IN SEARCH OF MINERVA



Editor's note: Both Kappa and SAE share a symbol of their heritage—the goddess Minerva (Athena). Reflecting the true panhellenism of Greek groups, SAE willingly loaned Kappa the article and color photos used in their magazine so that we too could "go to Greece to Find the Roots of our Tradition."

Ahead of us stretches the Greek metropolis, its outlines distorted by the undulating heat waves of a July day.


We have come to Greece for a number of reasons, none of them particularly compelling, unless fascination with the Greeks and their history is reason enough. We want to meet the modern Greeks, sample their food and drink, enjoy plays and concerts and beaches and sailing. But we are here to meet the ancient Greeks, too, in the museums and the uncounted sites of antiquity on the mainland and in the islands. Nowhere in the world does the modern world live in such amiable intimacy with the ancients. Nowhere have people more pride in their heritage.


It is our heritage, too.

And no sooner have we landed at Athens than we realize that, after all, we have a very special reason for coming to Greece. In the sparkling, sundrenched mountains and valleys of this land surrounded by Homer's "wine-dark" sea, all of us can find part of the roots of our own civilization. But in a more special way it is important to tens of thousands of SAEs (and Kappas!). We must come here to search for the well-spring of our Hellenic tradition. For here dwelt our patron goddess, Minerva, and no goddess was more honored in ancient times.


She is everywhere. We find her temples and shrines all over the land. We find her in hundreds of sculptures and reliefs that are among the most precious treasures of the museums. We find her especially on the Acropolis at Athens. And Athens was her city. Here, of course, she is called Athena.

In ancient times, to be sure, Hera (or Juno) was the queen of the gods on Mt. Olympus. But Athena (or Minerva) was by all odds the most important and most powerful female

deity. The patron goddess of Athens, she was worshiped throughout Greece.

According to classical tradition she sprang from the brain of Zeus. She was born fully grown and fully clothed for war, shouting a battlecry that made the heavens ring. With Zeus she shares divine power over the thundercloud and lightning, and she wears the aegis with the head of Medusa, the Gorgon, on it. She is the goddess of war, a helmet on her head and clad in a long robe. She holds her lance and shield in one hand and a victory in the other. She rejoices in martial music and protects the warhorse and the warship. Her

power was usually employed to defend and protect her followers. She was often in conflict with the traditional god of war, Ares (Mars) but her wisdom and self-control usually won out over his impetuosity. Hence she is seen often as the goddess of victory.

Yet Minerva's power extends to the pursuits of peace as much as to the art of war. She is the goddess of wisdom, of skill, of contemplation, of spinning and weaving, of horticulture and agriculture. She is credited with the invention of the wagon, the ship, goldsmithing, statuary, shoemaking, the plow and other domestic implements. She created the olive tree, and the olive has always been sacred to her. When one realizes how important to the Greeks the olive has been throughout history, the significance of its association with Minerva is real.

The story goes that the goddess struggled with Poseidon for the possession of Athens. The gods on Olympus had decreed that Athens should be awarded to the one who produced the gift of greatest usefulness to mankind. Poseidon brought forth a horse; Minerva brought forth the olive tree, and the prize rightfully went to her.

Not only is the olive tree sacred to her. So also is the owl (associated with wisdom), the crow, the cock, and the serpent.

She aided many a greek hero—she gave the winged horse Pegasus to Bellerophon; she gave Perseus her shield and helped him behead Medusa; she helped Jason build the

great ship *Argo*, and she assisted Heracles in some of his labors.

Eternally a virgin goddess whose "heart is inaccessible to the fires of passion," she was courted by many, especially Hephaestus, but she loved wisdom and truth and Athens, not men.

That the founders chose well when they selected the goddess of wisdom as the centerpiece of their fraternal idealism is confirmed by what we see in Greece. For here one cannot escape her influence. The magnificent Parthenon, widely regarded as the most perfect structure ever built, is her temple, and in it was once a massive gold and ivory statue of her. We see other temples erected in her honor, places sacred to her memory, and everywhere, on the hills and in the valleys, groves of olive trees, some of them centuries old.

Here, just for a moment, under a brilliant blue sky, we can feel the spell of the goddess of wisdom. Here dwells our fraternal inspiration. Here, in the sandy soil of Greece, are our fraternal roots.

Kappa goes 'down under' to stand at the bottom of the world!

I was the only television reporter selected by the National Sciences Foundation in Washington D.C. to accompany the scientists to the South Pole, Antarctica, in December, 1977, for 2 weeks. December is austral summer time "down under" in Antarctica and the best time of the year to visit there, weatherwise. The sun was shining continually and it never set, so I wore special snow and sun glasses, while I was there.

The South Pole region was vast, awesome, and beautiful. Less than 2 inches of snow falls there annually, but the winds can exceed 200 miles per hour at times. It is the world's largest and driest desert.

Parts of Antarctica resemble the Moon, with mountains, rocks, and even active volcanoes. Much of the plateau there is flat and snow-covered. A few areas of cold water are inhabited by killer whales and I took a photo of one, just a few feet away, with its huge dorsal fin protruding above the ice cold water. Fish caught there have no red blood in their bodies, but instead, have a white fluid that circulates in their veins.

The penguins were friendly and beautiful in their black and white satin "tuxedoes." No other birds were sighted as the climate is too cold. I also took photos of seals and their pups "sun bathing" on the ice packs. The frozen waters of the Antarctic seas are very abundant in marine protein, the richest on earth. Shrimp—like krill are the staple diet of fish and penguins and will eventually be the diet for food hungry nations and humans everywhere.

I also explored ice caves, that were hundreds of feet underground. Penguins hatch their eggs and young on the cold rocks and snow and the young baby penguins stand or "roost" on their parents feet, to keep warm and to keep off the cold snow, while their parents stand around very erect and picturesque and stately.

I flew in a C-141 four engine military jet and departed from Point Magu, Naval Air Station, California, to Hickam Field, Hawaii, to Pago-Pago (Samoa Islands) to Christchurch, New Zealand. From New Zealand, I departed in a C-130 prop jet Hercules, equipped with skilanding gears, and we landed at McMurdo Base, our head-quarters while we were in Antarctica. I also flew in bright red colored helicopters and visited other bases maintained by other nations down there. The helicopter pilots and the C-141, and C-130 pilots, were superb, dedicated, and very proficient military airmen.

Antarctica is vast. The area is as large as Mexico and the United States combined. 13 flags from 13 nations, fly in a row, outside the South Pole Station, 90 degrees South, and each time a visitor has a photo taken at the geographical South Pole, the flags can be moved to the exact spot for "picture taking" and I am very proud to have "Old Glory," the United States flag, waving over my shoulders in my photo.

You can see the geodesic dome in the background behind the flags, where scientists stay and live the entire year long at the geographic South Pole Station, conducting experiments in biological and geological areas. Research programs also going on here include meteorology, earth tide measurements, glaciology, and biomedicine. The mean annual temperature at the South Pole (9000 foot altitude) is minus 57°F. An oil and gas well was being core drilled while I was there.

The entire trip was well-planned by the National Sciences Foundation and the Navy. Round trip was 30,000 miles over water. I enjoyed every minute of the 2 week expedition and I would not hesitate to go again. I am very, grateful to have been selected by the National Science Foundation for this once-in-a-life-time opportunity to visit Antarctica, the last Frontier.

I am a member of the unique "Society of the South Pole." My certificate is signed by C. H. Nordhill, Captain, U.S. Navy, Commander, Task Force 199, and is dated 9 December, 1977. It states in part "that Pam Olson has set foot at the Geographic South Pole, at the bottom of the world."



Kappa Loyalty Fund Report

Finding the way . . .

At the 1976 convention, an important resolution was passed that asked the Fraternity to develop a Loyalty Fund through which Kappas could voluntarily contribute to the general operation of the Fraternity. This resolution was indeed timely in these inflationary times. The world of corporate finance is a complicated one in face of today's tax laws and restrictions and no less so for the Fraternity. Years of far-sighted and prudent financial management and fund investments have provided a sound financial structure for the Fraternity. However, investment income can only be used for certain purposes such as scholarships, education, leadership training and chapter housing without being subject to tax, and the IRS has even challenged us on some of that this year. Non-taxable investment income can not be used for general operation. The day to day general operation of the Fraternity, the meat and potatoes, is dependent upon a dues and fees structure and here is where inflation has been felt the greatest. Take for example the fourth postal rate increase in a period of eight years. Increasing fees is the last thing we want and will not do as long as it is possible. The cost of a college education is staggering enough. Increased growth has helped make ends meet but does not and can not provide the quality, nor even some of the necessities, that our membership depends upon. We are dependent upon voluntary assistance.

The Loyalty Fund has made a difference. It has provided the increased scholarship money needed to provide graduate counselors for our new chapters; it has purchased audio-visual equipment for our Resource Department which serves our active and alumnae chapters; it has provided additional and more sophisticated office equipment which increases our membership services and allows for greater savings through in-house printing over jobbed-out printing; it has raised salaries of the dedicated staff at Headquarters to a more competitive job market level; it has provided improved leadership training; it has increased the excellence of The Key; the information request form on the Loyalty Fund mailing has provided the data for the career resource bank; and it has purchased a most necessary piece of equipment which will provide another savings in cost from rentals for Headquarters

needs and shipment of materials for installations and convention—a pretty blue and blue Chevy van. Yes, the Loyalty Fund has made the difference in allowing us to continue the high quality of service to our membership.

In this first year of the Loyalty Fund over 4,000 alumnae of Kappa Kappa Gamma donated over \$70,000 providing the extra margin of excellence for the quality operation of our Fraternity. On behalf of the Council, fraternity officers, and especially the undergraduates who ultimately benefit from your giving, we thank each of you!



In 108 years the basic purpose of Kappa remains unchanged—that within a close bond of friendship there will be a spirit of mutual love and helpfulness so that each member of the Fraternity can attain social, moral and intellectual excellence.





Warelands:

A sense of history came with the house

A house often takes on the personality of its owner. But the owners of "Warelands," an authentically preserved early 18th-century house set on 40 acres here (Norfolk, Mass.), say they have taken on the personality of their house.

"When we moved in five years ago, we didn't really know or care that much about early American history," recalls Margaret Liljestrand, who lives in the house with her husband James and their two small children. "But you can't look up at the ceiling at old oak beams without wondering about the people who put them there."

The historic atmosphere of the house, parts of which date back to 1733, has inspired the Liliestrands to study the life-style of early American settlers through courses offered in Sturbridge Village and, on occasion, to put them into practice.

Cooking at the fireplace

For instance, Mrs. Liljestrand recently cooked a dinner for 45 guests, using authentic early American recipes for


roast sirloin of beef and accompanying dishes—each one cooked with authentic utensils over a fire in the huge living room fireplace.

At other times the Liliestrands have made their own candles and soap; sheared wool from their sheep and prepared it for spinning; dressed in colonial costumes for gettogethers, and used a sleigh for getting about their property in the snow.

But their main concern has been to preserve the period house and its surrounding property. Their new membership in the National Registry of Historic Places will protect their house from alteration by future occupants.

Their land has been similarly protected by a recent decision from the local town council that will bar any commercial development of the property.

"We have added some of our own touches, but a house this old inevitably shows the layers of each generation that has lived here." Mrs. Liljestrand explained during our visit. In researching the history of the house, she

The "Warelands" was bequeathed to Kappa Kappa Gamma Fraternity in 1938 to be used as a second Hearthstone unit. This property, damaged by storm, was later found to be unsuitable, and was also a tremendous tax burden on the Fraternity. The 1948 Convention voted to sell it and use the proceeds to establish the Charlotte Barrell Ware Scholarship Fund for graduate study in international relations, the welfare of women, and in agriculture for both foreign and North American students.

"So 'Warelands,' is more than the cherished home of the Liljestrands, more even than a national historic place. The legacy from the sale of Charlotte's gift is a living one from a woman who pioneered in personhood." (quoted from the Albuquerque Journal written by Dorris Fish Coyne, ΔB—Duke)



determined that the first generation to occupy the house—it was owned by the Ware family from 1727 to 1915—lived in what now is the dining room and sitting room, plus two upstairs bedrooms. All of the walls in the original section are paneled in a rich dark-stained pine that the National Registry has noted as being of exceptional quality.

The next generation gave the house its current salt box design by extending the roof and adding onto the back of the house. This includes a spacious pine-paneled living room featuring a wide bay window with its original leaded diamond panes.

Then, in the early 20th century, the house took on the decided influence of Charlotte Ware, the first person to bottle certified sanitary milk in New England. She used the place for a dairy management school and bottling operation.

Floor was lowered

Mrs. Ware lowered the floor of the living room by a

Known as "The Bride of Warelands," Charlotte was herself a descendant of 18th century Plymouth Valley settlers. She was a PBK and graduated in 1885 from Boston University.

foot to accommodate her own height, adding a wing with a kitchen and dormitory rooms (currently used by the Liljestrand children), and built a bottling house.

Although the Liljestrands found the house and land "immaculate" when they moved in, they are currently involved in some restoration and are developing the land for their own purposes, mainly goat breeding and the growing of hay and apples.

The house and out-buildings are all cedar shingled and have recently been trimmed in the authentic shade of pale green commonly used in colonial times. Charlotte Ware's turkey shed has been turned into a goat shed, and the former bottling house converted into a rental cottage.

The Liljestrands, who developed an interest in rural living during duty in Africa with the Peace Corps, feel a commitment to using their land in a manner that is in keeping with its history.

Stone walls, swimming pool

This has meant learning how to repair stone walls, putting up split rail fences, putting all electric and telephone wires below ground, redeveloping the old herb and vegetable gardens, and renovating the old wells. (A modern touch crept in in 1976 when the couple installed an indoor swimming pool in an open-beamed cedar building with glass doors at one end and a cathedral window at the other!)

Mrs. Liljestrand often conducts tours of the house for interested parties and has given lectures in nearby schools on the history of the Ware family, who were important settlers in the Norfolk area.

Her research has been aided by excavations done on her property that have revealed relics dating back to 1661 when the land was first acquired by Robert Ware the Aged.

"I've had to become somewhat of a sleuth in my own home," she comments. "But it's all part of the total experience of living here."

More Women

Are Working

Kappas "Within the Law"

According to the Associated Press release on the most recent U.S. Census Bureau statistics, 48% of United States women are in the labor force. Women accounted for 57% of the increase in the total civil labor force this past year.

During this same period (1977) the proportion of men in the work force dropped from 83% to 80%. Working wives rose from 40% to 46% and female householders maintaining a family with no husband rose from 5.7 million in 1970 to 7.9 million in 1977.

There are statistics on all facets of our lives but some seemed especially significant indicating a possible trend toward a very different lifestyle for women by the 21st century.

For example, in 1977 there were 6.4 million fewer children under 14 years of age than in 1970 because of the declining birthrate. The report went on to

say young women are delaying childbearing longer now than a few years ago. The largest rate of growth was among people 25 to 34 years of age, who increased 32%.

The median age of the population increased to 29.4 years in 1977, compared to 27.9 in 1970. That means there are as many people older than 29.4 years as there are younger than that age.

The number of marriages last year, 2,176,000, was nearly double the number of divorces, 1,097,000. However, the divorce rate was up when compared to the three marriages for each divorce in 1970.

The increased longevity of life for women together with the equalization not only of women's rights but also responsibilities indicates a need for sound preparation in career choices.

Confidential law clerk Is on-the-job training

Alicia Swiatlowski, BT—Syracuse, is one of the everincreasing number of women who have chosen the field of law as a career. She feels that although job opportunities may not be very plentiful, women have advanced in the law field with the help of affirmative action programs. This alone does not guarantee a good job, and she believes that it is necessary for each woman to excel in order to meet the competition which now exists among women for the best positions.

After graduating with honors from Syracuse University College of Law in 1977, Alicia was appointed confidential law clerk to State Supreme Court Justice Richard N. Donovan, who presides at motion and trial terms throughout Central New York. She feels this has been a lucky appointment for her; not only is her work most interesting and challenging, but the job also acts like an apprenticeship in that while she is assisting with legal research, she is gaining valuable on-the-job training to prepare for a future in private practice as well. In addition, she has the chance to meet with other attorneys and to discuss pending cases. Most of these jobs last for one or two years, after which those participating usually go into their own practices in New York (since that state requires that New York Supreme Court law clerks be admitted to practice there). Alicia's tentative plans are to move to private practice sometime next year.

Though she missed the article in the November, 1977 Money, she advises budding female lawyers to aim to be in the upper quarter of their classes. She advocates being certain that law is the goal you are after, never an alternative, and working hard to achieve that goal.

Practicing attorney did not attend law school!

Nancy Blakey Seidler, E=-Calif. Northridge, has a rare story in the field of law. Although she presently is a practicing attorney in Sacramento, California, she did not attend law school. She is one of the few people who took advantage of a program offered in that state and in several others whereby a student may study in an attorney's office for four years and be eligible to take the gruelling 3-day bar exam. Nancy's supervising attorney was Peter Van Gelder, now a partner with her in their law firm in Old Sacramento. Both feel that Nancy's experience during this period of study far excels the training received from books in law school. Mr. Van Gelder feels that even he benefitted from the challenge of training her, since he renewed subjects which he long since had put aside and forgotten.


The program requires at least 18 hours a week in the office year-round, plus an examination each month. These tests are sent by the supervising attorney to the Committee of Bar Examiners. A "junior" bar exam is given at the end of the first year, which must be passed in order to qualify for the second year of the program.

The situation was particularly beneficial to Nancy and her family, because hours were flexible, and she could continue it when it was necessary for her to travel with her husband on business. Since they have a young son, it allowed her time to give to him which otherwise would not have been possible.

At first, it was difficult because there was no way in which to pace herself, Nancy recalls. In school you at least have other students to discuss things with, but in this setup you are on your own, and she and her husband both had many doubts until after she had passed the Junior bar exam. She feels that this program requires much more self-discipline than going to school; school was not difficult for her, and she studied when it was convenient. This period taught her to set a goal and develop the resources within herself to reach it. She recommended the program as a self-discipline exercise when she testified in support of the program before a committee which was in favor of discontinuing it. The bill did not pass to abolish it.

The supervising attorney must spend at least 5 hours a week with his student, and in return Nancy helped to prepare pleading, do research and virtually all else except to practice in court. She did attend court, however, as an observer, and also was allowed in chambers to hear discussions among attorneys and judges, all of which she contends was most valuable experience.

Although she is such a booster of this type of law training, Nancy states the program is little-used and may dwindle out. She says you do have to be a bit "spunky" to tackle such a training program, but feels the advantages far outweigh the disadvantages, and the challenges make

it most worthwhile. Her work now as a practicing attorney is very similar to that which she did while in training, and she feels almost as if she had already practiced before obtaining her license. Her practice is general and varied, and here again her wide background is priceless. There are always new challenges, among which are some upcoming cases with corporations, to which she looks forward in great anticipation.

Emma Fall Schofield, Ф-Boston

Emma Fall Schofield, Φ -Boston, was a lawyer, teacher and lecturer. She studied at the Sorbonne and Paris Law School and was associate justice of the First District Court of Eastern Middlesex, Malden, Massachusetts. She was the first woman in New England to sit on the bench. Her mother was another Boston Kappa, the first woman in Massachusetts to plead a case before a jury, and to argue a case before the Massachusetts Supreme Court. Emma Schofield was a trustee of Boston University, a member of numerous bar associations, and a member of the Massachusetts Electoral College in 1924.



Bertha Fain Tucker, I-DePauw

(Bertha) Fain Tucker, I-DePauw. had been elected judge of the Circuit Court of Cook County in 1953, the first woman elected to judgeship in Cook County since 1923. She built a reputation for fearlessness and fairness among the legal profession. Lawyers sang the praises of "the Lady Judge."

(Eliza) Jean Nelson Penfield, I-DePauw, had been a grand president of Kappa. She had an outstanding record as a platform speaker, parliamentarian, lawyer, and leader in the cause of voting rights for women. She had toured the west with the late Carrie Chapman Catt to work for ratification of the woman's suffrage amendment. With Mrs. Catt she helped to found the League of Women Voters.

Frances McGovern, A-Akron, attorney, legislator, was the first woman chairman of the Public Utilities Commission of Ohio. As chairman, she was a member of the governor's cabinet. She was also a member of the Advisory Council on Economic Security to the U.S. Department of Labor. She was admitted to the Ohio Bar in 1949 and was in the Ohio House of Representatives from 1955-1960, and a delegate to the



Katherine Shaw Spaht, ΔP -Mississippi and her husband. She was #1 and he was #2 in their law school graduating class.

Democratic National Convention in 1960 (on the Platform Committee). During this period she concurrently practiced law in Akron, Ohio.

Margaret McIntosh Boice, FO-Wyoming, humanitarian and civic leader, who pioneered in establishing juvenile and domestic relations courts in the state of Wyoming, was given a citation by the State Labor Council for her work on the Child Labor Amendment. Politically, Mrs. Boice fought against legalized gambling in Wyoming, helped secure the state driver's license, and headed a movement to establish the School of Nursing at the university. She was awarded the Distinguished Alumnae Award in the field of humanities and an honorary degree of doctor of laws from the University of Wyoming.

Katherine Shaw Spaht, ΔP - Mississippi, was assistant professor at the Louisiana State University School of Law, Baton Rouge. She was Kappa's City Panhellenic delegate and a member of the Delta Iota Advisory Board. Katherine's mother and father are both lawyers, as is her father-in-law who is now a judge. Shè is listed in Who's Who Among American Women. Who's Who in Louisiana. and the Order of the Coif.

Here Comes The Judge!

Susan Harrell Black, P⁴—Ohio Wesleyan, is presently Circuit Court Judge, Fourth Judicial Circuit of Florida. She is a former Duval County Court Judge, Jacksonville Assistant General Counsel, Assistant State Attorney—Fourth Judicial Circuit, and Attorney for the U.S. Government (Army Corps of Engineers).

She attended Ohio Wesleyan University and Spring Hill College and graduated from Florida State University with honors. She graduated from the University of Florida Law School.

Judge Black's activities in connection with her legal career include: assignment to the Criminal Justice committee and chairman of the Education Committee of the Conference of Circuit Judges, American Bar Association, chairman of two committees of the Florida Bar, chairman of the Courts Subcommittee of the Governor's Metropolitan Criminal Justice Advisory Council, Governor's Commission on the Status of Women and the National Task Force on Higher Education and Criminal Justice.

According to some Jacksonville Kappas, "Sue is a real great gal. Down to earth and normal. Not at all 'frightening' to talk to the Judge!" She and her husband are restoring an older home and she recently hosted the Kappa alumnae meeting there and presented a program on what, when, and how to go about restoration!

"Heart Sisters" encourage each other to be lawyers

An early interest in the field of law has finally come into fruition for Jean Yingling Teteris, BN-Ohio State, Jean's college major was French and she was awarded a Fulbright Scholarship for a year's study in France. But this was relinquished in favor of marriage in the summer of 1961. Jean became a doctor's wife and mother of two children, and considered her education over during the period from 1961 through 1971; she lived the normal comfortable life of a suburban housewife. When her children were in school full-time, law school became both appealing and accessible to her.

Jean Yingling Teteris, BN-Ohio State



Entering Ohio State University Law School in September of 1972, Jean graduated in June of 1975, later to become associated with the law firm of Porter, Stanley, Platt and Arthur (now Porter, Wright, Morris and Arthur) in Columbus, Ohio, where she has practiced law full time since. This is a large law firm, with approximately 95 lawyers, with a business-oriented clientele. Being a member of the business department, Jean works primarily with problems of corporations or small businesses. There also is a large litigation department, and she also has been involved in some trial work.

Jean feels that business law offers many varied and intriguing questions, and she finds new challenges on her desk almost every day.

She states that business law has some drawbacks for a woman, mainly in the area of client acceptance, and that it will take some time until all businessmen will accept women as legal advisors as readily as they will accept men. She does say, however, that her fellow attorneys (90% of whom are men) do not seem to have any reluctance in accepting women as co-workers; the women share equally in the work and responsibility.

Jean advises any woman who likes to read and to think and who is considering a career in law to go ahead, whether at age 20 or 35. "Somehow, things that appear almost impossible to accomplish—because of time constraints or other responsibilities—often turn out to be much less difficult than anticipated." This she already has proven to be true.

Diane MacDonald Hockman, BN—Ohio State, recently has begun a legal career in the field of administrative agency law. Employed as an attorney-examiner for the Public Utilities Commission of Ohio, Diane conducts public hearings concerning consumer complaints and other matters involving the regulation of public utilities. She also is

in the process of developing a small private practice focusing on probate work and other tax related problems.

Diane received a Dental Hygiene Certificate in 1963, a B.A. in Anthropology in 1972, and a M.S. from the School of Allied Medical Professions in 1974, all from Ohio State University. She is a recent graduate of Capital University Law School, Columbus, Ohio, and was admitted to the Bar in the spring of this year.

Prior to launching a second career in law, which she describes as merely "shifting gears", Diane was an assistant professor in the College of Dentistry, Division of Dental Hygiene, Ohio State University for thirteen years where she taught various clinical courses for dental hygiene students, coordinated the activities of the school's continuing education program and directed alumni affairs.

Claiming her Kappa affiliation to be at least partially responsible for changing professions midstream, Diane recalls that her initial interest in law grew out of the enthusiasm shown for the field by fellow lawyer Jean Teteris, her Beta Nu heart sister, also featured in this article.

Despite what appears to be a demanding schedule, Diane is quick to point out that her most enjoyable moments are spent pursuing what she considers to be worthwhile "non-academic" activities, such as active membership in Twig 53 of Children's Hospital, Sustaining Board IV of Buckeye Boys' Ranch, Women's Service Board of Hannah Neil Center for Children, Sustaining Board of the Jr. Division of the Symphony Club of Central Ohio and the Columbus Alumnae Association of KKG in which she has held various offices. She is married to a veterinarian and is the proud mother of three children: ages 11, 9, and 3.

Seattle Lawyer Enthusiastic

A new Kappa attorney eager to help others interested in this field is Jaclin Gotter Vicklund, ΔX —San Jose State, class of 1972. Following graduation she served for two years as a Registered Law Clerk, a program available only in a few states, in which study is allowed under the tutorship of a judge or attorney while working full-time as a legal assistant to the tutor. This training offers invaluable experience to the participant including calling court to order and supervising sequestered jurors.

In 1975 Jaclin entered Puget Sound School of Law in Tacoma, Washington, which did not recognize for credit her two years as a clerk. However, she did feel that she had a distinct advantage over other students with her courtroom experience and her knowledge of legel terminology. Since the school was 60 miles from her home, and since she took additional work at the University of Washington in Seattle along with some night classes at UPS, it was helpful for her to ride with a carpool with other same-year law students. They taped lectures and played them during the commute. To complete her accelerated program she studied in group sessions with these students.

While at UPS Jaclin's interest in Taxation surfaced. Graduating in 1977, she was employed as a Tax Intern for one of the largest public accounting firms internationally based, which group she will rejoin this fall as a Tax Associate. This job will include research and compliance work as well as tax planning for

individuals and corporations. During the summer she is taking evening courses in accounting while preparing for the upcoming Bar Exam.

Jaclin notes that there is a lot of interest at present in legal specialization since job market trends seem to indicate that specialists are more in demand than general practice attorneys. However, the reverse is true of small-town practice. The legal field right now is saturated in Seattle, and more and more students are turning to related fields in order to use their law degrees.

Jaclin advises Kappas thinking of law school in the future to keep a positive perspective. She has found that in any one class, some students devote their entire lives to the law library while others are too busy with outside jobs to "absorb the academic workload." She feels that while it is important to earn high grades, it is equally important to stay in touch with the legal community. Various part-time jobs are available in most areas, and she states that it is "here that the real education begins and valuable employment contacts are made. Keeping a positive outlook will help anyone to endure the miseries (and rewards) of law school."

Jaclin says that in addition to herself, UPS has three other Kappas in law school: Lori Nelson, BΠ-Washington; Joyce Yeager, ΓΓ-Whitman; and Valerie Knecht Shultz, E1-Puget Sound.





A five months' stay in the States has made me able to look at various aspects of the American way of life and to compare them with those of Japan, where I am returning this summer.

What I like most about Monmouth College is that it is a small school so that almost everyone knows each other. Since my school in Japan is one of the biggest, I don't quite feel at home there seeing a few friends and many strangers.

One difference between the schools is that Japanese colleges do not have dormitories for the students to live in. So we commute to school every day, and we spend the free time between classes mostly in our own club rooms or in

coffee shops where we can enjoy talking for hours over a cup of coffee. Also, we have only clubs and no fraternities. So, I thought it would be a nice experience for me to join one of the fraternities here. I knew being a sorority girl would let me go farther into American life, because I would be able to look at it both as an outsider and as an insider. To me, any sorority was all right as it gave me something extra to do besides studying. But through the activities in the last three months, I now realize that Kappa means more than that. I met girls of different interests who are getting unified with friendship by doing things together. The more I get involved in Kappa Kappa Gamma, the more I feel I am a link of the friendship. And another thing, being a Kappa makes me feel more at home here at Monmouth with sisters around. even though I am in a foreign country.

search, preparation of memos keeping the judge informed of issues raised in petitions for hearing before him, as well as starts of preliminary work on some of the opinions and dissents.

Grace passed the California bar and began working for Judge Francis C. Whelan, of the Federal District Court for the Central District of California, in Los Angeles. This was a one-year clerkship, keeping the judge informed of developments in cases assigned to him.

After the termination of this job in August, 1977, she went to Europe then returned to San Francisco with the law firm of Bronson, Bronson and McKinnon. While in Europe she met her husband, who is from South Africa, and they presently are living in San Francisco.

A second-year law student at Rutgers Law School, Newark, New Jersey, Nona Ostrove, ΓP —Allegheny, disagrees completely with the article in *Money*, which stated that opportunities for women in the law were lacking. She feels that the field is opening up for women, and presently is interviewing for summer jobs. She finds that she is being interviewed as a law student and not as a woman law student. She says women are being hired for all kinds of jobs from judicial clerkships to prosecutors, and that some of her friends already are being offered positions with some of the most prestigious firms in the area.

Nona's interest in the law began during her college years; in fact, it was through the interest and encouragement of several Kappa sisters that she began to take a serious look at the legal profession as a career. Two other classmates, also Kappas, also have gone on to law school, Janice Cross to Case Western Reserve Law School, and Karen Regan to Notre Dame Law School.

She notes that at Rutgers, discrimination against women is practically non-existent because there are too many women to discriminate against. Her class is 47% women, with the entering

class this year numbering 51%. Three of the deans are women, and the number of women professors is increasing, though slowly. In the area of New Jersey, the legal field has opened up dramatically during the past few years; from the law school to the profession itself, women are finding long-closed doors beginning to open. In the law school, women are serving as editors of the Law Review, and Nona is president of the Rutgers chapter of Phi Alpha Delta, national legal fraternity.

Nona has enjoyed her years at Rutgers thoroughly. She finds the law an extremely challenging and stimulating field and looks forward to her career as a lawyer.

Although Ken Sue Shear Doerfel, B⊖-Oklahoma, always had wanted to become a lawyer, this did not happen for several years after graduation in 1975 from the University of Oklahoma. Just six weeks before graduation, she met and married her husband, who is a career Army officer. His encouragement and help made it possible for her to begin law school nine years later at Oklahoma City University. She found it difficult at first to establish a good study routine after having been out of college for so long. During her first year, she commuted 180 miles a day because her husband was then stationed at Fort Leavenworth, Kansas. She later moved to Oklahoma City where, in addition to going to law school, she worked as a law clerk and managed twenty duplexes.

Following graduation in August, 1977, she took the February, 1978, bar exams for both Oklahoma and Virginia, since her husband now is stationed in this latter state.

Ken Sue's main interests are in oil and gas law and trial work. She feels that her experience quite likely will be unique because as an army wife she will be moving around every few years and practicing in various localities.

She believes that the reason *Money* listed law for women as one of the "worst" professions is that the field is desperately overcrowded; but she still thinks there is room for women law-yers, especially in one of the more "unusual" areas of the law.

Law teaches disciplined way of thought

Enid Green, $\Gamma \Upsilon$ —British Columbia, is one Kappa lawyer who does not practice law as such but uses it in her everyday business life as coowner of a Chicago real estate firm, Palmer, France, Green and King, Ltd. She is also sole proprietor of a small advertising agency known as Mediads, and is a partner in two multi-family rental developments.

Arriving in Chicago in 1967, she found she was not eligible to use her law degree there because of a restriction against aliens being admitted to the Illinois bar. This ruling later was thrown out by the U.S. Supreme Court, and Enid was admitted to the bars of both Illinois and the Federal District.

For ten years, she has been with her company, working on matters concerning multi-family developments and urban consulting. She has worked with a number of state governments on legislation and to remove restraints on housing developments, having written a book on this subject, Housing and Housing Resources. Recently she has been involved in helping people to understand the daily Federal Register regulations and to speak up against these powerful rules, which she feels often are controlled by inexperienced people in the bureaucracy. She edits Deadline in two publications, stressing these points.

Among Enid's awards are included: Ford Foundation Research Officer, 1966-67, British Institute of International and Comparative Law, London, England, and Marquis'

Who's Who in the Midwest (1978). She is a member of several housing-related groups, and has served as speaker and panelist at conventions in this field. She is a member of the Chicago Alumnae Club.

Enid has no regrets about having earned her law degree and not practicing as a lawyer. She says, "If nothing else, it teaches a disciplined way of thought and thoroughness in research."

Who Needs Insurance?

Sally and Tom are a couple in their early forties residing in a comfortable suburb. They have two teen-age children. Both Sally and Tom work full time. Tom is in management with a local firm and Sally is a dietitian. Their combined income has allowed them to move into a new house two years ago and their daughter has just enrolled at a local college.

Sally and Tom's neighbors, Alice and Jerry, are in their late twenties with three young children. Jerry is an attorney with a prominent law firm in town and Alice is a homemaker. Jerry's income almost equals that of the combined income of his neighbors.

Two couples . . . both with children . . . both within the same income bracket. Now, here's a question for you . . . out of the four people mentioned, Sally, Tom, Alice and Jerry, who needs life insurance?

Your first reaction might be Tom and Jerry. And that's true . . . they do need a certain amount of coverage. But, today, more than ever before, Sally and Alice also need life insurance protection.

Let's consider Sally's situation first. Sally is one of almost 21 million working wives (one of 14 million working mothers) in the United States today who is contributing nearly 40% to the total family income. Because of Sally's paycheck, she and Tom have been able to take vacations with the kids every year, make the move to their new home and pay for their daughter's tuition and other college expenses. All in all, because of the combined income of Sally's and Tom's paychecks, their entire style of living has been raised.

Now, just imagine what would happen to Tom and their kids if Sally were to die. Without Sally, Tom would find the lifestyle he and the kids have grown accustomed to over the last few years greatly altered. After all, almost half the total family income would be missing. Tom would be solely responsible for keeping up the mortgage payments and college expenses.

Once you get accustomed to living on two incomes, it's difficult to maintain the same lifestyle on only one. But what about Alice and Jerry's situation? Although Alice does not contribute a second paycheck to her family's income, she would still be well advised to carry life insurance.

According to a recently published figure, it would cost at least \$13,000 a year to replace the many services a wife-mother provides in the home. Cooking, cleaning, laundry, household management, child care . . . the cost of paying someone to do all this could create a heavy financial responsibility for Jerry.

These families' situations are fairly typical of many in the U.S. today. The need for life insurance . . . for a form of future financial security . . . is definitely there.

This need for life insurance increases with single mothers. Records show a rising number of situations where a woman is shouldering the financial obligations for her entire family.

There are some features to look for when considering a term life insurance plan. See if the plan is "renewable" . . . this means that the insurance can be continued at the end of the

term no matter what the state of the person's health. Look to see if the plan is "convertible" term. This gives you the option of trading your policy in for a more expensive and complicated type of insurance variously called straight life, whole life or ordinary life at a later date.

Term insurance is usually the least expensive life insurance you can invest in. The cost of this protection depends only on your age.

One of the most economical ways to purchase term life insurance is through a group. Group term life insurance is often the lowest-priced protection available. Why? Because the insurance company's administrative costs are lower and often no medical exam is required for certain amounts of coverage. No matter what type of protection you decide to buy, take the time and effort to make sure you get the most for your insurance dollar. This means you have to shop. Compare prices and benefit features.

And once you've established a life insurance program, reevaluate it regularly. Yes, inflation affects insurance just like every other item or service on the market today. What may be adequate protection today, may be inadequate tomorrow.

Insurance is a highly individual matter. So become knowledgeable about your family's finances, needs and expectations, seek out advice if you need it and then make your decisions.

Kappa recognizes the need for economical, competitive insurance plans for women. By offering you a term life insurance plan, one that guarantees every member who enrolls at least \$10,000 in coverage, and a hospital indemnity plan, Kappa is giving you the opportunity to receive excellent coverage at surprisingly low cost.

The insurance program came as a result of the following resolution from the Alumnae Resolutions Committee at the 51st Biennial Convention in 1976: BE IT RESOLVED, That Council investigate the possibility of group insurance plans for members of the Fraternity who are interested.

A committee consisting of Executive Secretary Betty Cameron, Fraternity Treasurer Jane Koke and Finance Committee member Anne Wilson was appointed to report at the January 1977 Council meeting. Considerable study was undertaken including programs offered by other fraternity and sorority groups and university alumni associations as well as the services available from a professional administrator of group insurance programs.

It was concluded that there was an important market for the sale of types of group insurance to members of fraternal organizations. An administrator of the insurance program would handle the presentation to the members and would also take care of all claims against the policies sold, while Kappa would retain control of the type sales programs to be presented to our members.

The insurance program in no way profits the Fraternity. At the same time it should be noted neither will it be an expense.

Anne Harter, BT—Syracuse, former Centennial Chairman and Director of Philanthropies, has been appointed by Council as Insurance Program Chairman. She will serve as a liaison between the Council, the membership and the insurance administrator.

Kappa Kappa Gamma selected Sentry Life Insurance Company to underwrite the insurance plans. PBA Inc., a wholly-owned subsidiary of Alexander & Alexander Inc., was chosen as the plan's administrator.

All eligible members of Kappa are invited to enroll in the plans. Your husband and dependent children may also be enrolled under the Kappa Insurance Plans.

The new plans will be offered to members in the near future. Information will be available at the 52nd Biennial Convention in June and mailings will reach members in the near future with those desiring coverage to enroll by mail.

Watch out for Kappa's golfers

To sum up over eighty years of Kappa golfers would be to say, "You've come a long way, baby!" Kappas have made a tremendous contribution to the development of ladies' professional golf as we know it today.

Kappa's first known golfer was *Johnnie Anna Carpenter*, Mu—Butler, who was the City Champion of Indianapolis in 1896 and 1897.

Patty Berg, Chi—Minnesota, is the most famous lady golfer in the world. She is a founder and first President of the Ladies' Professional Golf Association, which was formed in 1948. At that time there were only three golf tournaments and just five lady professionals playing for a total yearly purse of \$500.

Today two Kappas from Rollins College (Delta Epsilon) will compete for almost \$3.5 million in at least 38 tournaments. *Jane Blalock*, who turned Pro in 1969, has already become the 6th all-time career money winner, with just short of a half-million dollars. The other Delta Epsilon golfer is *Hollis Stacy*, who holds the record for Best Score for 72 holes (a 271). This is only Hollis' fourth year as a Pro.

Numerous Kappas have played championship Amateur golf but never turned Professional. The most outstanding is *Lucile Robinson Mann*, Gamma Theta—Drake, whose name is inscribed on thirteen state championship trophies. Lucile was twice named to the U.S. Curtis Cup team which defeated Great Britain. Two times she captured the Women's Western Amateur title, and reached the peak of her success in 1941 when she won both the Western and the Women's Trans-Mississippi Tournament. The following two years the Trans was

won by none other than Patty Berg, and Babe Zaharias. In 1975 Lucile became the first woman enshrined in The Des Moines Sunday Register's Iowa Sports Hall of Fame.

Between 1896 and 1978 Kappa Golfers have come a long way!

Patty Berg started out playing football with a neighborhood boys' team in Minneapolis named the "50th Street Tigers." Her career as a quarterback ended at fourteen by the advice of a male teammate.

"You're too short and too slow," said a twelve-year-old guard named Bud Wilkinson, who was to become an All-American at the University of Minnesota, an immortal college football coach at Oklahoma, and present Coach of the NFL St. Louis Cardinals. "You have no future in football," Bud said.

So Patty Berg went with her father and brother to the golf course. The girl who was too short and too slow for football took to the game of golf so quickly that she won, at age 20, the 1938 U.S. Women's Amateur Championship.

Because of her many Kappa friends, Patty became a wearer of the key at the University of Minnesota. Since her family lived in Minneapolis she did not live in the Kappa house. The man who has been her main teacher over the years is Lester Bolsted, golf coach at that university, whose wife is a Kappa.

After eight years of playing amateur golf Patty turned pro. In those days traveling to tournaments was done by train. The golfers stayed at downtown hotels and were driven out to the golf course. Since the total yearly purse was only \$500 then, Patty gave exhibitions and conducted golf clinics to earn a living and stay in practice. In contrast to those days, Jane Blalock said, "In 1978 our expenses on the Tour are about \$500 a week!"

In 1940 she signed to represent Wilson Sporting Goods, which makes Patty Berg Signature golf clubs. Wilson President Frank Peck said in February of this year, "Patty's line of golf clubs still outsells any we have."

In her career Patty has won 83 tournaments and was named Associated Press Woman of the Year three times. She was awarded three Vare trophies for Best Yearly Average and was the leading money winner in 1954, 55, and 57. Her best year was 1955 with #1 earnings, six tournament wins, a Vare trophy, and five major awards.

Patty Berg was chosen as an original member of the LPGA Hall of Fame. In total she has been named to nine halls of fame, the most recent the PGA (Men's) Hall of Fame.

Patty has written three books, the newest of which was published in December, 1977, by Contemporary Books, Inc. Its title is *Inside Golf for Women*.

Always active in public relations appearances for the LPGA, Patty also teaches golf in her Florida area, especially to

youngsters. She is ardent in her role as chief ambassador of women's golf with many clinics, speeches, and promotions. According to a Wilson Sporting Goods survey, she does more of that sort of thing than any other player, male or female.

Patty keeps up with many of her chapter sisters, and in her travels, meets new Kappas. "Every place I go, Kappas come up to me and introduce themselves, and I always give them the Kappa handshake," she said impishly. "Being a Kappa is the greatest! They make you feel right at home in a strange place."

Patty was presented Kappa's Alumnae Achievement Award in 1956.

When asked about women's golf in 1978, Patty said, "The equipment is better than ever and we have developed superior grass turf and how best to care for it. Through vitamins, the gals have even grown up stronger. I think today's Tour has the most talented women, the longest hitters, the best looking golfers, and the brightest future it's ever had."

Jane Blalock is a part of today's ladies' golf scene. "I was a tomboy who played all sports, and the only one in my family who plays golf," Jane told me. She was the New Hampshire and New England Junior Champion in 1963. A native of Portsmouth, N.H., she chose Rollins College in Florida for the good golf weather. She lived in the Kappa house, and because of their mischievous pranks, she and her closest Kappa buddies were known as "The Rat Pack." Even though she played more tennis than golf in college, she won the Florida Intercollegiate Championship in 1965, as a sophomore. She was the New Hampshire State Amateur Champion four times (1965-68), and in 1968 held the New England Amateur title.

After graduating from Rollins in 1967 with a B.A. in history she taught school for a year before deciding on golf as a career. She then moved to Florida, and credits Pro Bob Toski with developing her game. In particular she learned to "develop a good mental approach, and practice, practice, PRACTICE!"

Jane turned Professional in 1969 and subsequently earned the Rookie-of-the-Year Award. In 1970 and 1971 she won the LPGA Most Improved Player Award. She has won eighteen tournament titles and finishes consistently in the top ten, in her career to date. She became the fourth woman ever to go over \$100,000 in single season earnings in 1977.

Until recently only the LPGA Open Tournament was televised. In 1978 at least eight will beam from your TV set. The seventeen network cameras set up on the course do not bother Jane's game, in fact, she said, "It is exciting to have TV cameras around. The more exposure for women's golf, the better."

A typical week on the LPGA Tour begins on Monday traveling to the tournament. Tuesday is a day of practice. Wednesday is PRO-AM competition in which a number of the top 50 Pros play with six Amateurs, who usually come from the general geographic area of the tournament. Thursday through Sunday is the tournament competition. Jane thinks that Mission Hills Country Club in Palm Springs, California, is the most difficult course, and the U.S. Open Tournament—no matter where it is played. To mentally prepare herself for the course, Jane has developed a personal ten minutes of meditation before beginning play. After the tournament conclusion Sunday night Jane says she is "too keyed up to sleep." The next morning it is usually off to the next tournament!

Throughout the Tour Jane tries to keep up a normal lifestyle, and relaxes by reading, swimming, and going to the beach, which, when she is home in Florida, is right outside her door.

Her advice to young women who are interested in Pro golf as a career is:

"Definitely complete college. Give yourself time to mature and develop character. Get all the Amateur experience that you can. Too many young players get pushed too hard by their parents and burn out early. Golf requires more brainpower than other sports and I am only now (at 32 years) reaching my peak. In many other sports, I would already be 'over the hill'."

Jane and women's tennis great Billy Jean King, have formed a ladies' Pro Softball team in New Hampshire. It competes with other teams formed around the U.S. They hope it will be a successful venture. She is a representative of the Ram Golf Corporation which manufactures her Jane Blalock Signature golf clubs.

She is also an author. The Guts to Win, published by Simon & Schuster, the second book written by Jane Blalock, came out this year.

Jane first met Hollis Stacy when both were Amateur golfers. Hollis was only fourteen years old at the time. Through Jane's influence, Hollis pledged Kappa at Rollins College. They were not in the chapter together as Jane had already graduated.

Hollis Stacy is a Georgia girl from Savannah. She began playing golf at age eleven and went on to capture a record three straight U.S. Junior Girls titles in 1969, 70, and 71.

To be a professional golfer on the LPGA Tour it has been required since 1973 that you play in a Qualifying School. This past year, 93 ladies participated and only the 26 best ones were chosen. The requirements to try out are that you be a female 18 years or older, have a 3-or-better handicap, and, in addition, recognized Pros must submit letters attesting to your tournament ability.

In the July, 1974 School, Hollis Stacy qualified and became a Pro. She has not let anyone down, vaulting into the top ten players in only her fourth year on Tour.

After ten finishes in the Top 20 in 1975, and three runner-up performances in 1976, she jelled with three tournament wins and earnings near \$90,000 in 1977.

Hollis smashed Kathy Whitworth's 11-year-old record for Best 72-hole Score with a 17-under par 271. She was also named All-American Putter for 1977.

A flamboyant player bordering on recklessness at times makes Hollis a big gallery favorite. She is particularly adept at long irons and will sometimes use a one-iron to tee off.

Hollis' favorite hobby is "Indy 500" race cars in Springfield, Illinois, where she is a champion driver. She represents Wilson Sporting Goods.

In February 1978, both Jane Blalock and Hollis Stacy helped celebrate a very special occasion: a surprise 60th Birthday party for their Kappa sister, Patty Berg. The "Grand Dame" of women's golf was cheered by all current LPGA players and other tournament principals at the Orange Blossom Classic. The party was in a big tent on the lawn at St. Petersburg's Pasadena Golf Club.

"This is the most wonderful evening of my life," said the former 50th Street Tiger. "And it's the greatest surprise!"

Two golfers toted out a three-tiered birthday cake. After Patty blew out the candles, she whispered, "My wish was for world peace."

Congratulatory letters and wires were read at her birthday party, including one from former President Gerald Ford, and another from President Jimmy Carter. The LPGA gave her a solid gold Tee necklace studded with diamonds. A gift from four of the Tour players was a diamond necklace spelling out the word "SUPER," which is what they think Patty is.

When asked what she would change if she had it to do all over again, Patty said, "Not a thing. Golf has been wonderful to me. I couldn't be that lucky twice."

Kappa Kappa Gamma is indeed lucky to have Patty Berg, Jane Blalock, and Hollis Stacy on her fairway. F-O-R-E! Watch out for the Kappas!



Names in the News



Helen Wagner Willey

The first female Episcopalian priest in Oklahoma is Jane Cleveland Bloodgood, H-Wisconsin, ordained at age 78. A self-proclaimed pioneer who seeks to open doors for others rather than fame for herself, Jane has attained her goal despite protests from those who feel that women's place is not in the pulpit. Always a woman of determination and conviction, as well as one who is constantly learning, Jane proves her statement that she has never liked to sit still for long, except to read. Her triumph over the obstacles in her path toward ordination also illustrates that "Nothing is so powerful as an idea whose time has come," the title of an article about this energetic woman in The Key, spring 1975. Jane's energy and concern for others has not flagged. Her post at Trinity Episcopal Church in Tulsa will require a great deal of her, but never more than she requires of herself. Her husband, Francis, was associate rector of the same church until his death in 1961.

Jane feels that people ask a great deal of her and says, "Perhaps that is what ordination will give me, the power to do things beyond what I think I can." Actually, that is what this pioneer has been doing for many years . . . more power to her.


Being known as "Batwoman" is considered a compliment by Dr. Mary Purcell Wiedeman, BX—Kentucky. She is one of a very few researchers in the United States who has filmed the circulation patterns of live animals under a microscope, a technique known as vivo (in the living body) microscopy. She chose to film the blood vessels of bats (the basic structure is quite similar in all animals), thus earning her nickname, and at the same time opening up new vistas for her in "show biz." Some of her film footage has been used in the National Geographic special "The Incredible Machine," aired several times on t.v., as well as in Bionic Woman and the MGM movie The Demon Seed. Dr. Wiedeman is a fan of the Bionic Woman but says with a laugh, "It absolutely tickles me that after 20 years of quality research to aid my fellow man that my big exposure has come from the Bionic Woman."

Named Outstanding Faculty Woman of 1976 by the Temple University School of Medicine, Dr. Wiedeman is the author of one of the nation's most popular nursing textbooks. She is presently engaged in research on thrombosis, the cause of most heart attacks and strokes. She feels a large burden of responsibility falls on those who teach in medical schools to "... build strong self-discipline and major dedication into every one of our students." Her own lengthy list of awards, publications and honors shows that she practices what she teaches.

Helen Wagner Willey, A^a—Monmouth, better known as Nancy Hughes on television's "As The World Turns," returned to her alma mater to participate in a celebration of the college's 125th anniversary. She spoke to large audiences, describing her experiences as a singer and performer on the Broadway stage, as well as her experiences as Nancy, a role she has played since the creation of the popular soap opera. 

Kappa Trekkers

Jean Gibson Tuthill, P^Δ—Ohio Wesleyan, and Alma Mae Graves Kurtz, BM—Colorado, had never met before but became well acquainted under difficult conditions when they accompanied their husbands and eight others on a trek (that's mountain climbing) in Nepal. Their goal was Kala Phatar, at 18,267 feet, 500 feet above the base camp of Mt. Everest . . . a trek which took them two and one half weeks.

They found the people very friendly and gentle but living in very primitive conditions. They carry heavy loads of wood (a scarce item) and produce (wheat, rice, potatoes and fruit) on their heads, supported by a band across the forehead, over wide paths to the market. The stone houses are heated by the body warmth of animals kept on the lower level, while the family lives upstairs. Open fires for cooking cause smoky living conditions since there are no chimneys.


The group visited a monastery in the village of Tengboche, where a lama blessed items they gave to him by blowing on them. Buddhism is the principal religion and the people will not kill animals for food. The trekkers ate mostly dehydrated foods that they had brought with them. Jean says a convincing t.v. commercial could have been made using their youngest trekker, a boy of 18, who consumed unbelievable quantities of Captain Crunch cereal!

Despite the beautiful mountains near Denver, where Jean and Alma live, they found the peaks of Nepal truly awesome . . . eight of them are over 26,000 feet. (The one in the distance in the photo is a mere 14,000 feet.) They finally saw the peak of Everst from their vantage point at Kala Phatar and enjoyed bathing, washing hair and doing laundry in bright, clear weather but shockingly cold mountain streams. An arduous but exciting experience, the Kappa trekkers would recommend it only for the more adventuresome among us.

THE CIRCLE KEY GRANTS OF ROSE MCGILL



The Rose McGill Fund has established a limited program of financial aid, set up as the "Circle Key" grant to meet the continuing education needs of alumnae members.

This program is financed by voluntary contributions to the Rose McGill Fund by alumnae, alumnae groups, friends and the proceeds of the Magazine Agency.

The Circle Key Grant is an extension of Kappa's concern and circle of friendship for its members. It is hoped that the recipients of these grants will continue the circle of aid for other members by contributing to the program when circumstances enable them to do so.

Specifically, the Circle Key Grants are (1) for an alumna needing education assistance; (2) awarded on the basis of need, merit and individual goals; (3) granted any time of year, as longs as funds are available; (4) for study at a college, university, career, vocational or technical school, for the purpose of aiding career qualifications; (5) for varying amounts, depending on need and educational cost, but not to exceed \$500.00 for any one grant; (6) for alumnae in good standing, regardless of age. These grants are NOT intended to help a graduate BEGIN a study on a masters program.

Application forms are available from Mrs. Walter M. Keith, 405 W. Vermont St., Urbana, IL 61801, and should be returned to her. She will handle all correspondence, make tentative judgment on acceptance, the amount to be given, and then review the application with the Rose McGill chairman prior to the actual decision.

This program in Philanthropic aid is another step forward in Kappa's ever-widening vision of the future. Kappas in personal and financial distress have the love and loyalty of Kappa to give them encouragement and aid in their pursuit of a new life. It is hoped that this alumna scholarship program will create greater awareness of the shared experience of Rose McGill. Let the Circle Key Grants speak for all of us.



Carmel Area Club sadly reports the death of two members, both 100-plus years old! Della Brooks Walker van Loben Sels, X-Minnesota, attended meetings until a few years before her death last winter, just a month after her 100th birthday. A seasoned traveler and an enthusiastic painter, she lived in Piedmont, CA. for more than 40 years. Georgianna Carden, ПA-Berkeley, was a teacher who became interested in the plight of the children of migrant workers. Even after her retirement at age 80, she often travelled 15 miles by bus to visit field workers near Salinas to see if they were being treated properly. Miss Carden attended alumnae meetings into her early nineties and died at the age of 104. Carmel area Kappas miss both of these devoted members.

New Scholarship to Honor Memory of Former President Ruth Kadel Seacrest

On February 25, 1978, Ruth Kadel Seacrest passed away. She was 81. It is with great respect and sincere sympathy to her family that *The Key* pays honor to her memory.

Ruth became the 25th president of Kappa Kappa Gamma on June 25, 1944 when she was named by the Council to fill that position. Because of World War II, conventions were banned and the Fraternity Council met with the Associate Council and chairmen at the Broadmoor Hotel in Colorado Springs, Colorado, to transact the business of the Fraternity. Under the provisions of the Fraternity constitution it was necessary for the Council to appoint persons to the offices of those whose term was ending. The post of president was one of these.

To quote from the October, 1944 issue of the *The Key*, she was "no novice in fraternity lore." She was president of her chapter, Sigma—Nebraska in 1922, during her junior year. As an alumna she served as chapter adviser, and president of the Lincoln, Nebraska Alumane Association; was the first Kappa president of the newly formed Lincoln City Panhellenic; and was president of Zeta Province. In 1938 she was named Fraternity scholarship chairman. She went from that post to director of chapter programs, a position which she held from 1940 to 1944, when she was named president.

The Key stated, "Slender, gracious, animated, Ruth Seacrest brings all the essential qualities of leadership to her new task." It went on to point out that Kappa was not the only organization to benefit from her abilities. She was a member of Mortar Board at the University of Nebraska, and was the first honorary member of Kosmet, men's dramatic society. She was president of Lincoln Junior League and director of Region VII of the Association of Junior Leagues of America. Active in war work, she served as chairman of the Civil Defense Committee in Lincoln. She was listed in the first edition of Who's Who Among American Women.

Ruth was married to Joe Winger Seacrest, Dartmouth Phi Delta Theta, in June, 1922, at the end of her junior year in college, and they went to live in Denver. Both were Nebraska natives. They lived in Denver for five years before moving back to Lincoln, where Joe became publisher of the *Nebraska State Journal*. The couple had two sons, Joseph Rushton Seacrest and James Claggett Seacrest.

With the war over in 1945, the 75th General Convention was held in June, 1946, at the Grand Hotel on Mackinac Island in Michigan and Ruth was elected to serve a second term as president of the Fraternity.

A high point during the Seacrest presidency was the installation of six chapters: Delta Omicron at Iowa State College, Delta Pi at Tulsa University, Delta Rho at the University of Mississippi, Delta Sigma at Oklahoma A & M, Delta Tau at the University of Southern California, and Delta Upsilon at the University of Georgia (where our current Fraternity president Jean Hess Wells was a charter member). Also during her second term, the first Foreign Fellowship Program was developed, the first Alumnae Achievement Awards were presented, and the whole Fraternity finance system was studied.

Her son Joe Seacrest wrote that, "Ruth liked people and activity and the Kappa Kappa Gamma Sorority was people oriented and active in women's development. I am sure she received from Kappa equal to that which she contributed back to Kappa Kappa Gamma. Her health problems commenced around 1960 requiring frequent hospitalization over the last ten years. She had been in the Madonna Nursing Home for approximately twenty months. The week she died, she was asking her nurse about the need of the French children, which had been one of the World War II programs sponsored with assistance by Kappa Kappa Gamma."

Ruth Seacrest is survived by her husband, two sons, six grandchildren, and two great-grandchildren. A Seacrest memorial fund has been established with contributions from her many friends enabling the Fraternity to award scholarships to members of Sigma Chapter. The Lincoln Alumnae Association will act as the agent.

IRS Gives Food For Thought

The Internal Revenue Code lists over 20 categories of exempt organizations. By far the most common are those qualifying under Section 501(c)(3) of the Code as religious, charitable, or education organizations.

Other important categories, however, are civic and social welfare organizations, exempt under Section 501(c) (4) and recreational and social organizations, exempt under (c) (7).

Except for churches and organizations whose gross receipts are normally not more than \$5,000 annually (other than private foundations), organizations cannot be treated as tax exempt under the law unless they make application with the Internal Revenue Service and receive a favorable ruling. The "Application for Recognition of Exemption," Form 1023 or 1024, required information on the purposes and proposed activities of the organizations, as well as certain documents and financial data.

Donations to certain exempt organizations, generally those qualifying under Section 501(c)(3), are deductible as charitable contributions on the Federal income tax return of the donor. Such organizations are listed in Publication 78, "Cumulative List of Organizations," which provides advance assurance of deductibility to prospective donors.

An organization exempt under a subsection of the Code other than (c)(3) may establish a charitable fund to which contributions are deductible. Such a fund must itself meet the requirements of Section 501(c)(3) and the related notice requirements of Section 508(a).

In the (c) (4) category, contributions to volunteer fire companies and similar organizations are deductible, but only if made exclusively for public purposes.

Contributions to social and recreation clubs and organizations, exempt under (c) (7) are not deductible.

In many instances, organizations apply for a group exemption letter, which covers numerous subordinate groups within a larger organizational grouping. To do this the central organization must submit certain information on behalf of the subordinates to be included in the group exemption letter.

In addition to the application procedure, most organizations wishing to maintain an exempt status are required by law to provide certain financial and other information to the IRS on Form 990, "Return of Organization Exempt From Income Tax."

Many organizations which are otherwise tax exempt may be liable for tax as a result of carrying on a trade or business which is substantially unrelated to their exempt purposes. Examples of income which could be taxable to an exempt organization include profit from a manufacturing operation, retail sales, and proceeds from regularly scheduled gaming operations.

The law also specifies activities which are excluded from the definition of unrelated trade or business. Briefly, these include activities in which substantially all the work is performed without compensation, activities carried on primarily for the convenience of its members, and the selling of merchandise which had been donated to the organization.

Exempt organizations are subject to IRS examination procedures to determine compliance with tax laws affecting their activities and financial operations.

Further information and assistance on exempt organizations matters is available from local IRS offices. The IRS also offers the free pamphlets, "How to Apply for Recognition of Exemption for an Organization," Publication 557, and "Tax on Unrelated Business Income of Exempt Organizations," Publication 598.

Questions and Answers on Exemption of Civic, Social and Recreational Organizations

Civic, social and recreational non-profit organizations have certain responsibilities relating to their tax-exempt status. The following questions, with answers, cover some of the major points.

- Q: Our growing community organized its first volunteer fire company. What must we do to be sure it will be considered tax exempt?
- A: The organization must file an "Application for Recognition of Exemption," Form 1024, with the District Director of the key district for your location. The IRS can tell you which district is your key district. It will issue a ruling or determination letter after it has reviewed your application.
- Q: If a civic, social or recreational organization is tax exempt, does it have to file a tax return?
- A: Yes. Most exempt organizations must annually file the information return, Form 990, "Return of Organization Exempt from Tax." An exception to this rule is churches. Organizations also must notify their key district when any material changes in their operation takes place.
- Q: Are exempt organizations audited?
- A: Yes. The IRS examines organizations with the most apparent need for review to determine compliance with the tax laws affecting their activities and financial operations. As with individual taxpayers, there are appeals procedures for resolving disputed issues.
- Q: How can our organization get more information?
- A: By checking with the IRS and requesting its free Publication 557, "How to Apply for Recognition of Exemption for an Organization."

Three hundred members of Mu Chapter, Butler, from 14 states and 35 communities in Indiana took a chance on the weather and came to celebrate the centennial. Even though three inches of new snow had fallen in Indianapolis, the surroundings appeared bright and fresh on March 4th and 5th, and the house was bursting with cordial greetings as long-time friends arrived for the morning coffee and reunions. Many had not been there since the wing added in 1965-66 had doubled its original size. Celebrates Centennial

and families. Many Kappa visitors returned to the house for another get together.

Any birthday is a time for reflection, and a centennial is no exception! Kappa is the first women's fraternity at Butler to celebrate one hundred years of continuous existence. The midcentury came in the 1920s, a decade that was to see a change in Butler University and Mu Chapter. In 1928 Butler built a new campus and moved from the comfortable traditional neighborhood of Irvington to the new unchartered acres of Fairview. The Mu Chapter Foundation was incorporated and the red brick Tudor style house was built by 1930. However ties with the first fifty years were carried over to the new era. The badge of Jeanette Teeter (Ritter) became the chapter president's key in 1925. The highest ranking scholar wears the key of another founder, Louise Landers. The key of Cora Smith, 1879, is worn by the "True Blue" junior and the marshal wears the key of Frances Frazee Hamilton, 1882. To honor Jennie Armstrong Howe, 1886, the house board purchased a special key which is worn by the first vice president. Mrs. Hamilton was the first president of the House Association in 1921, and Mrs. Howe was the wife of Thomas Carr Howe, president of Butler from 1906 until 1920. Tade Hartsuff (Kuhns) was the seventh Mu initiate in 1879 and became the first president of Kappa Fraternity in 1881. She was a frequent visitor as her travels brought her to Indianapolis from time to time, and her hostess was Elizabeth Bogert Schofield.

And so Mu Chapter felt the influence of two Fraternity presidents, the first and the twenty-second. Beth Bogert Schofield was the first Mu chapter adviser, and the first Fraternity finance chairman. She was president of Mu Chapter Foundation for 25 years. In 1938 she became director of provinces and in 1940-1944 she was president of the Fraternity. She also served as Fraternity ritualist and attended 25 conventions.

This fraternity involvement was bound to "rub off" on the members, and Mu Chapter has always been well represented in Fraternity conventions and honors. There have been 13 province officers from the Mu ranks. For Delta province: the first in 1915, Beth Schofield, then Edith Hendren Maddock, Gem Craig Reasoner (Mu affiliate), Betty Miller Brown (Muir), Margaret Barker Richardson, Liz Search Stone, Caroline Godley O'Dell, Joan Herrin Hancock, and Jill Cox Campbell. These have served in other provinces: Lambda, Florence Moffett Milford (Hahn), Alice Phillips Scheleen; Epsilon, Cynthia Springer Harbold; and Eta, Alice Jones Gerhart.

One national convention was held in Indianapolis in 1892 with Kate Hadley, Mu, as marshal. Mu has hosted province meetings in 1924, 1947, 1959, 1973, and looks forward to 1987! (A long time span from the founding date of January 2, 1878!)

Perhaps Dr. Stewart's response when he accepted the University gift from Mu chapter sums up the centennial;

"A hundred years is a long time for an organization to remain vital and active—almost as long as the 123 years that Butler has been in existence. I don't know how the University got along without you for the first 23 years; but I do know how it has gotten along with you for the past 100—beautifully. On behalf of the University, I want to express deep appreciation for the many contributions you have made to life on the campus through the past century, and best wishes for your continued strength and vigor."

P.S. April 8, 1978, Kappa received first place in the campus Spring Sing for the fourth consecutive year!

Former Rehabilitation Scholar Returns to Say "Thank You!"

"You'll never guess who is with me. She wants to speak with you." It was the voice of a much revered Kappa—Gladys Houx Rusk, ⊖—Missouri, a judge for scholarships in Kappa's Rehabilitation Program.

"Could it be Chung-Hi?"

"Yes," Gladys replied. "Howard and I just returned to New York. Imagine our surprise to find Chung-Hi taking part in a special seminar."

"Hello, sister," Chung-Hi joined in. "I came from Seoul (Korea) on my own!"

"That's wonderful but what a big expense for you!"

"I saved over a year to buy ticket myself. Kappa has done so much for me, and I wanted to attend the seminar." Pride was evident in her voice. "My round trip ticket cost \$1570.00."

As Chung-Hi talked on about the wonderful seminar, I thought of a chill November day many years ago, when Chung-Hi first arrived in New York. As she descended the plane steps, wearing a short-sleeved one-piece dress, and no coat, I saw she had a tiny purse clutched in her little bare hand.

In November 1955, Dr. Chung Hi Oh arrived in the United States to take up a grant sponsored jointly by Kappa and the American Korean Foundation to study at the Institute of Physical Medicine and Rehabilitation under Dr. Rusk. This plucky and resourceful Korean doctor and mother of two young boys endeared herself to many Kappas during her 18 months stay in this country. She was a guest of the 1956 Convention at Swampscott, Massachusetts, and visited Kappas and alumnae groups the breadth of the country on her way home at the conclusion of her studies. Dr. Oh returned to Korea as its only woman doctor in the field of physical rehabilitation. (Fall 1977, *The Key*, History Part II)

Kappa's Ruth Armstrong Harris, Π^Δ-California, director of philanthropies 1954-58, had phoned me from San Francisco the day before. Ruth was crying.

"Chung-Hi is here after three seasick weeks on the ship. Since it is Sunday she arrived when there were no stores open. I could not get her a coat, and no time to call friends for help. Her plane connection was tight. I walked with her to the plane steps and luckily saw the stewardess, explained and asked her to get Chung-Hi a blanket at once. Still holding tight to my hand, Chung-Hi said "Mrs. Harris, I never have been in a plane. Please say the Lord's Prayer for me."

Thus into many Kappa lives and memories came a frail young woman, who under study programs directed by Dr. Howard A. Rusk was to become a rehabilitation doctor, a director and founder of programs in her home country, and widely sought for her experience and knowledge.

Nor is that all of her contribution.

Her two baby sons, left in her mother's care, follow in Chung-Hi's footsteps.

"Eldest son orthopedic surgeon, finished his two years' service with the army. Youngest son is a resident interne in cardiac medicine."

A week or so after this conversation, I received a note from Los Angeles where she had stopped over to see her brothers.

"Here photograph of my first grandchild, Yoo Kyung, taken at her first birthday celebration. This a traditional ceremony."

Fascinating to look at little Yoo Kyung's picture and wonderful to think what her life can be, with such a fine background.

Kappa Dollars Advance Education

Since the founding in 1870, Kappa Kappa Gamma has contributed almost two million dollars toward advancement of higher education for women in the United States, Canada and overseas. During the past two years the Kappa Kappa Gamma Students' Aid program provided \$160,000 in scholarship aid to qualified women graduates and undergraduates, members and non members in various fields of study. Through the Kappa Kappa Gamma Rehabilitation Services, alumnae and undergraduate members have contributed over 100,000 hours of service and more than \$200,000 in gifts and aid to local rehabilitation projects, including the Institute of Rehabilitative Medicine in New York City.

Changes made in Province Officer nominating procedure

In response to resolutions from the province meetings and because of expressed dissatisfaction with our present system, the Council has modified the structure of the nominating procedures for province officers within the framework of our Fraternity Bylaws, as follows:

- Council shall appoint a province nominating chairman for each province. These appointments shall be made for a term of two years at the June Council session prior to Associate Council Seminar through the office of the Fraternity vice president.
- A province nominating chairman may not serve two successive terms.
- 3. The province nominating chairmen shall serve under the direction of the Fraternity nominating chairman.
- The province nominating chairman shall be the guest of the province with expenses paid from the PM budget.
- 5. Province officers may apply for Fraternity aid in financing the transportation costs of the nominating chairman to Province Meeting if those costs are deemed by Council to be beyond the means of province funding, the amount of aid to be decided by Council upon the advice of the Fraternity treasurer.

DUTIES

The duties of the province nominating chairman shall be:

- To solicit, collect, and process recommendations on a regular and continual basis for province and Fraternity offices; to write to each chapter and alumnae group in her province, at least semi-annually, explaining the procedure, enclosing recommendation forms for their use, and calling their attention to the recommendation form for all member use which shall be published annually in the winter issue of THE KEY.
- To follow up on all suggestions and recommendations in order to gather complete information and representative opinions regarding the qualifications and experience of those submitted.
- 3. To forward these recommendations as they are received to the Fraternity nominating chairman, retaining a copy of each recommendation. The Fraternity nominating chairman, in turn, shall forward province recommendations she receives to the appropriate province nominating chairman for her files.
- 4. To obtain the consent of those recommended and to send, one month prior to province meeting, to all delegates, to the province officers, to the member of Council assigned to serve as the adviser to the Nominating Committee, and to the Fraternity nominating chairman, an announcement identifying those who have been recommended, including a fair and complete profile of the qualifications and experience of each.

To preside over the Nominating Committee. She shall have no vote.

ADVANTAGES

- This procedure makes the system more democratic by ensuring the independence of the nominating chairman.
- It puts emphasis on the importance of the job. The chairman will serve as a continually functioning head of a vital educative and information gathering operation. This system provides an on-going procedure for identifying officer potential on both Fraternity and province levels.
- 3. These changes provide more consistent and parallel nominating procedures at all levels of the Fraternity.
- This system gives the delegates prior knowledge of the identity and qualifications of those recommended for office.
- This system will act as a grass roots funnel of information and a support system to the Fraternity nominating procedure.
- It emphasizes membership responsibility in the officer selection process and affords any member of the Fraternity an opportunity to recognize good leadership on a continuing basis.
