Each one is pledged because she meets our high standards of Kappa membership selection and possesses the ethical values we seek in new members.



As Kappas we can take pride in the fact that we have been inclusive in our policies of membership selection since our founding in 1870. Only gender has made our Fraternity exclusive. Congress has allowed single sex fraternities by adopting the Bayh Amendment which amended Title IX to exempt college fraternities and sororities from the statutory prohibitions against discrimination upon the basis of gender.

Happiness grows from a harmonious adjustment to life within the conditions imposed upon it by society. College imposes a drastically changed set of conditions upon the life of a student; membership in a chapter of Kappa Kappa Gamma can offer valuable assistance in making a harmonious adjustment and in finding happiness.

This is indeed the "age of the offered hand," of broadening one's horizons by affirming each person's dignity. The college experience gives our members the opportunity of doing just that. Higher education is incomplete if there is no real achievement in understanding and appreciating the differences in people. Differences do not threaten common bonds; they can be a means of strengthening and enriching them.

Making friends and being in a friendly environment are very important not only for social adjustment, but also are important for academic success on the campus. As all members of Kappa Kappa Gamma look ahead to the selection of pledges next year, alumnae and collegians alike will continue to live up to the values and ideals of our ritual, and enjoy the time when "the colors of Kappa" shine even brighter on our college campuses and in today's society! Help Available to Chapters in Collecting Outstanding Bills

Accounts receivable are a great burden to a growing number of chapters. Therefore the Council has entered into an agreement with Trans-World System, Inc., to assist in collecting outstanding bills.

This is an option available to each chapter at its discretion. The money collected is remitted to the chapter, not to the Fraternity.

The Council selected Trans-World System, Inc., after long consideration, for its manner, style, thoroughness, and national reputation. Information will be sent to chapters and Advisory Boards further explaining this service which is now available.

Financial responsibility is a standard for Kappa membership. All bills must be paid, even if the member graduates or resigns. Some chapters have allowed a large number of outstanding debts to accumulate, which adversely affects their ability to finance planned activities. The collection service can be helpful in all chapter situations involving accounts receivable.

More Province Officers Elected to Decrease Workloads

Most provinces now have two Province Directors of Chapters and some will have two Province Directors of Alumnae. All province officers were elected in the regularly scheduled Province Meetings this spring.

The Council voted in January to add an additional PDC in Alpha, Gamma, Delta, Epsilon, Zeta, Eta, Theta, Iota, Mu, Nu, Pi, and Rho provinces. Beta, Kappa and Lambda already had two PDCs. The decision was also made to elect two PDAs for Beta, Delta, Epsilon, Kappa, Lambda, Mu, and Nu provinces. Two PDAs have shared responsibility in Theta since 1983.

Each PDC will now supervise only three to five chapters, and the PDA workload is similarly reduced. These changes follow guidelines recommended by the Long Range Planning Volunteer Study Committee to decrease the work and time commitments of province officers.

The costs of province officers' travel should diminish since the size of their territory is reduced. In the future, Coordinators of Chapter Development (CCDs) will only be appointed for new chapters because PDCs will now have more time for the established chapters. This will further reduce costs and offset the expenses of the increase in province officer numbers.

Eleanor Lee Thomas Mullen, EΣ—Virginia, is CCD for Zeta Tau—Washington and Lee. The Chapter Consultant is Mary Lorraine Favret, ΓΠ—Alabama.

Melinda Stein Morton, Y—Northwestern, has been appointed CCD for Zeta Delta—Vermont.

The new Rose McGill Student Loan Fund Chairman is Libby Tucker Gessley, ΔZ—Colorado College.

Conducting a study of merchandising and licensing possibilities for the Fraternity are Jan Harenberg Stockhoff, ΓB—New Mexico, chairman; Carol Carrano Adams, ΔM—Connecticut; Phyllis Penrose Big-nold, ΓΓ—Whitman; Debbie Wamser Miller, ΓΞ—UCLA; and Janet Dickerson Sanford, ΓK—William and Mary.

NPC Considers "Project Future Committee" Recommendations and Manual Changes

The National Panhellenic Conference held an Interim Session October 28-30, 1988 at Loew's Ventana Canyon Resort in Tucson, Arizona, with 26 delegates, 71 alternate delegates, and 38 visitors attending. The purpose of this session was to discuss recommendations from the Project Future Committee and to consider changes in the *Manual of Information*.

NPC Chairman Beth Saul, Alpha Psi Phi, based her remarks to the delegation on Charles Dickens's well-known opening paragraph of *Tale of Two Cities*. "The best of times" is the prosperity in which the Greek world is presently thriving, with new chapters, rising memberships, and expanded services. The worst of times" is the proliferation of problems with alcohol and substance abuse, eating disorders, harassment, hazing, and poor behavior which has evoked harsh criticism from the public and negative reactions from school administrations.

Representing Kappa Kappa Gamma were Phyllis Brinton Pryor, BM—Colorado, NPC Delegate; Marian Klingbeil Williams, —Missouri, First Alternate Delegate; Marjorie Matson Converse, —Purdue, Second Alternate; Jean Hess Wells, —Georgia, Third Alternate; Kay Smith Larson, BII—Washington, Fraternity President; and Dale Brubeck, —K—William and Mary, Executive Director.

Jean Wells was chairman of the Resolutions Committee which brought 37 resolutions before the delegation, the majority being proposed by subcommittees of the Project Future Committee. This committee, chaired by Norma Jorgensen, Kappa Alpha Theta, was appointed at the 50th session held in New Orleans in 1987. Project Future is divided into five subcommittees: FINANCE, STRUCTURE, COLLEGIATE CONCERNS, SERVICES, and PUBLIC RELATIONS.

Among the resolutions adopted by the conference was the establishment of a Coordinator of Consulting Visits, to be appointed from the

College Panhellenics Committee. The Coordinator will further develop the service of assisting Panhellenics. Established last biennium, the concept of sending consulting teams to campuses requesting help in improving their Panhellenic has proven highly successful.

Resolutions calling on NPC groups to disband their auxiliary

groups and to eliminate participation in auxiliaries to men's fraternities, and the statement on Positive Interaction and Activities were printed in The Key, winter 1989.

At the 50th Biennial Session, the Conference voted to establish an NPC Archives collection to be housed at a suitable university. At this Interim Session, the ad hoc committee, composed of archivists from the member groups and chaired by NPC Archivist, Cynthia McCrory, Alpha Sigma Tau, recommended that the archives be located at the University of Illinois. The Kappa Alpha Theta Foundation has allocated \$10,000 to assist in this project.

The Services Committee of Project Future is responsible for implementing the computerization of the Central Office. The Executive Committee has been authorized by the Conference to select an ad hoc committee to evaluate business procedures and make recommendations to the Executive Committee.

Public relations is a primary emphasis for Project Future. The Public Relations Committee has proposed, and the Conference has approved, a three-year public relations program involving all member groups of NPC and their individual chapters. This program will result in the scheduling of appropriate events to promote a positive image of women's fraternities. *Marian Williams has been appointed by the NPC Chairman to serve as the new Public Relations Chairman for NPC. She will be working closely with Kathie Nye, Delta Delta Delta, who chairs the Public Relations Section of Project Future. Delta Gamma has contributed \$10,000 to underwrite the cost of employing a public relations firm to assess the resources presently available within the Conference and to provide professional expertise.*

A resolution offered by the Collegiate Concerns Committee, and adopted by the Conference, provides for the Executive Committee to appoint an ad hoc committee to study the extent and nature of hazing activities among women's fra-

Nancy is co-chairman of the association's Volunteers for Blind Students committee which provides Braille and tape transcriptions for students, in addition to planning workshops and social activities.

Candice Bergen, BA—Pennsylvania, stars weekly as Murphy Brown. The half-hour comedy appears Mondays on CBS-TV.

Louise S. Richards, ΓΩ—Denison, received an Alumni Citation from her university. Louise is the former curator of prints and drawings at the Cleveland Museum of Art and former associate professor at Case Western Reserve University. She is a widely published author and authority in the field of prints.

Dr. Ann Thayer Holmquist Weldy, BA—Illinois, has been named chairman of the liberal studies interdisciplinary program at California State University, a major which prepares students for elementary school teaching. Ann was also the recipient of a Meritorious Performance Award in recognition of excellence in service to the university.

Arlene Swanson Ernst, BΠ—Washington, was selected "Principal of the Month" by a national Catholic educational journal, *Today's Catholic Teacher*. She is principal of St. Christopher's in San Jose, California, and formerly principal of Most Holy Trinity parochial school in the same city.

Adlon Dohme Jorgensen, BA—Illinois, Panhellenic Adviser at the University of Illinois, is the recipient of the Student Affairs Outstanding Staff Member Award. The award was presented at a February reception to honor her held by the administration.

Susan McAdams Thigpen, ΕΓ—North Carolina, was inducted into Outstanding Atlanta, which each year honors 10 young people for their roles in business, civic, and cultural fields. Susan, a member of the executive committee for Leadership Atlanta—a group of 65 corporate, governmental, and entrepreneurial achievers, is a Trust Company Bank group vice president, managing existing and new corporate business in the west and mid-west. She volunteers her time to numerous community organizations and projects which include the Woodruff Arts Center, Food Bank, and Northwest Georgia Girl Scouts Council.

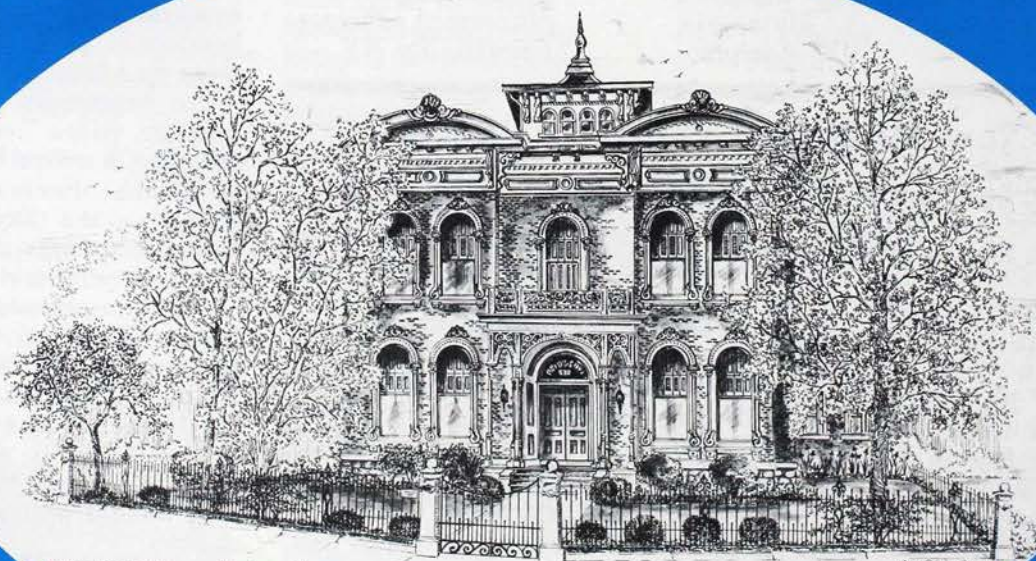
HERITAGE: Getting the Best Return on Your Investment

A subtle blend of history, practicality, and activity—it is 530 East Town Street, Columbus, Ohio, home of Kappa Kappa Gamma Fraternity Headquarters and the Heritage Museum.

As we've described in earlier issues, The Adelphe Campaign is intended to meet the needs of today's members, preserve the history and heritage of the past, and prepare the foundation for tomorrow. The Adelphe Campaign has as one of its goals a \$750,000 endowment for the Heritage Museum. This endowment fund will provide \$52,000 to \$75,000 per year to preserve and maintain the Museum.

530 East Town Street is a show place. A former Ohio governor's residence, an outstanding example of Victorian architecture, and the site of the Heritage Museum and Kappa Kappa Gamma Fraternity Headquarters, this structure serves as the very practical site

our Headquarters and is a museum open to visitors. The Heritage Museum is a repository of period pieces and historical treasures of interest to all. 530 East Town Street is on the National Register of Historic Places.

There are many needs to be met and projects to be completed if the Heritage Museum/Headquarters is to become what we know it can be. The Grand Parlour and the President's Suite are two areas on the agenda for refurbishing. For these and future projects, the Heritage Museum Endowment will accomplish much.

According to Dale Brubeck, ΓΚ—William & Mary, Fraternity Executive Director, the Museum and Headquarters houses Kappas visiting for meetings, provides gracious accommodations, and saves the Fraternity over \$6,500 per year in hotel and restaurant costs alone. It becomes obvious that there are definite benefits from this efficient use of facilities.

Patricia Piller Shelton, Ω—Kansas, Chairman of the Museum Board of Trustees, is particularly proud that the museum offers a practical and unique opportunity through the Museum Internship Program for upper-class undergraduates and graduates to work for a summer in the museum."

Patsy is also very enthusiastic about a video which has just been completed to provide members with a more personal look at the museum. Chapters and alumnae groups may obtain the video for their meetings from Fraternity Headquarters.

It is important that we not only preserve our past, but sustain future growth. Giving to the Heritage Museum Endowment through The Adelphe Campaign is a great way to do just that.

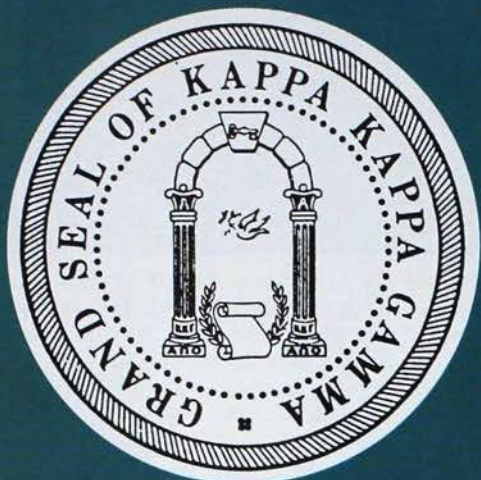

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The Significance of the Key

Have you ever thought about the significance of the key? Not until an article appeared in *Smithsonian*, in 1985, had I thought how something so simple, so everyday and commonplace as a “key” could have so many historical and ritualistic meanings.

Because a key universally carries the meaning of something that locks or unlocks, closes or discloses, it has long served as a symbol of authority and power. Whenever one buys a house or a car, or rents an apartment, and is handed the keys, he has taken part in a time-honored tradition. Distinguished visitors are often symbolically handed the “key to the city,” even though that city is no longer, nor ever was, surrounded by a wall or had locked gates.

In colonial days, a ceremony of keys was enacted in Williamsburg, VA. The four keys to the doors of the Capitol were received from the master builder and broken in the company of those attending the ceremony, symbolizing the completion of the first building to serve as the Capitol of Virginia. This could have led to the “turn key job” of today when the key is turned over after construction is completed. Another ceremony, which takes place every evening at the Tower of London, has been a tradition for the past 700 years. When the chief warder makes his rounds of the castle to lock the gates, at each gate a sentry calls out, “Who goes there?” and the warder answers, “The keys.” The sentry demands, “Whose keys?” and the warder replies, “Queen Elizabeth’s keys.” Continuing the ritual, the sentry calls out, “Advance Queen Elizabeth’s keys, all’s well.”

The Latin word for key, *clavis*, could certainly sound familiar to all of us as we sing the Latin words “*clavis vestra candeat*”—“May your key be splendid.” The clavicle, or collarbone, receives its name because it is more or less a keyshaped bone. Music is filled with references to *clavis*; the keys on a piano or organ, the key-

board which is a collection of keys, the clavichord which is a musical instrument in which the key strikes a string. We can sing in the key of "C" or, like some of us, we may sing "off key." The musical clef sign comes from the word *clef* and the keynote is the first note of a song, although this word is more commonly used today to refer to a keynote address or speech at the opening of a meeting.

As a symbol of authority and power, a magistrate carried a ring of keys. The housewife has her set of keys as does the concierge of a hotel or the chambermaid. Athena is depicted with the keys to the city of Athens, which might lead us to speculate if that is the reason our founders chose the key for our badge. However, that sort of speculation would prove to be false, for we know that Athena did not come into the lore of the Fraternity until 1881 when the Browning Society at St. Lawrence University became Beta chapter (Beta Beta^Δ) and brought with it Athena, their patron goddess, her owl, and our earliest Call.

Just why the key was chosen as a symbol or a badge for Kappa we will probably never know. One tradition is that the mother of founder Anna Elizabeth Willets suggested the key "to lock up their secrets," while other founders had an entirely different interpretation. The Delta Red Book, our earliest written document of Kappa's formative years, explains that the key is the instrument for unlocking the "Hidden Mysteries of Science, Literature and Art." Our magazine was first called the *Golden Key* ". . . because every door is barr'd with gold, and opens but to golden keys." Later, the

Convention of 1888 reported "The significance of the key shall be that our loyalty in Sisterhood shall unlock the portals into the realm of Universal Sympathy."

Another word which often appears in our language is "keystone," which generally means something elemental or essential to the whole and has its origin in the field of architecture. Picture, if you will, an arch, one of the most beautiful elements of design in architecture. It is based on the principle that wedge-shaped stones placed in juxtaposition upon a strong upright foundation will conduct weight uniformly. At its apex is the keystone which locks the whole together and thereby becomes that upon which all else depends. The goal in construction is the keystone, thus completing the total design. Properly constructed, the arch needs no mortar or artificial elements to hold it all together, for it is a perfect balance of natural and positive forces in interaction.

How significant then that Kappa chose the arch for its grand seal, symbolic of unity, permanence, strength, endurance and stability. Perhaps you, the members, both actives and alumnae, are those wedge-shaped stones placed in close relationship, one to another, upon a strong foundation, which is our past, providing the perfect balance of natural and positive forces in interaction. The keystone is the spirit of Kappa which holds it all together and upon which all else depends. Within the keystone of the grand seal is a key—our badge. Perhaps then this is the beauty and design of Kappa Kappa Gamma which gives such great significance to our Key.

Rheva Ott Shyrock died March 20, 1989. Born in Philadelphia, Rheva Ott attended the University of Pennsylvania where she became a member of Beta Alpha chapter, and served as Chapter President. Her daughter, Barbara, later became a member of Beta Alpha. Graduating with a B.S. in chemistry, Rheva received an M.S. from The Ohio State University and pursued further graduate study at Syracuse University, the University of Minnesota, and the University of Vienna.

When husband Richard's academic career took the couple to Duke University, Rheva proved to be in just the right place at the right time. Sigma Beta, a local sorority, sought recognition as a new chapter of Kappa and with the guidance of Rheva, they were installed as Delta Beta chapter in 1930.

In 1934, Rheva was appointed Director of Provinces, the forerunner of our Director of Chapters. Under



her leadership, the positions of province leadership took shape and form. She had the foresight to see the importance of outstanding regional leadership and proposed that an Associate Council be formed composed of Province Officers. To aid them in their positions, Rheva edited several province officer manuals which have been benchmarks for later editorial efforts.

Rheva was elected Grand President in 1936, the last President to be designated in this way. It was Rheva herself at the 1940 Convention who encouraged the Convention to change the title to simply President, a title which she said had much more stature. During her term of office, Delta Kappa at the University of Miami was installed.

During Rheva's presidency, the concept of a retirement vacation home for Kappas moved from dream to reality with the purchase of a lovely Winter Park, Florida, residence. The Boyd Hearthstone opened in 1938, a dynamic idea far

ahead of its time.

In 1940, Rheva foresaw a world at war and its impact upon Kappa and our country. When she completed her term as President she was appointed chairman of the Nora Waln Fund for Refugee Children. In 1947 she received from King Haakon of Norway, the Liberation Medal for her work on the Layette Project for the fund.

Perhaps it was as Fraternity Parliamentarian from 1950 to 1974 that Kappas remember Rheva best. For those of us who attended Conventions during this time, what a learning opportunity it was to watch the quiet, sure counsel which Rheva offered to the seven Fraternity Presidents serving during this period. Rheva's parliamentary expertise was shared with many organizations, including the National Panhellenic Congress from 1949-1955, the American Association of University Women from 1951-1972; and the The Girl Scouts from 1963-1973. Further, she was the author of several handbooks on parliamentary procedure still found in chapter and officer archives today.

Rheva was a forward thinking woman of her time. Positive in her outlook, serious in the acceptance of all responsibilities, she had the unique ability to think about the future . . . for women and for the Fraternity. Kappa takes great pride in her many achievements. She will be sorely missed by the Fraternity and her many friends.

Lending a "Helping Hand" . . . Betty Bryan Drennen, III

Elvis is a charmer. He greets his visitors with a warm smile. He is cute, polite, intelligent, well-traveled, and comes from a lovely family. What more could one ask for in a child? Well, perhaps if he would not turn on the television with his teeth. Hmmm . . .

Born in Argentina, Elvis is a 3½-year-old capuchin monkey. He is the "adopted son" of Betty Bryan Drennen, III—Alabama, and her husband Gerald of Birmingham, Alabama. Elvis came to live with the Drennens in June of 1987, but his stay is only temporary. One day he will serve as an aide and companion to a wheelchair bound quadriplegic, helping to accomplish many of the chores of everyday living.

Elvis is on loan to the Drennens from a program called Helping Hands: Simian Aides for the Disabled. This nonprofit organization trains capuchins to live with quadriplegics to reduce their dependency on family, friends, and attendants.

The Helping Hands program is the brainchild of Dr. Mary Joan Willard, a behavioral psychologist and assistant professor of rehabilitation medicine at Boston University School of Medicine. In 1977 she befriended a young man who was paralyzed from the neck down. Seeing how little he could do for himself, she became determined to find a way to help him increase his independence. Being familiar with techniques involving ways in which animals learn, she conceived the training of primates to assist the disabled.

Capuchin monkeys were chosen for this program because of their friendly disposition and manual dexterity. The size and high intelligence of capuchins make them ideal to serve in this capacity. Mature capuchins weigh approximately five pounds and are only 18 inches tall. They can master new tasks in half hour training sessions and once a task is learned, the monkeys are almost 100% reliable. These tasks include such things as going to the refrigerator, feeding the patient, or changing a video cassette. Quad-



riplegics can use mouth-held laser-beam pointers to guide the monkeys through a task.

Betty Drennen became interested in the program after watching a feature on *60 Minutes* with her husband. Gerry encouraged her to apply for adoption but "he never dreamed we would be selected." At the time there were over 1000 requests for approximately 50 monkeys. There was a year-long wait before the arrival of Elvis, the first adoptee in Alabama. Today, there are over 3000 applications for 200 monkeys.

The Drennens' job as "foster parents" is to raise Elvis until he matures. He is given the same love and affection as a human baby in order to get him accustomed to living with humans. This process takes approximately three years. He will then return to the Helping Hands program at the Albert Einstein College of Medicine in New York City. There he will receive intense training for six months before being placed in the home of a disabled person.

Elvis has become a fixture in the Drennen household to the delight of Betty and Gerry's six grandchildren and many friends. He primarily stays in the basement playroom of their home in a large wire-mesh cage filled with some of his favorite Fisher-Price toys. The door to the upstairs is kept locked with a pad-

lock as Elvis quickly mastered the regular doorlock to join the family in the main living quarters. He is allowed to come up to the den in the evenings on a leash "for our quality time together," says Betty. At this point the leash is a must or he would swing all over the place.

Betty is an extremely busy lady with lots of energy and activities. She enthusiastically gives her time to such organizations as the Junior League and to a women's shelter of a downtown church. Her real love to which she gives top priority is Hospice, for which she serves as a volunteer. The addition of Elvis to the family has not slowed her down one iota. In fact, he has even traveled with them to the beach. On the occasions when Elvis' presence would not be appropriate, Betty has worked out a reciprocal arrangement with her children. "If my three children expect me to baby-sit my grandchildren, then they can help me with Elvis. It really works out beautifully!" she quips with a laugh.

The Drennens realize their time with Elvis is limited and that when he leaves, it will be like giving up a child. However, knowing the value Elvis will make in the life of a disabled person makes the sacrifice well worth it. The monkeys are not just aids for quadriplegics, they become loving, responsive friends who bring a new meaning to quadriplegics' lives. The union is longlasting as the capuchins live about 30 years.

Helping Hands began as a single idea that has evolved into an international network. It was given its first major grant in 1979 by the Paralyzed Veterans of America. Today, the Veterans Administration is its primary supporter but continued fund raising is required to support the program. The support of people like Betty and Gerry Drennen helps to insure its success. “... a host of golden daffodils” ... Bea Gaches Gardner, BΠ

“... all at once I saw a crowd, A host of golden daffodils.” Surely when Wordsworth penned those familiar words he envisioned a breathtaking spring display such as the gardens of Bea Gaches Gardner, BΠ—Washington, in Mount Vernon, Washington.

The display gardens feature examples of over 250 daffodils, irises, tulips, crocuses, hyacinths, scilla and fritillarias. Daffodils, Bea's favorite, grow in profusion on 100 acres while irises cover 25 acres and tulips bloom in five acres of fields.

The centerpiece of the gardens, an elegant Victorian home built in 1886 and the Gaches family home since 1906, is surrounded by two acres of beautifully landscaped bulb gardens, copper beech trees, shrubs, and underplantings. Until last year, Bea personally landscaped and tended the gardens which are open and free for public viewing in March and April while the daffodils and tulips are blooming.

In 1970, Bea and her son, John, combined their love and knowledge of flowers and gardening with the availability of land which was the original Gaches farm. Located in the delta region of the Skagit Valley, the farmland was reclaimed from salt marsh and tide flats, is seven feet below sea level, and much like Holland's rich bulb growing fields. From these assets developed the exciting business of growing and marketing spring bulbs, West Shore Acres Flower and Bulb Farm. A crew of two hundred and eighty-one workers are required seasonally to plant, harvest, market, and mail the twenty thousand bulbs sold each year.

Between Labor Day and the end of October, bulbs are shipped all



over the country by air and by truck. The American Cancer Society buys West Shore bulbs in large quantities to be sold later in fund raising projects in several parts of the country. During the blooming months of March and April, West Shore retails cut flowers and sends packets of forty daffodils or twenty tulips anywhere in the continental United States by overnight express. Bea is often seen during these months heading down the road to Seattle with flowers in her car for restaurants and friends.

Summers are devoted to digging, cleaning, storing, and drying the bulbs. Grading and shipping follow. Medium size bulbs are sold, while the big mother bulbs and the smallest bulbs receive a hot water treatment with benolate and formaldehyde and are planted again in September for the next year's production.

Located seventy miles from Seattle, Mount Vernon is a lovely drive on a spring afternoon and West Shore Acres gardens is quite an attraction for flower lovers. Bea greets many of the thousands of visitors who come and is especially happy to see the busloads of senior citizens who regularly make the trip, or her fellow University of Washington alumni. Nothing gives this warm, caring Kappa greater

pleasure than having other people share in the beauty of the gardens which are so much a part of her life.

Another important focus of Bea's life is her long and fruitful association with the University of Washington. She served on the University's Board of Regents and was honored by being the first woman named president of that Board. Heading the Largest State Agency in Texas . . . Pattilou Puckett Dawkins, BO

When Pattilou Puckett Dawkins, BO—Oklahoma, was asked to serve on the Texas Mental Health/Mental Retardation Board by Governor Bill Clements in May 1986, she had no idea that in less than a year she would become the first woman to be the chairman of MHMR, the largest state agency in Texas.

Beginning her second year as chairman, this Amarillo native travels from the Texas Panhandle to Austin once or twice a week to oversee MHMR's 27,000 employees and \$750,000,000 budget. Pattilou came to the state board with a wealth of local experience having served on the Amarillo Mental Health/Mental Retardation Board of Directors, the Amarillo Hospital District Board beginning in 1975, serving as chairman from 1980 to 1982, and the Texas Panhandle Mental Health Authority.

Her top priority is "making the money stretch far enough to handle all the mentally ill people and the mentally retarded folks in the state of Texas." Although more money is desperately needed, this colorful

Kappa feels that Texas gets more for its money than other states that spend a higher per capita on each client. Addressing the escalating costs of health care, Pattilou thinks one solution is to increase spending on educational programs pertaining to the prevention of mental illness and mental retardation, specifically AIDS education since "one of the final stages of AIDS is dementia."

1987 was a very good year for this dynamic civic leader as the local newspapers named her Amarillo's Woman of the Year for her work as co-chairman of the Amarillo Centennial, and the Amarillo Junior League recognized her with the Outstanding Sustaining Member award for her "standards, ideals, and spirit of commitment reflected through her volunteer efforts." Selecting Pattilou to be co-chairman of the Amarillo Centennial was a logical choice as she is a third generation member of a pioneer Amarillo family which has played varied and significant roles in the development of the city. "An apple pie and motherhood" project,

the Centennial reflects perfectly her philosophy of having "fun" in all of her involvements in the sense of finding excitement and real enjoyment in whatever she does. Being named the Junior League's Outstanding Sustaining Member of 1987 reflected the diversity and wide ranging activities that benefited from her participation and leadership during that year. In addition to her service in the area of mental health, she was a member of the Amarillo Civil Service Commission, vice-chairman of the Randall County Appraisal Review Board, a member of the Texas Repository Evaluation Committee, adviser to the State Appointments Secretary for local appointments to state boards, a member of the Northwest Texas Hospital Youth Services Advisory Council, vice-chairman of the Good Samaritan Retirement Center Board, and campaign treasurer for a favorite candidate for mayor. And that was all in one year! During that year Pattilou also served, as she still does, as president of Hunter Oil Corporation, a family business.

Becoming a Kappa was a natural step for this double legacy who followed her Kappa mother, sister and aunt. Pledging her junior year, she has remained active as an alumna, including a term in 1984 as Amarillo Club President, thereby living the advice she gives to "honor your Kappa commitments." Pattilou feels that Kappa values and experiences helped lay the foundation for her extraordinary career in volunteerism. She says the rewards are rich and lasting, such as "the many opportunities for personal growth and understanding, the pleasure of seeing a project (from its inception) to fruition, (and) the excitement of working with people."

Pattilou has four grown children; the youngest will be graduated from college in another year. She looks toward the future with enthusiasm and optimism, speculating with a twinkle in her eye that "politics might be interesting."

A Peace Corps Volunteer . . . Ellen Stein, ΔΖ



Ellen Stein was photographed with Malian villagers by her father during his December visit. Mr. Stein mentioned that it was a turn-about experience to have his daughter taking care of him during the visit—translating, explaining local attitudes and customs, providing food and living quarters.

Ski instructor in Colorado to gardening instructor in West Africa is a major change in occupation; a change made by Ellen Stein, ΔΖ—Colorado College. Her desire to help others while also broadening her own horizons led this fine arts major to leave her job as ski instructor to volunteer for the Peace Corps.

In seeking a challenge, as well as means to help people help themselves, Ellen left the United States last June for a two-year stint in Mali, West Africa. Located southwest of Algeria, Mali's land area is slightly less than that of Alaska. The population is estimated at more than 7,600,000 and the country is one of the poorest of the world's nations. Ellen lives in a village of about 1800 people located in the bush a long way from what most of us would consider civilization. "Life is not easy here," she says, and continues to state that there is no electricity or running water. Nevertheless, villagers consider themselves lucky to have three pumps, unlike most of the country, which make it unnecessary to treat the water for parasites. Her life is lonely, living in

a mud hut with a dog and cat as her closest companions. Ellen speaks French and has learned the Bambara dialect to communicate with the villagers.

A trained agriculture extension agent, Ellen hopes to initiate projects focusing on gardening for better nutrition. The Malian diet consists mainly of starch from millet grain, with an occasional fish from the Niger River and perhaps a scrawny chicken or goat once in a while. She also aids a local health-care worker with a family planning program. The area's infant mortality rate is 50 percent, and the child who reaches the age of 10 may expect to survive into adulthood, even though the life span is quite short.

Two letters to *The Key* have told of Ellen's interest in her work and a telephone conversation with her father gave added insight. Having visited Ellen for ten days in December, Richard Stein commented on how extremely isolated from knowledge of world affairs he felt while in Mali. He also noted that a volunteer's expectations of influencing the lives of the people with whom she works subject her to severe

stress. He quoted a slogan of sorts that Peace Corps volunteers use to describe their work—"It's the hardest job you ever loved."

"The problems are great and the solutions are few," Ellen wrote, "but every new mind that is put to the task is very beneficial. It (the Peace Corps) is not for everyone, but I do believe it captures many of the abilities of Kappa women—leadership, resourcefulness, creativity, adaptability, compassion, idealism, truth."

Being a Peace Corps volunteer is a far cry from a fast downhill ski run, but it can be just as exhilarating.

Listed are the current legacy policies of Kappa Kappa Gamma Fraternity.

- A legacy is a sister, daughter, granddaughter, or great-granddaughter of a Kappa. Because of these built-in loyalties to the Fraternity, legacies should be given careful and thoughtful consideration by the chapter.

- Legacies shall be voted upon at a time determined by the individual chapter, and after the members have had the opportunity to meet them.

- If a legacy is invited back to the final party, her name must be included on the bid list, either above or below the quota break.

- A legacy letter shall be sent to the rushee's closest Kappa relative (mother, sister, grandmother, great-grandmother) provided the rushee's reference has been received ten days before the first day of rush. The letter shall state the chapter's standing rules regarding legacies.

- To protect a legacy's privacy, chapters are not expected to notify her closest Kappa relative if the legacy is not invited to a party or extended a bid.

National Panhellenic Conference Resolution

Contact With Prospective Rushees and Their Parents for Reference Information is Prohibited

The following resolution from the National Panhellenic Conference was unanimously approved when the delegates met in interim session, October, 1988. This statement re-emphasizes the policy that individual fraternity women should not contact prospective rushees or their parents for information unless they know them personally. In accordance with the policy of Kappa Kappa Gamma "To support the resolutions of National Panhellenic Conference," we expect all Kappas—actives and alumnae—to cooperate in leading the way to comply with this resolution.

WHEREAS, Prospective rushees and/or their parents are being called by some local alumnae whom they do not know for the purpose of securing personal information to be used for a recommendation (reference)

and
WHEREAS, Prospective rushees are being mailed letters from some local reference chairmen whom they do not know requesting personal information to generate references for that individual fraternity, and
WHEREAS, When a collegiate or alumna

member of a women's fraternity phones or writes a prospective rushee whom she does not know, there exists the possibility that the individual contacted may be quite offended at the idea of personal information gathering for the purpose of a letter of recommendation, resulting in negative public relations with that individual and family, and a potential negative secondary reaction on the part of the young woman at university, and

WHEREAS, It has been a long-standing policy that individual fraternity women representing a specific fraternity should not contact prospective rushees or their parents for information unless they know them personally, as indicated on page twelve of the Handbook for Alumnae Panhellenics where it states: "Parents of prospective rushees must NOT be contacted for information!" and,

WHEREAS, National Panhellenic Conference, through its Alumnae Panhellenic Committee, encourages positive panhellenic contact with potential rushees and provides appropriate material for this purpose; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, That fraternity women representing their own fraternity must not contact prospective rushees or their parents for information unless they know them personally.

Why Fraternity?

Why did the founders of Kappa Kappa Gamma deliberately decide at KKG was to be a fraternity and not a society or sorority? The founders were educated in the classics, so they probably knew that the word fraternity is based on the Latin *frater* for blood brother. They were insistent that their organization have a Greek name. They surely must have known that no Latin word, such as *fraternity*, is derived from Greek although both ancient languages come from the same Indo-European family tree. They could have known that in A.D. 900 there was a late-Latin borrowing from Greek; *fratria* was eruditely coined from *phratra*, meaning clan. Historically, the prominent citizens of Athens were divided into 12 *phratra*, so in Rome *fratria* came to being as a term to indicate a formal association based on common interests (to make kin); hence, the word *fraternity* may be said to have a Greek heritage. However, it is highly doubtful that our founders really knew this much about word derivation. Why then is KKG a fraternity?

At the time of the founding, Monmouth College was under the direction of the United Presbyterian Church, which banned dancing, card-playing, theater-going, and play-acting. The only sanctioned social activities were parlor games which did not involve cards, picnicking, sleigh-riding, ice skating, singing around a piano (especially hymns and psalms), and "spreads." While the College had been coed since its beginnings in 1856, the only campus building, Old Main, had separate entrances for male and female students, and there were only two campus organizations for women: the literary societies B.L. (Amateur des Belles Lettres) and Aletheonian. There were very few social activities for women students. As founder Louise Bennett (Boyd) wrote later: "The World seemed to be moving too slowly for us and moreover the young men had chapters of Beta Theta Pi,

Delta Tau Delta, and Phi Gamma Delta, while among the girls there were only 'L.M.' and 'I.D.' organized. We determined that nothing short of a Greek letter fraternity would satisfy us."

The original four organizers of KKG (Lou Bennett, Jennie Boyd, Minnie Stewart, Anna Willits) believed they were founding the first women's secret Greek fraternity, and they openly used the men's fraternities as their model. These first Kappas wanted the same rights to full educational and social participation in college life which the men enjoyed. Our founders understood that a fraternity differed from a society or club in that it was based on a vow—to be responsible for each other and to each other for life. They also knew that the men's fraternities were proud of being a union, not a confederation, and that they had a purpose, organization, government, secret name, secret motto, and form of initiation.

The Kappa founders did not know that L.M., which was also organizing on the campus in the spring of 1870, was a Greek-letter name group, Lambda Mu. Rather, they thought that L.M. was another society similar to the "A" or Alpha Society which was established by the Betas on the campus in 1866; the "A" Society consisted of 10 women and was disbanded in the spring 1869. On the other hand, L.M. made its formal appearance on the Monmouth campus two weeks before KKG, but L.M. never became a national organization.

In the same way, the first Kappas misunderstood I.C. Sorosis, which became Pi Beta Phi in 1888. Founded at Monmouth in 1867, the Pi Phi founders created the word *sorosis*; it is a Greek botanical term for a heap or pile, but the first time it was applied to a group of people was by the I.C. founders to mean aggregation. Pi Phi history relates that their first members selected the word *sorosis* "because [they] thought it the word for women's society, the same as fraternity for

men." The word *sorority*, based on the Latin *soror* for sister, did not exist until the founding of Gamma Phi Beta in 1874.

The Kappa founders believed that *sorosis* was indeed based on the Latin *soror* and both L.M. and I.C. were women's societies or clubs, local in nature and not restricted to collegiate members but open to members of the community. They also thought that the word *society* or *sorosis* linguistically reinforced the differences between men and women, what we would call today a sexist term.

According to an 1888 editorial in *The Key*, "KKG is a fraternity . . . because it realizes that the fraternity spirit rests not upon the distinction of sex . . . but upon the condition of character." This statement echoes an editorial in the first issue of *The Golden Key*, 1882 and the desire of the founders to be a fraternity in order to have "the same sort of an organization as the gentlemen. . . , occupy the same place in college, . . . do similar work under similar government, and bear the same relation to each other. . . . Why then should we not have the same name?"

Marshall Scholarship Winner

Kristina Downing, Π^A —Calif., Berkeley, a senior majoring in chemistry and minoring in French has been named one of 30 Marshall Scholarship recipients for 1988-89. The scholarship, presented by the British government to United States students in appreciation for Marshall Plan postwar aid, is valued at \$20,000 annually and pays tuition, travel, books, and a stipend for graduate study in the United Kingdom.

Kristina, a 3.71 student, plans to attend Oxford University in the fall. The Saratoga, Calif., native chose Oxford because it has "a very good biophysical chemistry department with one of the largest nuclear magnetic resonance (NMR) labs in the world." Currently working part-time as a research assistant for a chemistry professor, she is research-

ing RNA "hairpin" loop formations to collect data for predicting the lowest energy forms of RNA. In addition, she holds a research assistant position at Chiron Corporation which includes conducting DNA probe research to develop "a more efficient and accurate way of diagnosing viruses," she said.

During her sophomore year of college, Kristina traveled and studied in France, earning a certificate in pastry making from La Varenne Ecole de Cuisine in Paris. "People often say that chemistry and cooking are alike," says this member of Phi Beta Kappa and Phi Lambda Upsilon honorary chemical society.

In addition to her chapter activities, she enjoys water polo, softball, "ultimate Frisbee," and is an avid skier, jogger, dancer, hiker and bicyclist.

Commendations for $\Gamma\Phi$ —SMU

Campus and local newspapers have commended Gamma Phi—Southern Methodist University for outstanding community service. Last spring during a retreat, the chapter decided that commitment to community service would be their chapter goal and they chose volunteering time to the Letot Center as their major project. Each week Kappas, "sharing their education, experiences, enthusiasm, expertise and love," spend hours at the Dallas County, Texas, Center which is an emergency shelter within the juvenile justice system for status offenders.

Assisting in tutoring, aerobics, art, drama, sports, and drug/alcohol awareness classes, Gamma Phis are sharing their skills and talents with these young people, striving to be "role models who care."

According to the Volunteer Center, working in the juvenile justice

system is one of the least popular placements, "... so when you have more than 100 young women who are willing to try to help on a peer level, perhaps Letot has found a gold mine, and more important, the kids who have not yet entered the criminal system will benefit and return to their homes and become contributing members to the society."

In addition, this fall the chapter sponsored five days of activities which included "SMU Drink Out Day" when students pledged not to drink alcohol, manned an information booth on alcohol, and were hostesses for a non-alcoholic all-school picnic on the intramural field.

Kappa Named Maid of Cotton

Gay Daughdrill, ΔY —Georgia, was selected as the 1989 Maid of Cotton in ceremonies held in Dallas, Texas, December 30.

Gay, now a senior at Rhodes College in Memphis, Tenn., was chosen from 18 finalists representing nine states in the Cotton Belt. An English major and member of the Student Assembly, she is currently on a six-month tour which will include appearances on behalf of the cotton industry in all 17 cotton-growing states and in major cotton-import-

g nations of the Far East. The Maid of Cotton, who receives a \$10,000 scholarship, serves as the industries' goodwill ambassador to the world.

Gay stresses that the Maid of Cotton competition "is not a beauty pageant. For me this is an internship in communications, broadcasting, and public relations." She is gaining plenty of experience—delivering as many as six speeches in one day.

As Maid of Cotton she is enjoying the benefit of travel most. "I'm in a different city every two days. Seeing how other people live and think is very interesting to me."

Crediting Kappa experiences with helping prepare her to meet new people and adapt quickly to unfamiliar situations, Gay has already spent a week in Japan and Korea for extensive advance photography sessions for a May tour of both countries. Because Cotton, Inc. generates so much advance publicity, the Maid of Cotton is a very high profile figure in Korea. "Seventy percent of the people in Korea recognize the Maid of Cotton by sight." By the time she returns in May, pictures of Gay will have appeared in countless fashion, industrial, agricultural, and textile publications.

Administration Praises EI—Puget Sound

The Puget Sound Administration has formally commended Epsilon Eta—Puget Sound for "their support and commitment to the Peer Advising Associate program over the past three years."

The program assists freshmen in adjusting academically to University demands. After rigorous training program, PAAs assist faculty advisers in advising and registering freshmen and then follow up with counseling, referral, and workshop activities to help the freshmen succeed. PAA positions are competitive, paid positions and only the strongest students are selected. Six Kappas are involved in the program and Claire Sullivan has been selected to fill the newly created administrative position of Peer Coordinator.

1989 Fiesta Bowl Queen

Sarah Hansen, ΓΖ—Arizona, was the Fiesta Bowl queen, smiling and waving to thousands of screaming football fans on January 2. Selected from more than 400 who tried out and from 45 in the second round of competition, Sarah said she quickly became accustomed to interviews and speaking to crowds. Since her reign began in October, she has been interviewed on radio, television, press conferences, appeared at golf tournaments, championship sports events, and various ceremonies for businesses. This year the contest in Tempe, Arizona, matched Notre Dame and West Virginia University. Since game day when the Fiesta Queen appeared on ABC's *Good Morning America*, she has made more than 50 appearances while continuing with her classes. A merchandising major, Sarah continues a Gamma Zeta tradition of Fiesta Bowl Queens and court members.

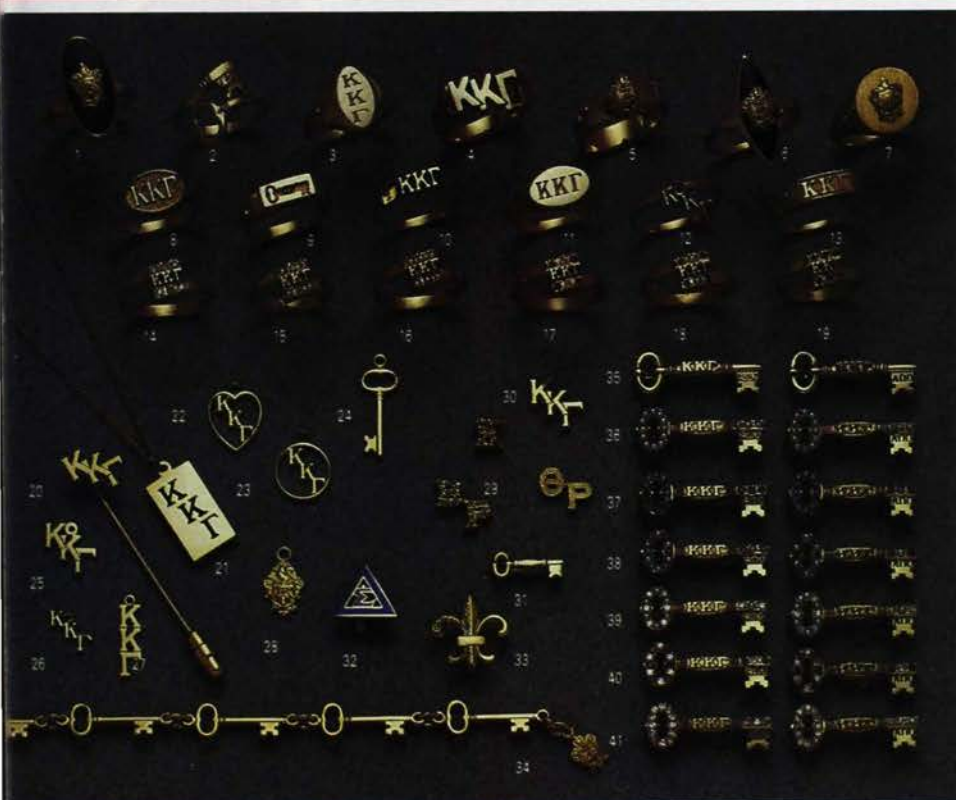

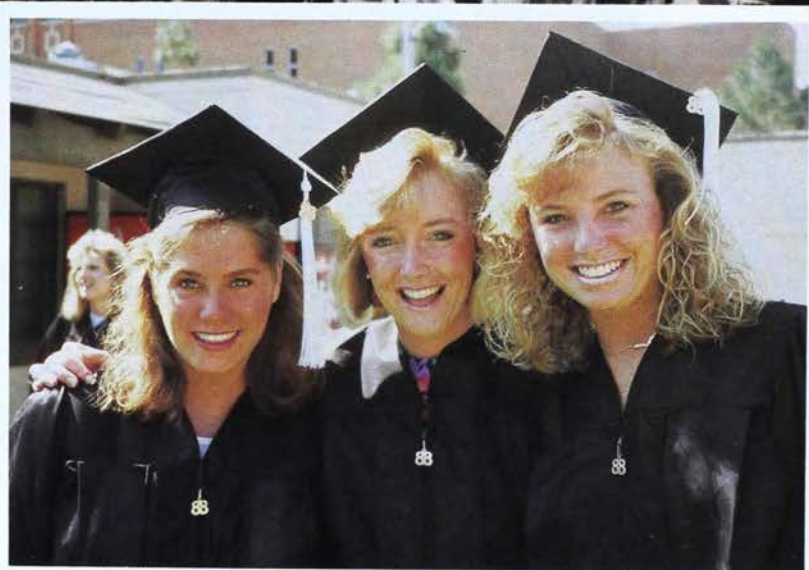
