgers Whetsell, BO-Oklahoma, who



The Delta Sigma chapter at Oklahoma State has recently taken a new turn in its philanthropy goals, writes Sharon Brannan, ΔΣ-Oklahoma State, philanthropy chairman. "While major fundraising projects have in the past proven to be a worthwhile source of income for social agencies and organizations, they have failed to promote individual philanthropic participation. Such fundraisers as candy or raffle sales, for example, only ensure that a girl will turn in a set amount of money, and because fulltime students seldom have the time required to solicit funding, the money often comes mostly from the members themselves. Therefore, the girls not only do not devote individual time for helping people, but they also do not develop positive feelings toward philanthropy itself Our chapter has thus begun to stress member participation in activities which require only minimal amounts of time or in which individual members hold an interest." Some of these activities have been participation in a fun run and in a walk-a-thon, a can drive initiated by a fraternity, and a can drive initiated by Delta Sigma. Also, several Delta Sigma Kappas provided food and shelter last semester to victims of a sorority house fire which had been caused

by lightning. The girls had been barred from reentering their home by fire officials. "None of the forementioned activities were required, yet house member participation in the past was neither more easily tapped nor given with such positive attitudes." Delta Sigma also has two major projects-Eight years ago, the chapter adopted Esta Koeller, who is now 99 years old. In the first years, she was not living in a nursing home and the members took her shopping, to church, or brought her to the house for Monday night formal dinner. Now that she lives in a nursing home, the members visit her weekly by committees. "She feels very special that we chose her to be our 'grandma' and greatly appreciates the visits. She is a joy to us also."

The second major project of Delta Sigma has just started and is with the Campus Area and Resident Escort Service (C.A.R.E.). Each Kappa will fill one two-hour time slot serving either as a dispatcher or as an escort to walk with another person across campus. "Although the time requirement is minimal, only two hours during a semester, the effects should prove to be very substantial. First, the girls will become familiar with the escort service and will come to trust the system; therefore, they will be more likely to

use its services. Members will then pass on the importance and trustworthiness of the system to friends and acquaintances on campus, thereby adding others to the number of escort system users." Sharon writes that they have been successful in providing several small philanthropy projects of varied interest-"True philanthropic desire seems to lie in most members when we are given the opportunity to serve in our own unique way.'

The words and phrases which Kappas use may be as different as the activities which they choose for philanthropic service, but the underlying feelings remain the same—For this issue, several chapters have submitted descriptions of their philanthropy programs so that Campus Composite can present

"real motive here was to reach out to some pretty special people. Dartmouth is a place that generates a camaraderie that transcends generations." There have been special parties, but it has been the meetings arranged just between grandpas and granddaughters that have been the real success of this project. An understanding and a caring have developed that have gone far beyond their original hopes to "reach out."

Activities centered around children fill the philanthropy calendars of many chapters. **Epsilon Rho (Texas A & M)** chapter participated in the Brazos Valley Special Olympics, helping with the races for the handicapped chil-

dren. They also support year round a child they have sponsored through the Christian Children's Fund. In addition to money they send him monthly, they also write to him and have sent him a picture of the chapter.

Epsilon Epsilon chapter devotes most of its philanthropy service time to the Davidson school, a local boarding school in Atlanta for learning deficient children, who may or may not also have physical disabilities. There are about 30 fulltime students from ages five to 15. The Kappas have a pen-pal program, where they write to the students every other week. The school is within walking distance of Emory University, and the Kappas visit twice a year to play games and become better acquainted with their pen pals. Epsilon Epsilon also helps the school with their annual fundraiser, an airshow, where they work all day with the Davidson students.

The children at Upstate Medical Center are the ones who are visited by the Kappas at Syracuse, for the pledges made cookies and visited them several times throughout the year. Also, at Christmas time the Beta Tau Kappas get together with Delta Upsilon fraternity to have a party for underprivileged children. The main project which the Beta Tau Kappas have undertaken is the Dorothy Day House for battered women. They spend their year collecting and donating clothes and toiletries to them. The Kappas also got together clothes and toiletries for members of Alpha Omicron Pi when their house burned down. They also had them over for lunch several times.

Zeta Zeta, like Beta Tau and Delta Sigma, helped a victim of a fire. These Kappas at Westminster spent a day at a professor's fire-damaged house, scrubbing walls, washing smokecovered articles, painting everything from bookshelves

to a porch to one another. They had a wonderful time! To top off their philanthropic service Zeta Zeta spent an afternoon of playing basketball and other games with children from the Missouri School for the Deaf.

Delta Omicron also has a varied philanthrophy calendar from meals on wheels, which helps to feed the elderly and disabled, to a Woodward Hospital pal program that enables its residents to visit members of the Ames community and Iowa State students, and skipameals for the campus Ethiopian fund.

Epsilon Iota's spring calendar at Puget Sound was full of philanthropy projects. Eight Kappas volunteered to work each week on the teletypewriter system at the Tacoma Area Coalition of Individuals with Disabilities. The chapter also went to a convalescent home to deliver flowers on May Day and to visit the elderly living there. It was the pledges who went to the Children's Industrial Home to give an Easter egg hunt and party for the abused and abandoned boys living there. Several Epsilon Iotas helped as lifeguards and timers for the Special Olympics swim meet.

In one week last summer, three Kappas provided service that will be felt for a long, long time. Diane Mares, Jennifer Mottershaw, and Becky Murray, EП-California at Riverside, participated in the Sierra Service Project concerned with the weatherization of native American homes. Each summer, teams are formed to do various types of weatherization and home repair to make life a little nicer for those living in highly populated Indian areas. Usually, but not always, the work is done on reservations. These Kappas worked this year on the La Jolla Indian Reservation repairing an adobe house with cement mortar, replacing broken windows and screens, caulking, painting,

rebuilding porches, and insulating, among other things. The project is sponsored by the United Methodist Church, the local Tribal Council, and the youths themselves who pay for their own room and board as well as donate money for materials. "Room" consisted of a nice hard area on the floor of an old church fellowship hall, but part of the fun of the project is totally roughing it while doing so much for others, according to Diane Mares. She also writes, "all in all, I'd say that each one of us would agree that this is one of the most rewarding

experiences we have ever had—that must be why we go back year after year." (This was Diane's sixth year and Becky and Jennifer's fifth.)

Philanthropy means service, means fun, means fulfillment.

It is reaching out to help others—hand in hand—Kappas and children, Kappas and the elderly, Kappas and other women, Kappas and others in need.

Philanthropy service means feeling good!

All chapters that include service projects in their philanthropy programs know these good feelings. Many of these chapters also have fundraising projects to support the organization or facility they are serving, as well as others.

Epsilon Psi kicked off a fundraiser by participating in the University of California, Santa Barbara, "Super Saturday" last April, which is an open house carnival for incoming freshmen and their parents. The Kappas had a booth to get sponsors for their annual Bike-a-thon to benefit the American Cancer Society, which they held successfully in May. They also planned for this fall a tennis tournament to involve the entire Greek system at UCSB, with Isla Vista Youth Project as the beneficiary.

braska executed to raise funds for the Lincoln General Hospital Youth Treatment Center for chemical dependency was a "Casino Night." There was a 12-act floor show and many games were played with play money as collateral. However, the real money raised totalled \$2,400 for the Center.

Beta Zeta chapter raises money for the Iowa City Geriatrics by hosting a track meet for all the sororities and fraternities on the Iowa campus. A special get-together precedes the track meet and other fun events. This year,



some volunteer work at the Iowa City Geriatrics, and they have already helped with the Special Olympics.

Delta Omicron chapter-Iowa State has a variety of fundraisers including a car smash for Amanda the Panda's Cancer Camp for Children, participation in the all-campus American Lung Association fund drive, and winning first place with the Sigma Chis during Greek Week for community involvement, points having been tabulated for various fundraisers such as the blood drive, penny collection, and Campbell's soup labels collection.


At an ice cream social in





It is with deep regret that the Fraternity Council has accepted the surrender of the charter of Gamma Tau Chapter, North Dakota State University at Fargo, North Dakota, as of September, 1985.

Gamma Tau Chapter was founded May 3, 1929 when the petition of the local Delta Phi Beta was accepted by Kappa Kappa Gamma. Delta Phi Beta had existed as a strong local sorority for 23 years and its alumnae were initiated into Kappa in two special initiations. Many of these alumnae were daughters of Dakota pioneers. Gamma Tau chapter lists outstanding, loyal Kappas as its members for its 56 years of existence. The chapter was first housed in a room in the YWCA-YMCA Building. Then they were

in a duplex home. Finally, in 1955 a brick lodge was built, with addition and improvements made for adequate dining and living space over the years.

It is the hope of the Fraternity Council that the situation at North Dakota State University will change in the years ahead and make possible the reinstatement of the chapter at some future date.

The Western Regional Greek Conference (WRGC) is composed of IFCs and Panhellenics in the 11 most Western states and Western Canada. Over 400 delegates from these Universities attended the 1985 conference in Incline Village, Nevada at the Hyatt Lake Tahoe. Delegates heard keynote addresses by Dave Westol ("Hazing on Trial"), T. J. Schmitz ("Motivation"), and Dr. Ed King ("Old Traditions, New Directions"). Ginger Banks (International President of Alpha Omicron Pi) was the closing banquet speaker. Twenty-two workshops on various leadership topics were presented. Campus Advisers and representatives from national sororities and fraternities were invited to attend special, workshops and meetings for professionals.

1985 was the first year of a combined WRPC and WRIFC. The merger was accomplished very smoothly and works very well for the West.

Most outstanding about the 1985 WRGC was the spirit of comraderie developed amongst the delegates. In the mountain retreat atmosphere of the Hyatt Lake Tahoe, collegians from all affiliations had an opportunity to see their Greek systems objectively, to share ideas and information with other delegates and to take home the wisdom and creativity of some excellent speakers. It is the collegiates who determine the direction of our chapters' development, and their horizons are broadened by meetings like WRGC. As a professional working with the conference, I enjoyed the opportunity to meet and work with collegiates from other campuses. The theme of the 1985 WRGC, "Old Traditions. New Directions," reflects their excitement as being leaders of Greek students on their respective campuses.

SOUTHEASTERN—Jean Hess Wells ΔT-Georgia, NPC Alternate, Conference workshop leader, NPC Area Adviser.

Originating in the 1960s, the Southeastern Panhellenic Conference (SEPC) has grown steadily in numbers and importance until in 1985 approximately 600 college Panhellenic representatives from 120 campuses met at the University of Florida. Southeastern Interfraternity Conference meets at a different time and place, unlike other Regionals.

There is traditionally a large attendance of Panhellenic Advisers and NPC representatives who contribute their expertise on Greek concerns at this unique Conference. Held on the campus of one of the large universities in the area, resources of that university are used to provide pertinent program

material for ways to deal with current trends. Panhellenic representatives are given accommodations at sorority houses on campus, thus providing opportunity for idea exchanges on an individual basis.

Of vital importance at SEPC is the time set aside for NPC Area Advisers (there are eight in the Southeast) to meet with the Panhellenic representatives from each campus in her area, which permits personal relationships to be established between these participants in Greek affairs.

NORTHEASTERN—Marjorie Matson Converse, ΓΔ-Purdue, NPC Alternate, Conference Adviser, NPC Area Adviser

The Northeast Panhellenic Conference is the youngest of the conferences. NPC asked Marjorie Matson Converse to start a conference for this area. In February of 1982 the Panhellenics were invited to attend the Northeast Interfraternity Conference in Atlantic City. It was an opportune time to present the bylaws which were ratified and signed by 22 Panhellenics present. The membership has since grown to 52 Panhellenics. The NEPC is the smallest conference covering some of New York, all of New England, Eastern Canada, Pennsylvania, Delaware, New Jersey, DC and Maryland. There are 75 institutions with two or more NPC groups and 36 institutions with only one NPC group. Only three campuses have over 13 NPC groups.

This conference was founded to stimulate interest in the growth and development of women's social fraternities in the northeast U.S. and Canada. It provides the Panhellenic Councils with a communication network to bring the Panhellenics together to discuss ideas and to learn to effectively institute changes which will bring about a smooth running, well respected Greek system for women.

NEPC meets at the same time as NEIFC (Northeast Interfraternity Conference). Attendance has tripled, as more than 600 gathered in 1985, over 350 of whom were women. The program is exciting and challenging. Topics include Women as Leaders, Networking for Women, Exciting Ways to Streamline Panhellenics. Joint sessions with the men attract outstanding speakers for current trends in legal liabilities, positive social programs, and motivating the membership.

Kappa undergraduates have also provided leadership for the Conferences.

Eric Labrie, Zeta Delta, Panhellenic President at University of Vermont, served as Vice President of NEPC in 1985.

Donna Blum, Beta Tau, Panhellenic President this year at Syracuse University, is also Vice President of NEPC. Shelley Adams, Delta Omicron, Iowa State University, is Vice President of MAPCA for 1986.

Marybeth Whiteaker, Gamma Omicron, University of Wyoming Panhellenic President, comments: "In the Spring of 1985, I had the opportunity to attend my second Western Regional Greek Conference at the breathtaking site of Lake Tahoe, Nevada. I listened to the nationally-known speakers, received an awareness of the legal liabilities a Panhellenic Council may be faced with, and was able to benefit my own Panhellenic with ideas from other schools. Perhaps the most beneficial aspect of the conference was the opportunity to meet Greek leaders from the Western Regional Area.

By talking and listening to them, I was assured that our Greek system was growing, could never get weaker but could only grow stronger."

These conferences provide the learning opportunity of a Greek lifetime and fun for undergraduate and alumnae representatives alike. Kappa encourages your participation.



BELTER FURNITURE— A VICTORIAN PLUS

Lee McDonald Cassier, Pa, Ohio Wesleyan, is a good friend of the Heritage Museum. Lee has served as a member of the local masterplan committee and has helped with open houses. But it is a special friend who loans her valuable Belter furniture so that we may enjoy its grace and beauty and share it with the public. Lee came to the decision of loaning these special pieces to us after she had sold her nineteenth century home in Delaware, Ohio and rented a modern apartment. "It's a tremendous change for me." Lee said, "I'm going strictly modern, for now at least.

The first Belter patent dates back to 1858. The process involves pressing several layers of woods under pressure and heat with glues. These laminated layers provide strength. The shape of the laminated piece is that of a barrel with staves to hold the shape. After a 24 hour

'barrel" is cut into four separate pieces. Each section becomes the back of a chair or the end backs of a sofa. John Belter (an American) hired wood carvers from the Black Forest area of Germany who fashioned the beautiful rose wood roses, daisies and grapes that embellish the tops of the three chairs and two sofas that now enhance our grand parlour. Antique auction houses are informing the public that the Belter line is at a premium now. A country who once thought Victorian furniture too garish and fancy, a country who thought early American was the top style to collect, is now recognizing that there is a unique significance of our American heritage in the beautiful and valuable Belter furniture. We are lucky to have Lee's pieces in the Heritage Museum.

Son, Christian, attended Purdue, and is now a competitor of his dad's in the special order department of Brunschwig and Fils in New York City. The Cordes family spend summers in Northern New Jersey on a glacier lake, but the Loverne Christian Cordes firm is located at 60 S. Franklin Street, Chagrin Falls, Ohio. Chris feels that too much cutsie and poor traditional design is now featured in today's publications, and wonders if the public really knows what good traditional is or looks like. She received a similar write-up in Nevada State Journal, and Reno Evening Gazette when one of her paintings made the Marietta National, and has been cov-

ered by Chicago Sun Times, The Chicago Art Review, the Salt Lake Tribune, and the Boston Globe.

Ruth Anne is only beginning. A graduate of 1969, she serves on the Board of Directors for the Sierra Arts Foundation. Surrealism is a style so mysterious, so original that she has much latitute for expression. Her versatility is an attribute. When she began in the art world, she produced 424 drawings (55 plates) of Dinosaur bones for a medical book "Allosaurus fragilis: A Revised Osteology" and another il-lustrated volume, "Biological & Medical Aspects of Contraception." (Wallace & Duffy) for Harvard Medical School. She is not limited as an artist in the commercial or creative world. She puts it all together in a striking way.

Jeanne Beebe Schwab, BII-University of Washington, majored in fine arts with interior design emphasis. Her first job was as a designer for Naramore Bain Brady & Johansen, where she oversaw the building of the Swedish Hospital complex in Seattle. After four years, she started her own business, as she explains "My strong history and architecture background enabled me to contract the design for historic restoration projects of the 5th Avenue Theatre, Pantages Center for Performing Arts, and the Pasadena Playhouse." She works mainly in the greater Seattle area, adapts her planning to client's needs, does both historic and high-tech

Her Fifth Avenue Theatre designs in Seattle in 1980/81 brought her four awards from National Trust for Historic Preservation, Seattle Chapter American Institute of Architects, Washington Trust for Historic Preservation, and U.S. Department of Interior Heritage Conservation Achievement Award. Another project, Metro Operations Bases Maintenance Centers, brought an award from the Department of Transportation and National Endowment for the Arts Design Achievement Commendation.

Some of her commercial designs have been commissioned for health care facilities, including Northwest Hospital Medical Office Building, Seattle; Doctors Professional Building, Doctors Hospital, Tacoma General Hospital, all in Tacoma, Washington; Sisters of Mercy Nursing Center, Des Moines, Iowa. Earlier space designs were for Swedish Hospital and Arnold Medical Pavilion in Seattle, a Plastic Surgery Suite in Tacoma, and a Private Dermatology Clinic in Seattle. Banking facilities for which she has designed are Olympic Savings & Loan (Seattle): Kitsap County Bank with branches in Bangor, Washington, Bainbridge, and two in Port Orchard; San Juan County Bank, and National Bank of Alaska, Anchorage.

Jeanne Schwab has done 17 retail and commerical office facilities, 13 private residences, 10 space designs for businesses three of which are Wells Fargo Mortgage Company, Milwaukee Road Railroad, and American Mail Lines Computer Center. Her public assembly facilities are most impressive, and as her clients: Kirkland City Hall, Kirkland, Washington; Port of Seattle Commissioner's Chambers: Longacres Racecourse, Tukwilla, Washington; Pantages Center for Performing Arts, Tacoma; Pasadena Playhouse; Geary Theatre, San Francisco; First

United Methodist Church, Kelso; and Rennovation Study for Performing Arts. Olympia, Washington. Such services vary from space planning, lighting renovation, historic restoration, and complete structuring. In Keyport, Washington, the U.S. Navy hired her to do Submarine Base Building 105, and Emick Howard & Schwab asked for a renovation study of Los Alamitos Race Course in Buena Park, California. Restaurants and food service facilities are another of her competencies. Her studies of patron dining may result in refurbishing cafeterias or installing a Turbulator Bar, which she did for Longacres Race Course in Tukwilla.

Her firm has become so prestigious and so busy that it is hard to believe that she began by showing some of her batik artwork, was for a few months a children's painting instructor, a manufacturer's showroom representative and for three months did portraiture rendering for Walt Disney, Inc. She lives in Kirkland, Washington, with her daughter Gretchen, age 16.

Betty Margileth Diefenbach, M-Butler, expresses her art career as having persevered in art of all kinds, even crafts, all her

life. She spent a year at Academy of Fine Arts in Chicago, and in New York took courses at Traphagen, McDowell School of Design, and later at private schools in New Jersey and Vermont. Her husband, Henry Kiefenbach's business, Dempsey and Carroll, stationers and engravers, was in New York City on Madison Avenue for 34 years. She has painted as time allowed in oil, acrylic, pastel and water color. Most of her paintings are landscapes, although she takes commissions for pastels, working from snapshots. One of these is a portrait of an organist friend at the console. She finds small landscapes and flowers sell better. Her first one-man show was in Tenafly, New Jersey at a local library. 

"DID YOU KNOW YOU OWN A MANSION?"

Your mansion stands in Columbus, Ohio and is filled with memories of wealth and gaiety as well as threads of despair and turmoil. This mansion has a story of her own to tell. Built in 1851 by a wealthy merchant, she became the center of society. Serving as the Governor's mansion during the Civil War only added to her prestige. Standing four stories tall, she is topped with an elaborate belvedere while her basement served as a passageway for the underground railroad. Throughout the Victorian period she was adorned with dignitaries and powerful politicans. She was the toast of the North.

But along with the good is the bad. The Depression lashed out at her as did her country. Her 16 foot high walls were no longer filled with music and dance but became a musty refuge. She remained like this for almost two decades until, in 1951, exactly 100 years after her foundation was laid, she was purchased by Kappa Kappa Gamma Fraternity. It took years to recapture her grandeur but she now stands taller than ever and serves as the gracious home of Kappa Kappa Gamma, The Heritage Museum.

Earlier, an auditorium was added to the back portion of what is now the Museum. This space serves as our Headquarters. Your beautiful Victorian mansion has been written about in over a dozen published books and was recognized as a National Landmark by the United States Department of Interior. Regularly, docents dressed in 19th century fashion give tours of her to the public. She opens her doors to all and exemplifies the Victorian Era into which founders and their ideas were born.

The keystone to Kappa Kappa Gamma is friendship and sisterhood, and nowhere is this more clearly expressed than in our fraternity philanthropy funds and programs.

The Rose McGill Fund is Kappa sister helping Kappa sister. This year \$65,000 is budgeted for direct financial aid to members in severe fiancial crisis. Emergency Assistance Grants totalling \$22,000 will be given to undergraduate members to help them remain in school and active members of their chapters. The Circle Key Grant budget of \$8,000 will help alumnae continue their education or retrain for a new career. The Rose McGill Christmas Sharing Program will link alumnae and chapter groups with Kappas in fiancial need to help provide them with a happier Christmas. Those Kappas doing the providing also have a happier Christmas, as the Christmas Sharing program is truly as rewarding for the givers as for the receivers.

The Founders' Memorial Fund for Students' Aid has provided \$131,525 for scholarships for women, Kappas and non-Kappas, in this aca-

demic year.

How do you "sell" Kappa? Do you tell others about our outstanding scholarship and aid programs? This fall one of the best selling women's magazines had an educational supplement which listed Kappa Kappa Gamma as one of five resources for scholarship assistance for women. Does this magazine know something that you don't? You, through your Fraternity will give \$161,525 in scholarships this year alone. Local chapter and alumnae scholarship programs will boost this figure to well over \$200,000. Proudly tell others of this noteworthy achievement and proudly ask for assistance, if you need it.

Kappa also needs your help to maintain and enhance our scholarship and aid programs. The requests for assistance far outstrip our capacity to provide help. It is



the loyal support of alumnae and chapter groups and individuals that determine the extent of our assistance. Ask yourself what you, as one individual, can do to further the Fraternity's philanthropic endeavors.

- 1. Do you routinely contribute to one of Kappa's philanthropic funds to memorialize or honor a special Kappa sister? Does your Kappa group contribute regularly for this purpose?
- 2. Do you encourage your group to support Fraternity philanthropy to the best of its ability?
- 3. Do you order all of your magazines and gift subscriptions through the Rose McGill Magazine Agency? Dial 1-800-KKG-ROSE.
- 4. Have you remembered Kappa in your will?
- 5. Have you designed memorial contributions for you or your loved ones to go to a Fraternity philanthropic fund? Have you

told someone close to you about your desire to have this done?

- 6. Are you an informed and proud promoter of Kappa's philanthropy programs?
- 7. If you have a special philanthropic request or concern, have you sought further information?

One devoted Kappa has set up a special Kappa scholarship fund in her will. This will be a somewhat different scholarship (according to her wishes) and will greatly expand our scholarship program in the future. Do you have a special requirement or dream that Kappa might help you implement? Contact the Director of Philanthropies to discuss it further.

This past year Kappa was designated as the recipient of several special memorials. The newspaper obituary notices suggested memorial donations to a Kappa scholarship fund and gave the appropriate address. These thoughtful gestures generated almost \$10,000 for

scholarships. What better way to remember a loved one than by establishing a scholarship in her name?

If you have benefitted from Kappa-from friendships, from loving support, from growth opportunities, from financial assistance-have you considered "paying Kappa back?" Some give because of financial assistance they received in the past; most give because of the invaluable intangible gifts they've received from Kappa Kappa Gamma. The following letter is typical of many received.

Dear Kappa Scholarship Chairman.

I would like the enclosed check to be donated to the Kappa Scholarship Fund. I benefitted greatly from the Fund over thirteen years ago when I received \$500 toward my law school education. It is time to start repaying what I consider to be my "debt."

I have practiced law on and off for the past ten years having graduated from law school in May, 1974. I married a law school classmate in August, 1974 and we have had three children over the past ten years (hence my on and off practice of law).

I genuinely appreciate the opportunity Kappa helped me grasp and hope that future needy students can continue to benefit from Kappa's scholarship program.

Popular Ways of Giving

Gifts of Cash

Cash gifts are still the most popular way to make a charitable contribution. A check given to any of the funds represents a gift to Kappa and serves to help others. Cash gifts of all sizes are important, are recorded, and acknowledged. Many of the funds are exclusively for charitable and educational purposes and gifts are deductible by the donors in computing their taxable income.

Gifts of Securities

In the case of appreciated securities contributed to a private foundation, such as any of the ones listed except the Loyalty Fund, the amount of the contribution is fair market value on date of gift less one-half of the capital gain which would have been realized had the securities been sold.

Gifts of Life Insurance

A gift of life insurance is another unique ways to contribute to Kappa. If the policy is fully paid up, a charitable contribution is generally the replacement cost of the policy, or the cost basis, whichever is less. A policy that is not fully paid up may also be given, and a charitable contribution is allowed for approximately the cash surrender value or the cost basis if less. Ongoing premiums are tax deductible.

Gifts by Bequest

Through your will you can help insure a strong financial future for Kappa Kappa Gamma, for a charitable bequest earns tax advantages and allows you to retain full use of your gift property during your lifetime. There are several options for your consideration in providing a bequest for Kappa, among them:

- 1. A specific dollar amount
- 2. A percentage of your estate
- 3. As a residuary beneficiary

We recommend that you consult your attorney regarding the appropriate state and federal laws governing these plans for giving to Kappa Kappa Gamma and to determine the actual advantage to you. Unless you make a will, state law will decide how your assets will be distributed - such legal determination may not be as you desire, and your estate may pay maximum taxes.

Memorial and Honorary Gifts

Opportunities abound for giving in memory of a friend or loved one as well as giving in honor of someone. All gifts are carefully recorded and acknowledged appropriately. Cash gifts may be specified as to a particular scholarship or use in the Heritage Museum. For detailed needs of a specific nature please write the Heritage Museum or the director of philanthropies.

A total of \$17,000 has been given to local rehabilitation agencies by Kappa's provinces. Here are four provinces in a series of profiles.





For the present, it is up to each individual to do her best through preventive measures to avoid developing osteoporosis. The National Institutes of Health conference also stressed the need for public awareness and information. Physicians must emphasize measures that retard or halt the progress of osteoporosis before irreversible structural defects occur. There is also a great need for additional research on understanding the biology of human bone, defining individuals at special risk, and developing safe, effective, lowcost strategies for fracture prevention.


