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The Editor Reflects . . .

Upon the Editorial New Broom

When convention voted last summer to enlarge the size of THE KEY slightly and provide for two single columns of type on each page instead of one double column, the prospect of editing the magazine became even more alluring to one in whose veins blood is mixed with printer's ink. An editor turned loose with a new format is like an interior decorator with *carte blanche* to furnish a house, in which solid, practical furniture (the body of reading matter) can be set off against fascinating backgrounds of draperies and color combinations (headings, illustrations: typography and make-up).

In its new format, the solid furniture of THE KEY is set in a type known as Scotch, and the draperies are provided by a modern type face called Eve. We think Eve is thoroughly appropriate for use in a magazine devoted to the interests of a group of college women. Eve's "bold face" is honest and straightforward as the modern girl, while her light italics are delicate and essentially feminine.

We might add that new-broomishly we had ideas for a great deal of material to be put in THE KEY. Until we actually came to grips with that ogre,

the budget! In our determination to conciliate the ogre we have sacrificed some pet schemes and have sent into the world a rather thin brain-child—thin, but wiry and strong, we trust. Now Kappa must help us charm the ogre, that he will allow us to feed more space to the brain-children of the future, so they will grow fat and husky. Phi Gamma Delta, for example, publishes a magazine *seven* times a year. The October number contained approximately 90 pages of reading matter alone, only six pages less than the largest quarterly issue of THE KEY, which must include *alumnæ* and chapter letters, advertising and directory in that total. We are not grouching. We are simply announcing that if THE KEY is to live within its income, the editor cannot give you too much mental caviar and *petits fours*. If Kappa wants more pieces in THE KEY, give the editor a bigger budget!

Meanwhile, we suggest that all *alumnæ* and chapter letters be read for news of Kappa contributions to the world's work and activities of Kappas on campus. We would like to "play up" the honors and accomplishments of *alumnæ* and actives; but until we can, adequately, read *all* the letters! If they

are worth publishing, they are worth reading.

Having indulged in these budget blues, we will remind the correspondents that their communications are always given first consideration in terms of space provided. Gems of editorial thought may be tossed in the discard, but the letters will be printed. We're doing all we can to help, as witness the elegant new style sheet combined with the new official stationery. We know you appreciate our struggles, for the chapter letters this month show a desire to co-operate.

Do keep us from degenerating into an old scold (not a scoff in a carload!), by sending *all* KEY material on time. And remember that to cry for more space is really the height of altruism on our part.



Monmouth Memorial Fund Past \$1,000 Mark

A MEMORIAL at Monmouth college is nearer a reality now than when I reported to you through a news letter, September 1. At that time the convention collections, profits from the sale of membership certificate frames and the pledges of \$25 from the Kansas City alumnae association in the name of Lou Stevenson Miller brought the total of the fund to \$200.

Now the sixtieth birthday coins, solicited from the whole membership for the first time, have swelled the fund

by \$1204.78 to date, November 29.

May Round Abbot of Epsilon was the first to respond to this birthday plea and since that, with the hundreds of gifts from Canada and the United States, all the way from Syria has come an expression of approval of the plan to commemorate Kappa's birth, and with it a whole dollar since American "dimes and half-dollars" do not flourish there.

To the following chapters and associations that, unsolicited, have taken the trouble to make collections and forward lump sums to me, I want to express sincere gratitude: *Chapters*, Xi, \$8.40; Kappa, \$6.00; Theta, \$31.80; Iota, \$18.00; Beta Mu, \$69.25; Beta Psi, \$12.60; Beta Kappa, \$14.75; Beta Upsilon, \$11.40; Gamma Alpha, \$8.40; Gamma Theta, \$20.40; Gamma Mu, \$18.10; Gamma Tau, \$25.20; Gamma Omicron, \$19.20. *Associations*, New York, \$14.05; South Bend, \$4.80; Tulsa, \$5.00; Washington, D.C., \$33.55; Lawrence, Kansas, \$6.00.

Gamma Delta reports that nearly 100 per cent of actives and pledges has contributed but no lump sum has been received.

Until we know how much money we may have, it is impossible to plan what our gift may be. Many Kappas have written urging that whatever we do, let it be something of real benefit to the college and thus a worthy and dignified memorial to those first girls who wore the key. The committee hopes that announcement of our memorial may be made at the seventy-fifth commencement of Monmouth college next June.

We are eager for your advice and help.

A. A. U. W.'s Golden Anniversary Meeting in Boston in April

ELEVEN years after Kappa Kappa Gamma was founded, a small group of college graduates from the few colleges then open to women gathered in a Boston parlor and formed the Association of Collegiate Alumnae.

It is therefore particularly fitting that Boston has been selected as the place where on April 8-11, 1931, the fiftieth celebration of its founding will be celebrated.

All members of our fraternity today are reaping the benefits secured by the efforts of these pioneers. Among the 35,000 members of the association are many Kappas who have been active in their respective branches and in the national body. Among these Dean Virginia Gildersleeve, Dorothy Canfield Fisher, Mrs. Hoover, and Mrs. Owen Young may be mentioned.

From the beginning there has been emphasis placed upon "the maintenance of high standards of education," which has been increased since the appointment of an educational secretary. The wide variety of the work of the association now includes pre-school, elementary and adolescent education and also adult training, the various branches throughout the country concentrating on whatever phase is most needed in their respective sections. From the national headquarters in Washington come, upon request, helpful programs, outlines, bulletins and bibliographies. There are meetings,

sectional, state and branch within the association, committees and conferences both within and without and the distribution of educational material in answer to numberless questions, not only in the United States, but to many foreign countries.

One of the most important committees is that on fellowships which administers funds for the purpose of graduate study and research in the United States and abroad. The discovery and development of exceptional ability among the applicants for these fellowships has been a most gratifying result. The association is now engaged in raising a \$1,000,000 fellowship fund.

The headquarters of the association are at 1634 I street, Northwest, Washington. Here and at Crosby Hall, London, at Reid Hall in Paris, a member of the association finds herself a welcome guest.

In briefest form the message which I tried to give at the convention at Mackinac was the responsibility of each one of us to form her own opinion regarding international affairs—to form an "international conscience." A great help in this line comes through membership in the International Federation of University Women of which Dean Gildersleeve, our distinguished member of the fraternity, was second president. Membership in the American association carries with it auto-

matically membership in the international federation.

The council of the International Federation of University Women will hold its meeting at Wellesley college the week preceding the April celebration, thus ensuring a large attendance of university women from other parts of the world, including Dr. Winifred Cullis, the famous English scientist who is now president.

President Mary E. Woolley has said that the most important possession of the association is the international phase of the work. "Because all other possibilities for advance, not

only in this association but in all human organization, rest ultimately upon an international relationship such as the world has never known or needed as it needs it today, an international relationship based not upon force but upon insight, understanding, sympathy and friendship. The president of the international federation symbolizes that world unity of university women significant as a group to the very future of civilization. Our possibility as a force in international understanding is unlimited. May we have the vision and the strength to realize it."

New Kappas at Penn State

IN THE fall of 1922, a group of six Penn State girls organized a social club called Sychor. They presented a petition to the student welfare committee, and September 22, this committee recognized the Sychor club as an approved organization.

The aim of the society was outlined as follows in its constitution: "The object of this club shall be:

1. To crystallize a standard of college life.
2. To encourage an active interest in the welfare and work of the college.
3. To promote activities through self-development.

4. To uphold sincerely a spirit of loyal comradeship, and of earnest endeavor to be of service to the college.

The pin was a small gold acorn, bearing the name of the club, which signifies the latent possibilities in us all, the development of which was the object of the club. Mrs. E. H. Witman, Iota chapter of Kappa Kappa Gamma, became the adviser and friend of Sychor.

As a group the girls are interested in scholarship. A few individuals deserve special mention. In 1925 Elizabeth Mears received the John White medal. This medal is given to that

member of the senior class who combines the qualities of high scholarship, leadership, and popularity on the campus. Elizabeth Mears also won the President Sparks' prize, awarded to the student who has the highest scholastic average in the college during the preceding semester. The President Sparks' prize was also won by Mary Rena Frear of the class of '25, and Madalyn Wright of the class of '27. In 1928 the John White medal was presented to Winifred Forbes, who also won a Carnegie prize and was made Phi Kappa Phi.

The club was founded in an oak grove, later named after the club. Sychor was founded with the hope of becoming a chapter of Kappa Kappa Gamma.

The charter members of Sychor were Elsie Kohler Moore, Ruthanna Sharpless Ely, Beatrice Singer Letchworth, Mary Catherine Hughes, Constance Orton, and Katherine Hamilton (deceased).

The signing of the peace terms at the end of the World war brought no greater joy than did the thrilling news of the acceptance of Sychor as Delta Alpha chapter of Kappa Kappa Gamma.

October 3 the charter members initiated were: Elizabeth Cordelia Bell,

Doris Buckalew Bidlac, Mary Elizabeth Crozier, Mary Trescott Davenport, Velma Mae Egolf, Elizabeth Everett, Rosemary Forbes, Helen Elizabeth Fowler, Fern Edwina Harmon, Margaret Scott Hopwood, Rachel Sara Anne Johnson, Helen Strickler Keepers, Sue Kern, Helen Lambert Kinsloe, Margaret Frances Knoll, Josephine Shannon LaBarre, Anne Elizabeth Mellinger, Marjorie Elizabeth Stitt, Margaret Elizabeth Tschan, Isabelle Jayne Wieland, Margaret Anna Yotter, and Marjorie Elizabeth Lyons.

The service was beautiful and impressive. Those conducting the service were: Mrs. I. Willis Myers, grand president; Miss Clara O. Pierce, executive secretary; Mrs. Sewell W. Hodge, province president; Miss Virginia Nieman, province vice-president; with Mrs. Witman acting as marshal.

An informal reception was held the evening of October 3 in the Beta Theta Pi house on the campus. Two representatives from each fraternity were invited, as well as prominent members of the faculty. In the afternoon of October 4, the new members initiated their alumnæ, of which there were 28.

A formal banquet was held in the evening at the Centre Hills Country club, terminating activities.

Something About Penn State

THE Pennsylvania state college was founded in 1855. It functions as the state university of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania and is composed of seven schools: liberal arts, agriculture, education, engineering, chemistry and physics, mines and

metallurgy, and the graduate school. The pre-medical students are enrolled in the school of chemistry and physics, and the pre-legal students are enrolled in the school of liberal arts. The number of students enrolled in 1927-28 was 3,666, of whom 550 were women.

The college owns 1800 acres of land and 60 buildings. It is supported by the federal and state governments. The income from the state at the end of June, 1927, was \$4,655,925. The college has recently completed a new building plan.

The housing facilities for women now consist of three large dormitories and five cottages on the campus. There are also several houses down town. Clubs and fraternities in the order of their founding are given the choice of campus houses.

The girls admitted to Pennsylvania State college are from the upper two-fifths of the high school classes. Since the organization of girls' clubs and fraternities the scholarship of the girls has been higher than that of non-club girls. Women's fraternities were not permitted until 1926.

There are at the present time 58 men's national fraternities. The first of these, Delta Tau Delta, was established in 1872. Phi Gamma Delta was established in 1888, as was Beta Theta Pi; Phi Kappa Sigma in 1890; Sigma Chi and Kappa Sigma in 1891; Sigma Alpha Epsilon in 1892; Phi Sigma Kappa in 1899; and Phi Delta Theta in 1904.

Some of the women's nationals are: Chi Omega, 1926; Alpha Omicron Pi,

1929, as was Theta Phi Alpha and Phi Mu. Delta Gamma was established in 1930.

Girls' representation is recognized in Campus Clubs' council. It was founded in 1923 to bring about the cooperation between various clubs and to unify the interests of non-club girls. Two weeks are set aside in the fall for rushing. No girl may be rushed or pledged until she has been in college for a semester. The council offers a scholarship cup to be awarded to the highest in scholarship for a semester. Each club or fraternity sends two representatives.

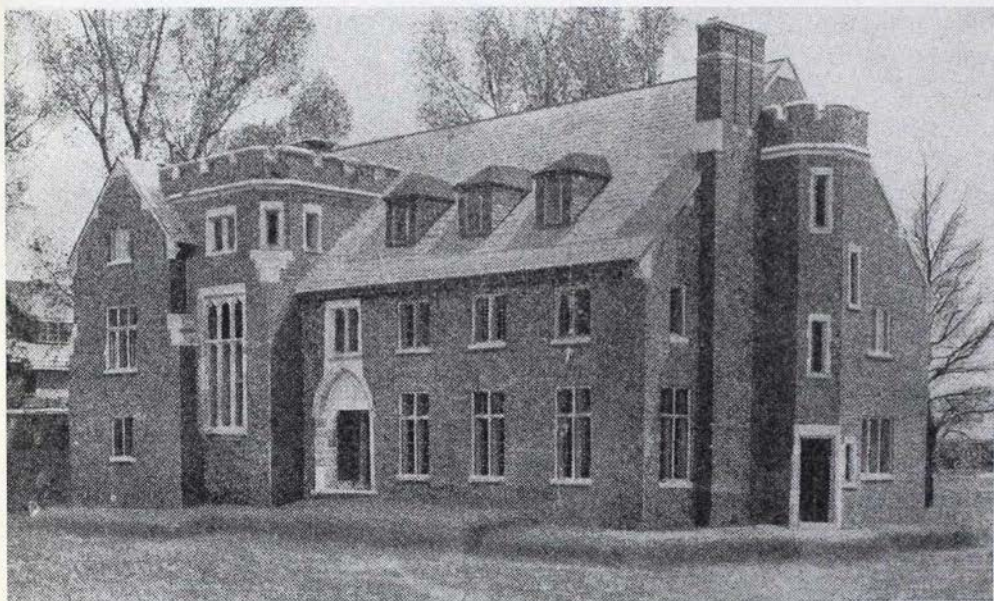

Mu Dedicates New House at Butler



WHERE MU KAPPAS LIVE

MU CHAPTER formally dedicated its new home, 821 Hampton drive, Indianapolis, Indiana, Saturday evening, October 25. A banquet for 150 active members and alumnæ preceded the dedication, which was in charge of Mrs. Everett M. Schofield, chairman of the Mu chapter foundation.

Honor guests present were Mrs. Tade Hartsuff Kuhns, first grand president of Kappa; Mrs. Flora Frazier Dill, only living founder member; and the Delta province president, Mrs. A. L. Walrath.

Kappa Kappa Gamma was the first fraternity to start building since Butler college was moved to its new location in Fairview. Ground was broken New Year's day, 1930, which marked

the fifty-second anniversary of the founding of the Kappa chapter on the Butler campus. With Mrs. Helen Shimer as housemother, the new house was occupied for the first time in September at the opening of the fall semester.

The structure is of English manor style, of solid brick trimmed with wood and stone. The cost was approximately \$60,000. The house accommodates 24 girls with additional rooms for the chaperon and guests. The first floor has a large oak-paneled entrance hall, library paneled in pine, living room, dining room, town girls' room and bath, kitchen and servants' quarters. The staircase, which leads from the entrance hall, has hand-carved

posts. A large cathedral window extends from the first landing to the ceiling of the second floor.

On the second floor are six double bedrooms, a lounge, quarters for the chaperon and guests, bathroom and fudge kitchen. The third floor has six double bedrooms, bath and chapter rooms. In the chapter room are beamed ceilings and a large fireplace with the Kappa crest above it.

An open terrace to extend across the entire front of the house was included in the architect's plans, but to allow for the settling of the house this will not be built until spring.

Four pairs of casement windows with leaded glass panes reach from floor to ceiling in the living room. At one end is a large fireplace. Draperies in the living room and dining room are of damask, and those in the library of linen fillet. All the bedrooms are furnished with twin beds, a chest of drawers and mirror, double study table, two chairs, book shelf and two lamps. The furniture is maple.

Although Mu chapter was founded in 1898, it did not have a home until 1921. For many years the college refused to permit fraternity houses on the campus. It was not until this ban was removed that it had a house on the old Irvington campus. It moved twice in Irvington, and with the removal of Butler to Fairview rented a house near school until the permanent structure now standing on Fraternity Row could be completed.

For the purpose of aiding in the financing and building of the house, alumnae of Mu chapter and active members of the chapter formed the Mu

chapter foundation of Kappa Kappa Gamma fraternity. This organization with Elizabeth T. Bogert Schofield, president; Harriet Ropkey Clifford, vice-president; Edith L. Huggins, secretary; and Katharine Lennox Matthews, treasurer, was largely instrumental in creating for Kappa this beautiful new home.



New Girl's Book By Helen Olds

JOAN of the *Journal*, published this summer by D. Appleton and Company, was written by Helen Diehl Olds (Beta Xi), who has had many stories for girls published in the *American Girl*, *Child Life*, *St. Nicholas*, *Junior Home*, and other juvenile magazines. During the past two years, her stories have been represented in the Blue Ribbon book of best stories for children published during the year. One of her stories, "What About Gran'pa?" has been translated into Braille.

In private life, the author is Mrs. Phelps Olds and lives at Little Neck, Long Island, with her husband and two sons, Bob and Jerry, who are 12 and 3 years old, respectively. Mrs. Olds attended the University of Texas, where she was a Kappa, later receiving her degree at Wittenberg college in her home town of Springfield, Ohio. She has worked on various newspapers, was the first editor of the *Little Neck Ledger*, and still edits a children's column, called "Auntie Pick's Corner," on that paper.

Pierce, executive secretary; Mrs. Alice Watts Hostetler, president of Lambda province; and Mrs. Rosalie Parker, former editor of *THE KEY*, were the installing officers. Gamma Kappa of the College of William and Mary acted as the installing chapter, assisted by Gamma Chi of George Washington university and Gamma Psi of the University of Maryland. A number of Kappa alumnae residing in and near Durham were also present. Mrs. Richard H. Shryock,

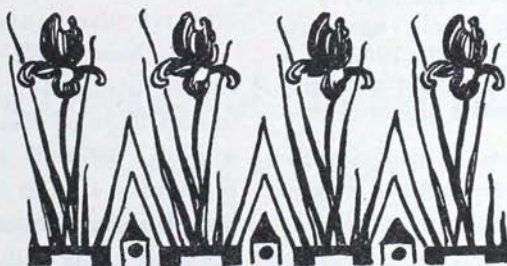

Panhellenic Scholarship Competition Again Open

THE NEW YORK city Panhellenic announces its second annual scholarship award of \$500, available in the fall of 1931. This award was first given in April, 1930, and was won by Miss Helen Delano Willard, a member of Alpha Phi who had graduated from the university of Wisconsin.

The New York city Panhellenic has announced the award for three consecutive years. The recipient must be chosen from the membership of the N.P.C. fraternities. No applications are to be sent direct to the New York city Panhellenic as each congress fraternity has been asked to co-operate in selecting applicants. The name of only one applicant will be submitted by each fraternity and the selection of that applicant will be made by the fraternity itself.

The specific requirements to be met by candidates are:

1. The applicant shall be a college senior or graduate on April 1, 1931, and shall be a member of a national panhellenic congress fraternity.

2. The recipient shall agree to spend the college year of 1931-32 in study in New York city, pursuing a course leading toward a higher degree.

If you are interested in applying for the scholarship award please submit the following information:

1. Letter giving your home address and present address, your age, year of graduation from preparatory school and name of that school, year, course, and major in college, and transcript of your college record. If a graduate, include, in addition, statement of work or study since graduation and present occupation.

2. Statement of the graduate work you wish to pursue in New York city and letters from two of your college professors concerning your qualifications for such work. Also letters from two alumnae who knew you well.

3. Recent photograph.

The name of the successful applicant will be announced April 1, 1931, and the scholarship award will be available for use in the fall of 1931.

The closing date for applications is February 15, 1931.

For a number of years most of the interests and energies of the fraternity women in New York city centered around the efforts to make real the greatly desired Panhellenic house. With the completion of Panhellenic house and the filling of its rooms, the success of that project was assured and there came opportunity for the city Panhellenic to turn its attention toward establishing a center for fraternity friendship and activity.

The New York city Panhellenic occupies attractive club rooms on the fourth floor of Panhellenic house, and while its ultimate aim is to have every fraternity woman in New York a member there is always a cordial welcome in those club rooms for each Greek, whether or not she is a member. A secretary and hostess are on duty throughout the day and evening, and information concerning the activities of the local alumnae organizations of all fraternities is available and gladly given. A very earnest effort is being

put forth to make the city Panhellenic headquarters a real center of Greek friendliness, as well as to develop social and cultural activities with a wide appeal.

In addition to this program, the New York Panhellenic is making a concrete contribution toward one of its objects as expressed in its constitution—"To stand always for the encouragement of higher education."

In 1929 a scholarship award was established, and given for the first time in April, 1930.

It is desired that the applicants for the scholarship award shall have no direct contact with the New York city Panhellenic, but rather that all preliminaries shall be conducted through a designated officer in each fraternity and that she shall be the one medium of communication between her fraternity and the scholarship award committee of the New York city Panhellenic. All applications for each fraternity shall be sent to the designated officer in that fraternity, she to make the final selection of the one she feels best fitted to receive the award. Care will be taken to prevent the identity of any appli-

cant being known to the members of the scholarship award committee of the New York city Panhellenic. The name of only one candidate from each fraternity will be submitted to the scholarship award committee and detailed blanks for submitting information concerning that candidate will be sent at a later date.

Three Decades of History Behind Newest Chapter

SINCE the organization which was installed November 7 as Delta Gamma chapter of Kappa Kappa Gamma, at Michigan State college, East Lansing, Michigan, is already 32 years old, a brief history of the former Themian Literary society was obtained from Mrs. Casper Baarman, Grand Rapids, Michigan, a charter member.

It is interesting for us to realize that the "literary" society was the accepted form of organization for such a group 32 years ago, when Michigan State college was Michigan Agricultural college. Programs were arranged for the meetings, and doubtless "papers" were prepared and read, as they were in the early days of Kappa, 28 years before.

"There were important meetings in girls' rooms," says Mrs. Baarman; "and animated discussions about a name. Finally a charter was drawn up and presented for approval. The name Delphian was first chosen. The first meeting was January 8, 1898, in the Y.M.C.A. rooms where 11 enthusiastic and determined girls exerted their utmost abilities to make an interesting program.

"The officers for the first term were: president, Marguerite Borgula; vice-president, Ruby Calkins; secretary, Irma Thompson; treasurer, Clara Dean.

"In September, 1898, the society was offered the use of the Phi Delta Theta rooms, and was granted permission to use these rooms."

Mrs. Baarman does not remember the 11 original members of Delphian, but for the fall term in 1898 only five had returned to school. After a program of rushing, pledging and initiation, there was some dissatisfaction with the name and charter. Accordingly the name was changed to Themian, from Themis, the goddess of justice, and a new charter was adopted. Before the year was out the membership had increased to 13 girls, who are regarded as charter members. These charter members are: Ruby Calkins (Mrs. Kirk Towner, Haslett, Michigan); Marguerite Borgula (Mrs. Esser, Detroit, Michigan); Coral Havens, Detroit; Artie Lockwood, Pittsford, Michigan; Florence Munden, Lansing, Michigan; Gertrude Green (Mrs. Daniel Sletting, Chicago); Kate Nichols (Mrs. Ralph Leckley, Pittsford, Michigan); Lula Pepple (Mrs. Baarman); Margaret Snell (Mrs. Earl Wright, Ionia, Michigan); Irma

Thompson (Mrs. Mark Ireland, Schofield Barracks, Territory of Hawaii); and Clara Dean, Mrs. Harriet O'Connor Horton and Mrs. Josephine Spencer Austin, deceased.

"The constitutional object of the society," adds Mrs. Baarman "was 'to promote the literary and social culture of its members,' but beneath this all-important but purely educational benefit there lies an infinitely more worthy object, that of human fellowship and the development of true loyalty and friendship. There has always existed and always will exist a feeling of genuine fellowship among the Themians, which years of separation cannot destroy. To Irma Thompson Ireland, more than any other charter member, should go the credit of holding this society together during the first years."

Mrs. Ireland, wife of Lieutenant Colonel Mark L. Ireland, Q.M.C., U. S. army, is now in Honolulu, where her husband is stationed at Schofield Barracks. Proof that she has carried over her energy and ability into the years after college lies in a record of service, and a list of short stories, articles, verse and other literary contributions. She is the mother for four children, the oldest a son of 23 and the youngest a son, 13 years old. Mrs. Ireland has been actively interested in Girl Scout work, Parent-Teacher associations, and army service organizations as her husband's duties have taken her to various posts throughout the United States.

Although she is not a charter member, another Themian alumna of note is Helen Hull, whose fifth novel, *The Asking Price*, published this spring, won for her the Guggenheim Traveling Fellowship for Creative Work.

IN MEMORIAM

LAMBDA CHARTER MEMBER

When Mary Jewett and Hattie Parshall, two of the three charter members of Lambda, joined the invisible sisterhood within the last two years, Lizzie Voris, the other charter sister, was left to mourn the loss of their companionship. But she did not tarry long, passing away September 15, 1930, after an illness of nine weeks.

Elizabeth U. Slade Voris was born January 13, 1855, in Columbus, Ohio, attending the public schools of that city. She entered Buchtel college of Akron, Ohio, graduating in 1877 with an A.B. degree. She became assistant in chemistry and physics, receiving her M.A. degree in 1878. June 10, 1877, she with the two above mentioned, were initiated into Kappa Kappa Gamma and carried the chapter along, initiating others during the following year. Then the chapter was inactive for two years, but was revived in the fall of 1880. Until quarters could be obtained in the college building, the meetings were held at Mrs. Voris' home.

She was married to Edwin F. Voris, a prominent lawyer of Akron, Ohio, October 21, 1879. Of that union were born two sons, William Slade Voris, of Akron, Ohio, and Edwin F. Voris, of Portland, Maine; and three Kappa daughters, Lydia Voris Kolbe, of Brooklyn, New York; Elizabeth Voris Lawry, of Palo Alto, California; and Marion Voris, of Akron, Ohio.

She is survived by five sisters, the

first four of whom are Kappas of Lambda; Mrs. Alice Kohler, of Akron, Ohio; Mrs. Olive Van Deusen, of Steamboat Springs, Colorado; Mrs. Clara Taylor, of Pasadena, California; Mrs. Belle Ransom, of Cuyahoga Falls, Ohio; and Mrs. Abby Martin, of Palo Alto, California.

Mrs. Voris was a charter member of the Isabella club, the first literary group of the city. She was also a charter member and ex-regent of the Cuyahoga-Portage chapter of the D.A.R., the Federation of Women's clubs, the College club and the Fifty-

Year club. She was a loyal member of the First Universalist church. She maintained a heartfelt interest in both the active and alumnæ chapters of Lambda and in the whole fraternity. She attended the national convention in California in 1926, and enjoyed it very much. The active members made her last birthday a happy one with a serenade and handkerchief shower.

Her daughters were closely connected with Kappa history. Mrs. Lydia Voris Kolbe, of Brooklyn, New York, was grand treasurer, 1908-1914; business manager of *THE KEY*, 1914-1916; and grand president, 1916-1920. Mrs. Elizabeth Lawry, of Palo Alto, California, was editor of *THE KEY*, 1904-1906, and grand treasurer, 1906-1908. Marion Voris was grand president's deputy 1916-1920.

In response to a request for data concerning the late Mrs. Voris, the foregoing article was submitted by her sister, Mrs. Belle Ransom, who was grand marshal, 1886-1888.

It is being forwarded verbatim, and there is not much we can add, except to say that the little Lambda mother, with her snowy crown of hair and great eyes, the true blue hue of Kappa, leaves a very empty chair. No matter what the weather, if the wearers of the key convened, she was sure to be present. Such loyalty will be sincerely missed.

This year, we honor the splendid founders of our fraternity in its sixtieth anniversary. This year we honor,

too, the memory of Lambda's valiant founders. To us they have flung the torch of womanly ideals. Be ours the hands to bear it on.

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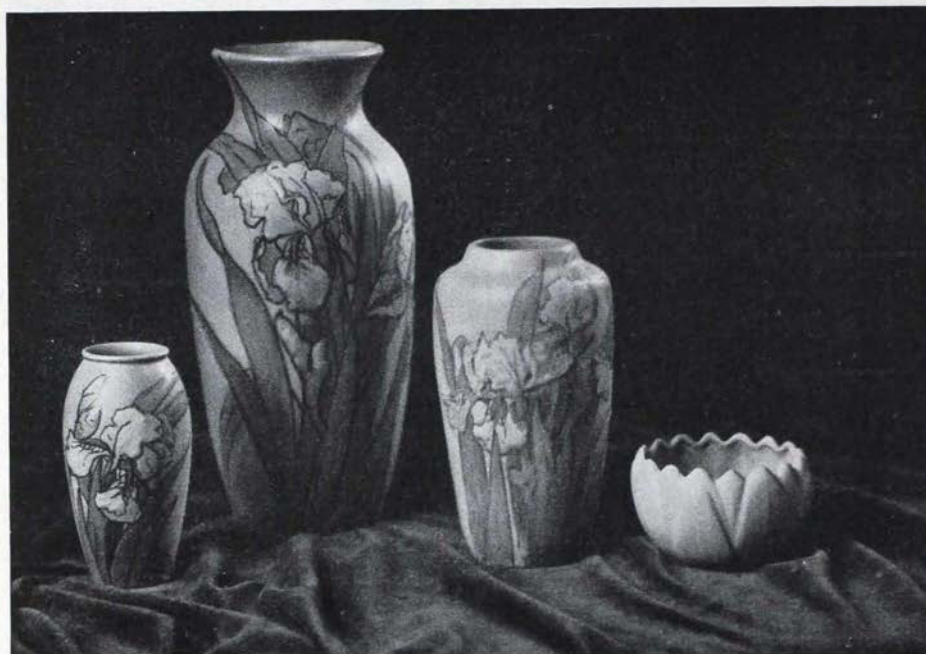

The basic color is soft blue in a dull satin finish, handsomely hand-embossed with the fleur-de-lis. One may have a selection of two varieties in the flower—all blue and natural. By "all blue" we mean that the entire decoration is in two shades of blue. By "natural" we mean that the stem and leaves are green and the blossoms two shades of blue with a yellow center. The bowl is undecorated and is all blue.

As gifts this pottery cannot be equalled for Christmas, birthdays, showers, weddings, prizes, initiations and graduations. Number 63 is already beautifying many chapter houses.

A pair of vases filled with ivy makes an attractive decoration for the shelf or mantel. Number 42 is suitable for desk or boudoir lamps. A pair of number 56 may be used as twin reading lamps. Number 63 may be converted into a large table lamp or adornment for grand pianos and chests.

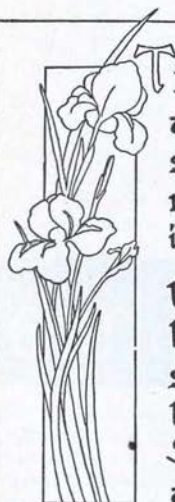

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
