Rush is a process through which invitations are extended to join Kappa Kappa Gamma. Through these invitations, the lives of new members are immediately linked with ours. They become representatives of the Fraternity on campus, in their communities, and in all endeavors throughout their lives.



You will make an important contribution to Kappa rush by completing a reference for potential new members.

WHY ARE REFERENCES NECESSARY? References are an integral part of membership selection. Let's look at a few reasons:

REQUIRING written information concerning individuals' qualifications is standard practice throughout today's society. References, recommendations, resumés and nominations are used by businesses, professions, educational institutions, and civic and political organizations.

SELECTION from a field of applicants is usually based on the interviewer's personal impressions combined with personal endorsements and a record of achievements, interests and skills. Even on college campuses, the trend is to increase requirements for references and interviews before a student is accepted into various honoraries, campus organizations and special programs.

Criteria for membership in Kappa Kappa Gamma are:

- Good Character
- Sound Scholarship
- Basic Congeniality

Alumnae are logical sources for notifying chapters of qualified rushees. References provide necessary achievement records and personal information. Rush parties provide an interview setting for both chapter members and rushees.

As you well remember, actives have a very short time to talk to prospective members during rush. To enable the actives to make sound decisions and to prepare for more effective and personalized rushing, they need the specific, advance reference information.

Do you know a qualified young woman enrolling in rush on a campus with a KKG chapter? Please assist the rushee, the chapter and the Fraternity by completing a reference.

Reference Instructions

The Membership Directory in this publication lists the addresses needed for submitting references.

 If the rushee and alumna completing the Membership Data Form (reference) . . .

- live in the same town with an organized alumnae group, mail the reference to: your Alumnae Membership Reference Chairman.
- organized alumnae group, mail the reference to: Active Reference Chairman's attention, CHAPTER ADDRESS LISTED IN KEY DIRECTORY
- do not live in the same town, mail the reference to: STATE REFERENCE CHAIRMAN FOR THE RUSHEE'S HOME STATE listed in THE KEY Directory. She will be responsible for securing the appropriate countersignature.

Your assistance in providing references ensures the future of our fine Fraternity.






