A Call to Convention

"Through Faith to Action"

"The general convention of the Fraternity shall be held biennially at a time and place to be determined by the Council. Its purpose shall be to elect officers, to consider reports and to transact such business as may be properly brought before it." Article II, Section 1, A.

To Kappas Everywhere: By the authority vested in me by the constitution it is my happy privilege to summon you to the 40th biennial convention of Kappa Kappa Gamma to be held at Jasper Park Lodge, Alberta, Canada, June 24-July 1, 1954.

The convention program will be focused on the theme "Through Faith to Action" as the logical next following the province convention emphasis this last spring on "The Faith by Which We Live."

To those of you who are Habiteers, this call will bring back such thronging memories of previous conventions that no further incentives will be needed to whet your interest. It may be that those for whom this will be a first time, or those who are as yet undecided, are wondering why the anticipated gathering of the clan is being heralded as such a rewarding and never-to-be-forgotten experience. The reasons are legion, perhaps a few may be suggestive.

A Kappa convention is democracy at work. The elected representatives of the active chapters and alumnae organizations and the officers, as the voting body, scrutinize the laws, the policies, the procedures of the Fraternity taking such considered actions for change and improvement as may be deemed wise. Careful preparation insures that such business is handled in orderly fashion and with dispatch.

A Kappa convention is an opportunity for a better understanding of our fraternity, for broadening vision and deepening insights. A Kappa convention is an adventure in friendship. It offers the priceless privilege of renewing old ties and forming new ones in our days of work and play together. Believing that "all work makes Jack a dull boy" there is a happy balance of business and pleasure, of work and fun.

A Kappa convention is "a coming together." The circle will not be complete without you.







When the special rolls into Jasper on June 24 there will be many old, familiar faces as well as new ones to welcome Kappas and help make this 40th convention a memorable one. Assisting the convention chairman at Jasper will be two well-experienced people—Virginia Alexander McMillan, Γ K-William and Mary, and Curtis Buehler, B X-Kentucky. Virginia was chairman of the delightful Murray Bay convention in 1950 and has been assisting with conventions since 1942 in various capacities; so she knows most of the answers. Although Curtis Buehler is a more recent addition to convention committees, all who attended the Homestead convention in '52 will remember how efficiently and graciously she assisted the committee there. She brings a background of years of advisory work with the Kentucky chapter and activity in the alumnae association, as well as a fine business experience, all of which are most helpful to the committee.

Mary Jim Lane Chickering, Γ N-Arkansas, a former council member, and at present member of Hearthstone Board, who so ably and graciously took care of all social responsibilities at the Homestead, will again be chairman of the social and hospitality committee. To greet Kappas at the registration desk will be Katheryn Bourne Pearse, Γ Δ -Purdue, chairman. Although Kay is a newcomer to convention "mechanics," she is an old-timer to Kappas, having just retired from the council in 1952 and before that served as a province officer. Rates at Jasper Park Lodge for the week of June 24 to July 1, 1954 will be \$16.00 per day per person American plan. There is no charge for swimming or tennis. The charges for golf are \$3.00 per day and equipment may be rented. Boats and canoes are available for rent at \$.50 per hour.

The Train to Jasper

Forty-eight hours after leaving Chicago Tuesday, June 22, the conventioners on the Kappa Special train from the eastern and central parts of the United States will arrive in Jasper Park, Alberta, Canada for a week in this delightful mountain resort.

As the Special travels through St. Paul and Winnipeg many travelers will join the group while those from west of the Rockies and western Canada will be coming to Jasper in special cars from Vancouver.

It is planned to make these hours of travel happy and memorable ones.

Jane Price Butler, Γ Ω-Denison, and Katherine Nolan Kammer, B O-Newcomb, the national music chairman and her assistant, will be on hand to keep the songs going and help the voyagers learn some of the songs of our Canadian sisters whose country we are to visit. There will be many other gay and interesting diversions en route.

Jasper Park is reached via the Canadian National Railroad which also owns Jasper Park. During the summer season this railroad makes special rates to its national parks. Following are rates from some points in the United States and Canada.

All reservations to the point where the special train or cars are joined should be made via the most direct route, by officers, delegates and visitors through their local railroad agent. All transportation reservations close June 1. No cancellations will be accepted after that date.

Baggage. It is important that all Kappa baggage have KAPPA TAGS and that they be plainly marked with NAME, ADDRESS AND TRAIN SPACE. It is requested that each traveller bring a minimum amount of luggage, NOT TO EXCEED THREE PIECES. NO BAGGAGE is to be checked through to Jasper Park.

Passports and Identification. Passports are not necessary, but all travellers from the United States to Canada should carry with them some identification for use in returning to the United States as proof of U.S. citizenship. Birth certificate, club membership, or driver's license are sufficient.

Motorists. Canadian roads, in many instances, particularly en route to this section are not as favorable as U.S. highways and the convention committee does not encourage driving to Jasper Park.

Where will it be after convention?

Kappas who come to convention in Jasper this summer will certainly want to take this opportunity to see well known places of beauty and interest while they are in this part of the country.

Where will it be?—To the Columbia Icefield, Lake Louise, Banff, Vancouver, Victoria, Alaska or Hawaii?

The convention transportation committee has planned the following four post-convention tours:

Tour #1—Columbia Icefield, Lake Louise and Banff—The Columbia Icefield is 65 miles to the south of Jasper—(which is located about 350 miles, as the crow flies, directly north of Spokane, Washington, and nearly 350 miles east of the Pacific ocean). Lake Louise is 160 miles southeast of Jasper and Banff is 40 miles further along the rushing Bow River.

Tour Number One will leave Jasper immediately after lunch on July first, by bus, and arrive at the famed Icefields in time for a tour of the glacier and dinner there at the picturesque chalet. The party will continue on through this awesome scenic country to Lake Louise where the night will be spent at the lovely Chateau, one of the world's most famous holiday resorts. The next morning there will be time to enjoy the numerous mountain trails about the hotel, take pictures, have a swim in the glassed-in pool or sit in the warm sunshine and enjoy the view of Lake Louise and the glacier. After lunch on July 2nd the group will leave for Banff to stay for a night and a day at the Banff Springs Hotel, one of the largest and finest hotels on this continent. The great fireplaces, and comfortable period furniture of Mount Stephen Hall and the Garden Lounge will remind you of a Scottish castle. Shopping in the nearby town of Banff will interest many. The evening of July 3rd the tour ends and everyone will leave for home by train. Those traveling east will arrive in Chicago at 2:40 p.m., July 5. Two bags are allowed for this tour. A charge of \$5.00 will be made for any extra bag. This is a two and a half day tour for a rate of \$60.50 in U. S. funds. The rate covers all expenses including tips, baggage, etc.

Tour #2—Vancouver, Victoria, Lake Louise and Banff. Vancouver is on the mainland on Puget Sound about 150 miles directly north of Seattle, Washington, in British Columbia. Eighty miles southwestwardly across the sound from Vancouver, on the lower tip of Vancouver Island, is the extremely English city of Victoria.

Late in the morning of July 1 Tour Number Two will leave Jasper by train for Vancouver, traveling through some of the most gorgeous of the Canadian Rockies, past Mt. Robson, rugged snow capped peaks, picturesque lakes, and densely forested slopes, arriving in Vancouver early in the morning. After breakfast at the Vancouver Hotel, a tour of the city will be taken before embarking for Victoria. This is a most delightful four hour boat trip. Victoria, capital of British Columbia, and said to be the most English city outside of England, is a place of unforgettable charm and beauty. Here the party will visit the noted Butchart Garden, tour the city and still have time to shop. Leaving Victoria the next day the tour will return to Vancouver to board the train for Lake Louise and Banff. A day and a night will be spent at each of these famous mountain resorts, with drives about Banff National Park. This will be an unforgettable experience. The tour will terminate the evening of July 6th after a day of sightseeing and shopping in the town of Banff, near the Banff Springs Hotel, where the group will stay.

Those traveling east will arrive in Chicago at 2:40 p.m. July 8. Two bags will be allowed. A charge of \$10.00 will be made for any extra bag.

This is a five and one half day tour for a rate of \$93.00 in U. S. funds. This rate includes all expenses *except* meals and meal tips on trains and boats.

Scenic Drives in Jasper National Park

A trip to Jasper without a visit to the Columbia Icefields would, indeed, be incomplete. Here, the Athabasca Glacier is known as the Mother of Rivers, as its waters feed three oceans. The beauties and wonders of this region can be enjoyed in a drive from Jasper to the Icefields along the road which parallels the continental divide. Such a trip to the Icefields is planned for Sunday afternoon, June 27, leaving Jasper at 1:30 p.m. with evening dinner at the Chalet and time out for a tour of the Glacier. There is the shorter drive to Mount Edith Cavell from which one can see the Glacier of the Angel, and where one can dine at the Rustic Tea House near-by, and also the General Drive to Annettee and Edith Lakes and Maligne Canyon.

Rates for these trips made by comfortable bus or car are:

Columbia Icefields—\$10.00 including dinner—6 hours driving time
Edith Cavell—\$4.00—3 hours
General Drive—\$4.00—3 hours

Kappas who plan to take Tour Number Two should buy their round trip rail road tickets with destination Victoria, B.C. In most instances round trip railroad rates to Jasper, Vancouver and Victoria vary little, if any, in cost. Check with your local railroad agent.

Tour #3—To Skagway, Alaska by boat via Princess Louise, Canadian Pacific Steamship Co. Further information on request. Tour is eight and one half days. Rate, \$190.00 up. Reservations should be made at once accompanied by a deposit of \$46.00. Sailing from Vancouver July 3 at 8 p.m.

Tour #4—To Hawaii via Canadian Pacific Air Lines. Further information on request. Tour five days. Rate, \$375.00 up. Leave Vancouver July 2, 10:30 p.m.

Even though you do not plan to attend convention you are welcome to take any of these trips in the company of the congenial Kappa group.

The convention transportation committee has secured group rates for these tours on a non-profit basis. Rooming will be in twin bed rooms, two to a room unless singles are desired, in which case there will be an additional charge. Two members of the convention committee will escort tours 1 and 2, taking entire charge of hotel reservations, baggage transfers and tips, sightseeing tours, etc. Reservations will close June 1st. No cancellations can be accepted after this date.

To go to this far section of Canada and not embrace this opportunity to see and enjoy these famous scenic spots would indeed be regrettable.

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

- 10—TREASURER places monthly finance report in mail to chairman of budgeting and bookkeeping.
- 15—(or immediately following elections) CORRESPONDING SECRETARY sends names and addresses of officers and alumnae advisers to Fraternity Headquarters and province president.
- 15—HOUSE BOARD PRESIDENT returns information regarding house director appointment to Fraternity Headquarters.
