Influence Kappa's Tradition of Leadership™ by recommending the most qualified candidates for the Fraternity Council and Regional Director positions. Complete the following form and mail it to MARILYN NICHOLS BULLOCK, Kansas State, Nominating Chairman, 4833 Rockridge Court, Manhattan, KS 66503, postmarked by February 15, 2010.

Who is elected at the General Convention?

The eight members of the Fraternity Council, the seven Regional Directors of Alumnae and the seven Regional Directors of Chapters will be elected by the delegates to the General Convention in Phoenix, Ariz., June 23-27, 2010.

Who may recommend a candidate?

Any Kappa may recommend a candidate. Suggestions also are solicited from chapters and alumnae associations. Interested individuals are encouraged to submit their names to the Nominating Committee.

What are the required qualifications for a candidate?

Any alumna in good standing who has served the Fraternity within the past 10 years as a member of the Fraternity, Regional or Associate Council, chairman of a Fraternity Standing or Special Committee, Fraternity Council Assistant, Leadership Consultant or member of the Foundation Board of Trustees.

What qualities are important?

The candidate must have proven leadership ability and strong managerial, communication and analytical skills. She should be mature, a good team player, self-motivated and able to relate well to others. She should be a role model—someone who will represent the Fraternity well.

What is the term of office?

Fraternity Council members and Regional Directors are elected by a majority vote to a two-year term at each General Convention. No one may hold the same position for more than two terms.

Responsibilities of the Fraternity Council Members

The members of the Fraternity Council are responsible for the management and administration of the Fraternity. They set policy, determine the direction of the Fraternity, deal with Greek-related issues, have jurisdiction over all cases of loss of membership and reinstatement, appoint alumnae to serve on committees, supervise the work assigned to those committees, interpret the Fraternity *Bylaws* and *Standing Rules*, work closely with the Kappa Kappa Gamma Foundation, and report to the General Convention all action taken by the Council.

Fraternity Council Positions

President: Presides over all meetings of the Fraternity and the Council, supervises Fraternity operations and administration, oversees relations with colleges and universities, presides at the Installation of new chapters, is an *ex officio* member of all committees except Nominating, and appoints individuals to vacancies with the approval of the Council.

Vice President: Presides in the absence of the President, assists the President in all ways, oversees all publications and implementation of Fraternity public relations projects.

Treasurer: Reviews the Fraternity's financial operation, develops a fiscal plan for the future, oversees all areas of Fraternity finance, directs the work of the Finance Committee, prepares the budget, serves as Treasurer of the Kappa Kappa Gamma Foundation, and reports to the Council and the General Convention.

Director of Alumnae: Supervises the organization and administration of alumnae associations, participates in the alumnae association extension program, and directs the work of Fraternity volunteers involved with the development and management of alumnae associations.

Director of Chapters: Supervises the organization and administration of all collegiate chapters, is responsible for the annual review of chapter management and needs, and directs the work of the Fraternity volunteers involved with the development and management of chapters.

Director of Membership: Directs the program and selection of new members, is responsible for membership policies and procedures, and assists in the annual review of chapter needs.

Director of Programs and Education: Supervises the development and implementation of educational programs for collegiate and alumna members and oversees the Fraternity philanthropy program. Performs such duties as the Fraternity President and Fraternity Council shall assign.

Director of Standards: Is responsible for Fraternity standards as outlined in the Fraternity *Standing Rules*, as well as policies and procedures, works with the chapter Standards Committees, and participates in the annual review of chapter needs.

Responsibilities of Regional Directors

Regional Directors of Alumnae and Regional Directors of Chapters oversee the work of the Province Directors of Alumnae and Province Directors of Chapters. Regional Directors confer with the Fraternity Council regarding the effective operation of the regions and the business of the Fraternity. They make recommendations to the Fraternity Council and Associate Council for the

functioning of the alumnae associations and chapters within their regions. They are responsible for program development, implementation of policies and procedures and training.

2008 - 2009 Highlights

- Leadership Academy, an educational leadership training program, was attended by 229 collegians and alumnae in the fall of 2008. Thirty-five program staff assisted with the implementation of this program at a new host site at Heartland Conference and Retreat Center in Marengo, Ohio. New curriculum was introduced this year from Jim Kouzes' and Barry Posner's Leadership Is Everyone's Business.
- ❖ The Kappa Trainer program consists of 60 trained facilitators who provided training to 63 chapters, alumnae associations and LEAD Seminars, touching more than 4,500 members.
- ❖ The Foundation provided funding for the development of the Kappa Learning Institute and the customized course: Kappa 101.
- We partnered with the Kappa Kappa Gamma Fraternity to purchase e-learning templates used to create interactive e-learning courses.
- ❖ The Foundation provided funding for the development of Kappa Kappa Gamma's first webinar series, which is free to all members. Visit www.kappa. org to register for one or more of these online events.
- Scholarships totaling \$569,469 were awarded to 101undergraduate and 38 graduate students.
- Rose McGill assistance, totaling \$262,356, helped 95 members on an ongoing basis. Ten collegians each received \$1,000 in emergency assistance. Thirteen alumnae received Circle Key Grants for continuing education.
- A total of 60 chapters contributed \$65,406 to the Foundation.
- A total of 131 alumnae associations made contributions to the Foundation totaling \$118,239.18.
- At the Tribute Table during Leadership Academy 2008, Kappas donated more than \$10,000.
- Corporate matching gifts were made by 20 companies.
- Members purchased 5,604 magazine subscriptions from the Rose McGill Magazine Agency, which gave \$6,584 to the Rose McGill Fund.

- Nearly 850 visitors toured The Heritage Museum in Columbus, Ohio, which is on the national Register of Historic Places.
- The Stewart House in Monmouth, Ill., which is on the national Register of Historic Places, had more than 1,100 visitors.
- ❖ To honor Kappa's earliest days on the Monmouth, Ill., campus, two historical markers were placed in Monmouth, Ill.
- ★ We added 45 new bricks to the Marjorie Moree Keith, *Kansas State*, Memorial Garden Patio at The Stewart House, once the home of a Kappa founder.
- Forty Kappas became Friends of the Museums.
- A rare 19th-century, glass-plate negative of the "Kappa Bridge"—the only image known to exist—was donated to The Stewart House Museum by George Morris of Monmouth, Ill.
- Total assets surpassed \$28 million as of June 30, 2009
- The Kappa Kappa Gamma Foundation operates with 47 volunteers and five staff members.


Foundation Finance

The Kappa Kappa Gamma Foundation has been strategically planning for the future. Investment and spending strategies provide for the support of our operations and programs in the best of times, and in the more difficult of times. During the 2008-2009 fiscal year, the Kappa Kappa Gamma Foundation felt the impact of the slowdown in the domestic economy and the decline in the financial markets.

What is critically important to us is that the commitment of our donors has not waivered. Your dedication to investing in every Kappa remains strong. However, donations were negatively impacted by the decline in the economy. Unrestricted and temporarily restricted gifts and bequests declined by 10.5 percent. Yet, the need for the support provided by the Foundation in terms of scholarships and financial aid substantially

increased during the last fiscal year. In a year when the global stock markets declined, approximately 31.3 percent of the Kappa Kappa Gamma Foundation portfolio loss represented 20.4 percent of net investments.

To preserve the ability to fund the programs of the Kappa Kappa Gamma Foundation, the Foundation investment strategy is reviewed annually. The policy addresses investment asset allocation and spending rate. An investment committee comprised of members who have investment expertise reviews portfolio performance quarterly with our investment consultant. The committee focuses on achieving strong long-term investment performance, diversification of portfolio investments and manager style differentiation.



The Foundation retains Graystone Consulting as our investment consultant. The role of the investment consultant is to monitor the various fund managers with whom the Foundation has investments. Based on portfolio performance, fund managers may be changed from time to time. The investment consultant also provides asset allocation planning advice to meet overall Foundation objectives.

The investment strategy of the Kappa Kappa Gamma Foundation is to emphasize total return—that is, the aggregate return from capital appreciation, dividend and interest income. The primary objective in the investment management of fund assets shall be the preservation of purchasing power after spending. The secondary objective in the investment management of fund assets shall be the long-term growth of capital while avoiding risk.

Our strategic focus remains on the programs of the Foundation and the development of resources to support those programs. While challenged by these difficult economic times, the Kappa Kappa Gamma Foundation remains determined to emerge from the current downturn fiscally strong and financially sound. Our long-term strategy will enable us to continue to support educational programs and to provide the financial assistance that is critical to our members.

Shedding Lite

How Leadership Academy to Lead a Healthier Lifestyle

Shortly before attending Kappa
Kappa Gamma's Leadership
Academy in 2008, I discovered
that my cholesterol was high.
This, combined with me being
overweight—something I have
struggled with most of my
life—made me realize I needed to
make changes. But I decided my
diet would start after Leadership
Academy because that meant I could
put it off for another few weeks.

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Inspired Me

I didn't know what to expect from Leadership Academy, but when I arrived I was assigned to the Blue Group, which was made up of amazing collegiate and alumna members who brought joy to my life. During this educational weekend, I decided that my primary goal for the future was to lead a healthier lifestyle. The women in Blue Group said they would help keep me accountable. So I returned home, wrote out a plan and began my healthier lifestyle.

While some days were better than others, I lost 50 pounds in eight months. My cholesterol went down, and I was exercising regularly. Taking what I learned at Leadership Academy, I decided to "Model the Way" and "Inspire a Shared Vision" by starting a blog—www.sheddinglite.blogspot.com—where I post healthy recipes and my exercise regimen with the hope of helping others lead a healthier lifestyle too.

Leadership Academy also promotes "Challenging the Process"—which I applied to my life by challenging the way I thought about food and the way I planned my days. In addition to my blog, I told everyone about my plan. I figured if I was honest with myself and those around me, people would support me and help me reach my goals.

For me, diet and exercise are always a struggle, but I'm working my plan and I am determined to see this through—one meal at a time, one day



- ▶ Drink more water!
- ► Eat five or more servings of fruits or veggies per day.
- Eat/drink at least two servings of dairy per day.
- ► Eat at least two servings of lean protein per day.
- ► Have two servings of healthy oils (can be used in cooking) per day.
- ► Eat whole grains whenever possible.
- ► Take a daily multivitamin (and fish oil, calcium and vitamin E if your doctor approves).
- ► Eat what you like—Finding a few things that you really like that are also healthy, will help you stick to your plan.
- ▶ Plan ahead to avoid the drive-thru—Once a week, cook several healthy dishes and stock the freezer with pre-portioned meals.
- Make your plate pretty—If you like how your food looks, you're more likely to enjoy it!
- Treat yourself! Otherwise, you'll feel like you are doing something you can't maintain. If you crave a piece of chocolate, have some now and then.

Exercise Tips that Work for Megan:

- ➤ Start small—A 10-minute abs class offered at my workplace was perfect to get me going.
- Try new things—There are so many exercise classes you can try. See what you like best and what will keep you motivated. If you force yourself to do exercise you dislike, you will be less likely to continue.
- Exercise with a friend—Ask someone to work out with you and hold you accountable. You are more likely to keep your commitment if you know someone is waiting for you at the gym.

at a time. I tell myself "everything in moderation, including moderation," meaning that if I continually deprive myself, I'll be tempted to binge. I don't diet on holidays, but I try to eat a little less.

My best advice is to keep a positive attitude and find someone to hold you accountable to your goal. Make a plan and write it down. Make eating and exercising fun, and celebrate small wins. I learned at Leadership Academy to tackle any challenge one small step at a time, and I apply this to all areas of my life now.

Additionally, when I came back from Leadership Academy, I realized I wanted to be more involved with Kappa. As a former chapter adviser, I had recently moved to a new city and wanted to continue giving back to Kappa, so I submitted a Volunteer Interest Form (at www.kappa.org). Shortly after, I was asked to be the Province Director of Chapters for Nu West Province.

I enjoy being a PDC, and I promote Leadership Academy among the chapters I work with; and I try to meet with former L.A. participants to see how they are using their enhanced leadership skills on their campus and in their chapter.

The women I met in Blue Group have made a lasting impression, and we continue to encourage one another via e-mail. There were 16 of us including our

group leader. Ten are actives who went on to hold the following chapter officer positions: Two are President, one is Treasurer, one is Risk Management Chairman/ House Chairman, one is Registrar, one is Marshal, and one is Philanthropy Chairman. And, one has traveled to Nicaragua and another to Australia. Of the six alumnae in our group, one is now President of her alumnae association, and two of us are PDCs. We represent a range of ages and life experiences, yet we've come together and inspired one another.

After my life-changing experience at Leadership Academy, I returned this past September as a Facilitator in Training. We observed different facilitators and their leadership styles in a supportive atmosphere in which we could fine-tune our skills. I appreciated the F.I.T. experience to learn more about facilitating a group; it's one way that our organization truly supports learning and helping women develop leadership skills.

I am grateful to Leadership Academy for motivating me to be a better person and leader, and I am healthier and happier because of this experience. I am more involved and able to give back to a wonderful organization, and I have made friends who hold me accountable and who are leading the way in their communities, as well.

One of Megan's Favorite Low-Fat Recipes:

"Bourbon" Chicken

2 lbs. chicken (suggestion: boneless skinless chicken thighs)

1 tbsp. olive oil

1 garlic clove

1/4 tsp. ginger (ground)

3/4 tsp. red pepper flakes

1/4 cup unsweetened applesauce

1/3 cup light brown sugar (suggestion: Splenda brown sugar)

2 tbsp. ketchup

1 tbsp. cider vinegar

1/2 cup water

1/3 cup soy sauce

Heat oil in large skillet. Add chicken pieces and cook until lightly browned. Remove chicken. Add remaining ingredients, heating over medium heat until well mixed and dissolved. Add chicken back in and bring to a hard boil. Reduce heat and simmer for 20 minutes. Serve over hot brown rice or other grain.

Sisterhood Turns Into Support When Tragedy Strikes

From our earliest days in Kappa—even during Recruitment—we learn about helping others through philanthropic efforts. And we learn that Kappas help each other with scholarships, financial aid and simply as women supporting women. Through the Rose McGill Fund, we help members with short- or long-term financial aid and emotional support.

But when one young woman pledged at OMEGA CHAPTER, *Kansas*, she wasn't thinking about that. She just felt that Kappa was "a perfect fit" and today that original feeling is even stronger.

LYNN WILLIAMSON BROWN, *Kansas*, went to college on a golf scholarship. Following the path of her sister who had pledged at the University of Missouri, Lynn found that Kappa was a great way to make a big university seem smaller. She was a pre-pharmacy student, feeling that it was an area where there would always be a need and she could find a good job. After graduation, Lynn moved to San Francisco, living near her sister, but later returned to Kansas City and found a pharmacy position.

While in college, Lynn met Jason, her future husband. He was a football star in high school and continued in college, aiming for a spot in professional football. "I kept running into him, but there was no interest on my part," she says. But after Lynn returned to Kansas City, they began dating. Lynn found Jason to be smart, well traveled and fun to be with.

A few months into their relationship, Jason's new job brought a transfer to Austin, Texas. Lynn eventually moved to Austin and found a great job. Jason, however, was not as pleased with his job and football was no longer an outlet for him. A college knee injury led to seven surgeries and, despite great hopes each time, he had chronic pain. The need for pain pills became an addiction, along with alcohol.

The couple went through several breakups, but eventually married. Shortly after their daughter,

Marli, was born, Lynn endured three surgeries for melanoma. She was given a prescription for pain pills and Jason stole them. Other health issues in their extended family led to more tension. Despite their problems, Lynn says Jason had "a huge heart, like a giant teddy bear and he could always make me laugh, even at some of my angriest moments."

But the problems grew worse, and more dangerous. Despite having two previous DUI events, Jason continued to drive while impaired and use poor judgment regarding his family's safety. Lynn asked him to leave, insisting that he go to rehab or she would file for divorce. His parents supported her decision. Lynn then found a receipt for a drug that Jason was not supposed to be taking. She texted him that she had found the receipt and had filed for divorce.

Jason drove straight home and learned that his visitation rights with Marli would not begin until he had been sober and clean for 60 days. Then the unthinkable happened. Jason went up to their bedroom and shot himself in the head. Lynn called 9-1-1, but Jason died in her arms.

Lynn knew he had guns in the house; he had always had them. She thought they were in the basement, still packed from their move. The gun was actually in their bedroom closet.

Blaming herself, Lynn couldn't sleep for weeks. Despite some medication, she had flashbacks. For three months she shook so badly she could barely sign her name. And for a couple of weeks, Marli woke up screaming, "NO!"

Lynn's boss was helpful, putting her on a leave of absence for a while. Finally she realized she had to get up and about and earn some money. She worked part time so that she could be with Marli as much as possible. She lost one job when her hours were cut and that ended her health insurance. Life was bleak. Her car broke down and something always went wrong.

A friend, Jenna Brady Joplin, Kansas, suggested Lynn apply for Rose McGill aid and Lynn says this saved her. It was her only income at one point and she is most grateful for it. In addition, she and Marli were thrilled to become part of the Holiday Sharing Program. The Richardson-Plano (Texas) Alumnae Association sent encouraging cards and never forgot a birthday or holiday. Lynn says the group was led by Kim McAuliff Martin, Nebraska, and her family got involved, with her daughters sending stuffed animals, bracelets and necklaces they picked out for Marli for Valentine's Day and other occasions.

Holiday Sharing participants provide a list of things they need and when Lynn suggested a gift card to help in buying a mattress for a "big girl bed" for Marli, they received "the most adorable princess bed and mattress, sheets, bedspread and pillow to go with it." Lynn's reaction: "How touching and unbelievable was that! They made Marli's dream come true. I can never repay Kim's kindness," Lynn says, adding that alumnae in Denver, Boston, Detroit-North Woodward and the Golden Key group sent a spread, sheets and clothes for her, books, stickers, animals and dolls for Marli. "You name it; we got it!" Lynn marvels.

The first year after Jason's death was spent getting through shock and post-traumatic stress disorder. The past year has shifted toward grief and "down" times, including the two-year anniversary in August. Despite Jason's problems, Lynn says he was "a great guy and dad," but couldn't conquer his addictions.

Lynn has had a full-time job since April and did not reapply for Rose McGill aid. "With a full-time job, a 3-year-old, trying to figure out child care, etc., my time is very limited now, but it is more important to me than ever to be a part of Kappa in as many ways as I can in the future.

"I realize how the Kappa family has gone well beyond the college years and helped me during the worst time in my life. I value Kappa even more as I realize that some friends have become lifelong friends," Lynn says. "I would love someday to be on the other end financially and to give more to alumna life and Rose McGill and also be involved with the Holiday Sharing Program to help someone else out."

Lynn's thoughts are similar to those of others who have been helped by the Rose McGill Fund. From a small amount of financial aid for one member of Beta Psi Chapter, Toronto, in 1922, has come a growing and ongoing facet of the Kappa Kappa Gamma Foundation. From times of sudden distress to situations of overall economic downturn, donations to the fund provide financial relief. The work of Kappas who raise funds, find holiday gifts and offer emotional support provides the sense of family that is so much a part of Kappa Kappa Gamma.

Holiday Sharing Program Lifts Spirits During the Holidays and Year-Round

'hat do two Kappa sisters in California and Oregon share as a special Kappa project, along with alumnae in Colorado, with Kappa chapters in New York and Texas, and with small or large alumnae associations in Michigan, New Jersey and Florida? They all participate in the Kappa Kappa Gamma Foundation's annual Rose McGill Holiday Sharing Program.

Each holiday season brings requests from Kappas all over the continent who find, as the holiday season approaches, that holiday giving is beyond their current financial and/or physical abilities. The reasons for such distressed circumstances are as varied as the wish lists the Holiday Sharing Co-Chairmen receive each fall season. The stories are always deeply emotional and poignant. It is significant that our requests for the wishes of other members of a family are more numerous than requests for personal items. It was a marvelous testimony to Kappa's philanthropic spirit when, during the General Convention last June, an anonymous recipient of many years ago, came forward to discuss her experience as a Holiday Sharing recipient when her young family experienced severe financial difficulties.

The members of the 1964 SOUTH BEND-MISHAWAKA (IND.) ALUMNAE ASSOCIATION initiated the first known Holiday Sharing project when they "adopted" a Rose McGill recipient in need of special cheer during the holiday season. The recipient and her family received gifts from a wish list that were bought, wrapped and delivered by the area alumnae. The project attracted the interest of other Kappa associations, and, in 1975, a Holiday Sharing assistant was officially designated as an integral part of the Fraternity's overall philanthropy plan.

During the past 39 years, our scope of Holiday Sharing has expanded to include more than 100 chapters, alumnae associations and individual Kappas. Every wish list received from recipients identified by local alumnae or from individuals is matched with alumna volunteers in other geographic areas in order to provide anonymity to our recipients.

A majority of our recipients receive most or all the items they wish to receive. Gifts range from bedroom slippers, sweaters, toys, books and newspaper subscriptions, to baby equipment, car tires, a washing machine or furniture. In 2009, more than \$17,000 in goods was gifted through our Holiday Sharing Program.

In 2000, the Holiday Sharing program expanded into a second phase, inviting Kappas everywhere, as well as associations and chapters, to develop

relationships with Rose McGill Aid recipients throughout the year, giving friendship and emotional support by remembering these sisters with special occasion cards, little gifts and personal notes.

Alumnae Association Lends a Helping Hand

Long before Halloween or Thanksgiving, the members of the Charlotte Alumnae Association are thinking about the holiday season, and a Kappa who might need their help over the holidays.

When members mail in their dues, they tack on a few extra dollars for the Holiday Sharing program, through which the group assists a struggling sister—typically one who is far away and remains anonymous.

"Our membership is always very generous where holiday sharing is concerned," says treasurer Andrea Baca, *New Mexico*. "It has become a favorite tradition of ours."

The donations range from \$5 to \$55, and even at the height of last year's recession the Kappas collected more than \$800 for Holiday Sharing—well over the \$250 guideline set by the Foundation. Over the years, many of the Holiday Sharing recipients have been elderly Kappas, but last year the group was especially moved by a request from a Kappa in her 40s, who suffers from bipolar disorder.

"Kappas of all ages and walks of life need help occasionally," says **DIANE ALTHOUSE**, *Babson*, who organized Charlotte's 2008 Holiday Sharing effort. Four Kappas did the shopping, buying almost everything on the recipient's request list. They also tucked in a few department store gift cards, and the alumna book club added some gently-used selections from their past year's reading list. Then several members helped to wrap the items up in festive holiday paper and mailed them directly to the recipient.

"We love giving back through Holiday Sharing," says association President KATIE RUSSELL, Furman. "It's really a very easy way that we can make a big difference in a sister's life."

The Kappa Kappa Gamma Foundation of Canada is incorporated and registered with Canada Revenue Agency (www.carc.gc.ca/charities).



Our Scholarships Change Lives

Q&A with surgeon and Foundation scholarship recipient **RACHEL IDOWU**, UC Berkeley

Q: What did your Kappa Kappa Gamma scholarship mean to you?

A: As a premedical student in a competitive science department, our rigorous program often caused us to be more aware of areas where we may have "fallen short" in comparison to our peers. It seemed as though there was always someone studying longer hours or who was just that much closer to a 4.0 than me. Such comparisons often kept me from acknowledging those qualities and passions I possessed that were valuable contributions to my academic and social communities. When I applied for the Kappa Kappa Gamma Foundation scholarship, it gave me an opportunity to reflect on my passions and then to articulate how those passions informed the contribution I wished to make in the world.

Receiving the scholarship felt like a validation of my professional goals. The award also encouraged me to push harder in a tough academic climate because it felt as though an organization whose ideals and praise I respected, Kappa Kappa Gamma, recognized and appreciated my efforts.

Q: What influence has Kappa had on your life?

A: Kappa has promoted leadership and professional ideals, which I aspire to emulate as I make my way through each stage of my career. Refining and shaping us into confident, articulate leaders was a clear commitment of our chapter advisers. Through my chapter positions, I started on a lifetime journey of serving as a leader who sees and listens to people, rather than being preoccupied solely with my predetermined ideas of what I want to accomplish.

Q: How did receiving a scholarship influence your feelings about charitable giving?

A: I now recognize two important things about charitable giving: first, alumna giving contributes to an organization's efforts to further its mission—in this case, to build and shape a future generation of young, female leaders who embody Kappa ideals and values; second, the scholarship provides a young Kappa with recognition that helps her feel proud of the work she has accomplished, and encourages her to invest her time and energy toward her chapter's success.

Q: Why should every Kappa support the Foundation?

A: Every dollar you give to invest in a Kappa contributes to her future as a leader in her community and workplace. It has the immediate impact of demonstrating to new members and active members that alumnae recognize that being a Kappa is a lifetime privilege and responsibility. 

Line of Day Planners Created to Simplify a Mom's Busy Life

nce a successful ad executive and business woman heading a family business, and now a busy mother of four trying to organize her own hectic days, NINA PIZZUTI RESTIERI, Colgate, has designed a line of home organizers, called momAgenda. The concept was born as she pondered why there were hundreds of options for brides to choose from when planning their weddings, but no options for mothers to plan their everyday lives. These unique agendas are crammed with basic information, such as online resources and toll-free numbers for a variety of sources, pages for party and vacation planning, and space to list all the activities of each family member.

When the first run of products, created after a year of research, sold out within three days at 120 stores, Nina knew she had struck a chord with busy women all over the country. Since its beginning in 2005, momAgenda has grown to include day planners, (myAgenda, momAgenda and Personal Portfolio) home organizers (Kitchen Folio, School Years, Wall Calendar) and helpful pads (Weekly Menu/Grocery Pad, Permission Slip, Honey Do List and Babysitter Info.) The collection is sold at leading national retailers and boutiques throughout the country and has been featured on the *Today Show*, in *Real Simple Magazine* and *People Magazine*.

After Nina graduated from Colgate, where she was a charter member of **Zeta Rho** chapter, she began working in advertising where she honed her advertising skills. She later went to work for the direct marketing company founded by her mother. Nina gave birth to her first child just five weeks before her mother's untimely death at age 48. With no one else to step in, Nina returned to the business just days after her mother's funeral to serve as president. After two years of long hours and travel, Nina could no longer bear to be away from her family and decided to sell the business.

Having three more children in six years, Nina became a stay-at-home mom with a busy schedule of playgroups and preschool. Although she knew this time with her young children was priceless, she vowed to only take on a job that would allow her to make being a mom her first priority. MomAgenda was born and Nina gets immense joy out of helping the pieces of everyone's personal puzzle—family, career, home and social life—come together.

Fabric Collages Capture Scenes from the Colorado Rockies

Artist's Latest Work Inspired by Sister Helped by Rose McGill

nternationally recognized textile artist PATTY CLARK HAWKINS, LSU, creates fabric hangings and quilts whose colors and subjects are inspired by the Colorado scenes around her: Aspen trees, rock outcrops and Rocky Mountain peaks.

Patty began this artistic journey somewhat late in life. She had been an elementary education major, although she loved art classes. Deciding she wanted to be an artist, Patty struggled for 15 years with watercolor, which taught her a lot about color and composition. Then, one day in 1985, she saw a Smithsonian traveling exhibition at the Denver Art Museum, with "art quilts" hanging high above the floor. "I was speechless," she says. "I realized that, knowing how to sew, thanks to my Kappa mother, I could make art quilts, and I have been consumed and passionate about creating (them) ever since."

Patty dyes her own silk-screened fabrics creating striking abstract markings by using bubble wrap, corrugated cardboard and non-skid rubber rug mats. She also uses an ancient Japanese pole wrapped dying technique, *shibori*, (like paper scrunched on a soda straw) to transform her fabrics into her iconic three-dimensional images of Aspens.

Patty's work has been seen in exhibitions and on HGTV's program, *Simply Quilts*. In 2007, she was

awarded the "Quilt Japan Prize," which allowed her to travel to Japan to teach Japanese quilters. She is a member of the national Studio Art Quilt Association and teaches at conferences around the country.

Patty's latest work, titled "Survivor," depicts a misshapen and wounded Aspen tree. Halfway through finishing this quilt, Patty says "it became profound that this quilt was also about my sister, PRISCILLA CLARK Rose, Colorado State, a recent recipient of the Rose McGill Fund. Priscilla lost her hearing 10 years ago due to meningitis and later developed diabetes, which put her in a nursing home. Priscilla received gift boxes through Holiday Sharing from three alumnae associations, and just raves about "my Kappas," says Patty. She says Priscilla was so joyful and tearful. "It means so much to my sister that there are people who know and care about her, beyond her immediate family." Patty is thankful to The Key for the Rose McGill article in the January 2009 issue, knowing first hand how much the Rose McGill Fund does for Kappas in need.

So it is understandable that a seven-foot-tall wall hanging titled "Survivor" has special meaning for this talented Kappa. More of her works can be seen at www.pattyhawkins.com.

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
