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

Jean, Sally, and Marian all related tales of their times with Polly and John — memories which spanned many years and more than ten Conventions for John Beall.

We heard about a memorable train ride to the 1964 Convention at Sun Valley, where Jean and Polly first met. We chuckled over Sally's first association with Irish oatmeal and John. And we smiled a little softly as Marian summed up our feelings saying, "One of the most wonderful things in life is to be cherished. And such are the feelings Kappas have for Polly and John."

Over 100 donations from individuals and three alumnae groups made the purchase of the beautiful five-tiered crystal chandelier gracing our Head-quarters' dining room, possible. It's sleek and dazzling lines formed by hundreds of stunning prisms, will shed

a bright future on those who are warmed by its glow.

Barna Graves reminded those in attendance of a very special letter which accompanied a donation for the chandelier. The writer said, "I was so touched to learn of this special chandelier. Having never met John, I learned of his love for Kappa from his wife, Polly. In fact, it was not until I had the absolute privilege of meeting Polly, that the Kappa spirit overwhelmed me. I met her almost ten years to the day after my initiation. How ironic that a true light will shine on future Kappas when Polly, herself, cannot see it (as she is almost blind). Yet, the symbolic light it shines, will be felt by all who have been touched by Polly and those who knew her late husband. It has been so wonderful to meet someone who is Kappa through and through - the absolute personification of the Good, the True, and the Beautiful and the Spirit of Kappa Kappa Gamma.'

Convention Activities

Action Packed. That's the way it was for nearly 1000 Kappas between June 19 and June 24, 1986 at the Adam's Mark Hotel in Philadelphia. The Kappa Kappa Gamma 56th Biennial Convention was stimulating, powerful, active,

moving - and exciting.

The enthusiastic members in attendance were treated to programs for chapters, alumnae groups and for House Board delegates. They were captivated by a variety of superb speakers and precisely planned workshops and they conducted daily business, became acquainted with the operations of their Fraternity and got the chance to meet the many special people from the United States, Canada, and even from overseas, who took the time to share their talents with Kappas.

David Westol, attorney and National Vice President of Theta Chi Fraternity, enlightened attendees on the folly of underage drinking and of substance abuse. His summary of possible repercussions on the individuals as well as possibly on the Fraternity, provided ample food for thought in his "Greek

Legal Affairs" session.

And the many other workshops — alumnae and chapter programs, fraternity personnel and finance — addressed complicated people-skills and baffling new findings — which provided constant stimulation for attendees as the days quickly passed.

The business meetings, the connection which reinforces the Fraternity's close bonds, were interesting, often challenging, but always enlightening. The special ritual of the Fraternity, presented historically by Past Fraternity President and now Fraternity Ritualist, Jean Hess Wells, ΔΥ-Georgia, again strengthened Kappa ties.

The Long-Range Planning Committee, chaired by Past Fraternity President Sally Moore Nitschke, BN-Ohio, reflected their careful findings and recommendations in a stimulating presentation with plans for a bright,

exciting future.

Alumnae Achievement Award Winners

We all glowed with pride as our Alumnae Achievement Award winners shared their personal stories and advice with us. Martha Seger, the first female member of the Federal Reserve Board of Governors reminded us that it's important to take risks — and sometimes to fail — to reach our dreams.

Cathy Anderson, White House Fellow and successful attorney — explained that women shouldn't feel compelled to accomplish amazing feats single-handedly. She emphasized that support is quite important and should be utilized and appreciated. Irene Gaskins, founder of The Benchmark School for children with learning disabilities, echoed Cathy's words and inspired us to pursue our dreams. Ginnie Johansen Johnson recommended that we recognize our strengths and not be afraid to push ourselves to success.

Mary Gates, Vice Chairman of United Way International and member of some of the country's most influential Boards of Directors, advised us to advance with ease into areas that interest us - even if they be areas formerly dominated by men. Mary encouraged reaching our potential and Kathy Hammock reiterated this thought as she related information surrounding her career choice as a neurosurgeon and founder of the Brain Research Center for Infants and Children. And Laurie Humphries, whose own traditional Southern background dissauded women from pursuing careers in the sciences, surmised that perseverance and a bit of fate can determine our futures.

We had further opportunities to show pride in our Kappa sisters as we viewed the many fine programs planned and the excellent dinner speeches and presentations. Dr. Dorothy M. Barbo shed some light on an age-old problem — osteoporosis — at the Philanthropy Dinner. Our attending Kappa Presidents assembled at the gracious Presidents' Dinner and we gathered another night proudly to see our chapters receive awards. We all reflected fondly at the Decade Review Dinner where highlights of the past ten years took us all on a trip down memory lane.

The fervent bustle of the Convention Days came quickly to an end. We soon found ourselves seated at the lovely Candlelight Banquet. Properly mellowed by the events of the week, we were treated to some thoughtful words from our Banquet Speaker, Martha Galleher Cox, P[△]-Ohio Wesleyan University. Marty, A Kappa Loyalty Award Winner and current member of the Panhellenic Affairs Committee, addressed us with her speech, "Are We Big Enough for Freedom?" Are We Big Enough for Freedom?

Many of you have been involved in or know about the AMERICAN FIELD SERVICE Program, the exchange of foreign students at the high school level. It is part of the program to take students from other countries on a tour of America at the end of the school year before they return to their homelands. At the conclusion of such a tour, a young woman from one of the Eastern European countries was asked what she thought of America. "You have a beautiful country and the people are very friendly. I like it very much." "Would you like to live here then?" "Oh no," she responded. "I couldn't handle all the freedom you have here in America!"

ARE WE BIG ENOUGH FOR FREE-DOM? Freedom begins with God. The Book of Genesis tells us: "And God created man in his own image, in the image of God created he him; male and female created he them." Since then, the history of mankind has been the story of what we have done with that God-given freedom. The culture, the creativity, the caring — but also the greed, the grime and the gloom. The good and the bad — the love and the hate — the beautiful and the ugly. All of it results from the freedom of human beings to make life what we think we want it to be.

We are meeting this week in the great city of Philadelphia. Its founder. William Penn, is probably one of the most misunderstood and neglected of early Americans. His is a fascinating story! From a prominent English family, with a father who adored him, Penn somehow managed by the age of 26 to have been expelled from Oxford and to have been imprisoned three times!! All of this came about because he had embraced the Quaker faith at a time when to be a Quaker meant scorn and ridicule. At his father's death, it developed that King Charles II owed his father a large sum of money. William

persuaded the King to repay that debt with wilderness land in America, for he had become convinced that the Quakers could have peace and freedom only in America. So it was that the land we now know as Pennsylvania was given to young William Penn. HE HAD A DREAM! Listen carefully to the words of his biographer, Catherine Owens Peare:

"There was to be human dignity in Pennsylvania for everyone, freedom of conscience; and freedom of expression; every man's sovereignty over his own estate was to be respected; and the whole people was to participate in the making and enforcing of laws and in the judgment and infringements against them. This, indeed, was the seed of a great nation."

Arriving in America in 1682, Penn drew up a Frame of Government for his colony. So fair and wise it was that its influence is seen in many other charters and in the Constitution of the United States. We owe a great debt of gratitude to this remarkable man whose dream of freedom was such a vital part of the early history of our nation, and of

this city.

Is it true that today we Americans tend to take our freedom for granted? It has been my observation that the naturalized citizens I have known — some from Germany, from Russia, from China, and from Japan — each of them has demonstrated a love for and appreciation of America far beyond that of the average American citizen. They have experienced the difference between life under dominant controls and life in a free nation.

A young Army officer said this to me

recently: "I have been to more than twenty countries, a few of which made me respect what this country represents. I have watched eyes that have never seen what freedom is . . . Their eyes appear almost lifeless."

I know another young man who is the same age as that Army officer. He is an American, but his eyes are lifeless. When he was 16, he was as fine a young man as I have ever known. An athlete, a good student, a fun-loving all-American boy. No one seems to know just how it happened, but by the time he was 18 he was a hopeless victim of drugs. The suffering he and his parents have endured would break your heart - in and out of jail, mental institutions. hospitals, treatment centers, hope that came with a job, despair when he lost the job and had to try again. Once he was free. Today he is a slave. He was not big enough for freedom.

Robert Muller, Under-Secretary General of the United Nations, has written a charming little book called "Most of All, They Taught Me Happiness". It is a

collection of vignettes about people he has known in his search for personal peace as well as world peace. A General once gave him this advice: "Prepare yourself well for now, and plan the fulfillment of one sole objective: ultimate happiness and contentment with the way you have lived your life."

In Time magazine's recent story on the Baby Boomers — that bulging generation born at the end of WW II, this comment seems pertinent: "The Baby Boomers are a generation that has avoided or postponed commitment to others. They get married later and have children later. They also divorce more than their parents. Quite a few, it seems, are destined for an awfully lonely old age."

When we're 18, or 25, or 50, are we thinking of what we want life to be at age 75 — or 95? Muller's friend, General Koenig suggests we need a plan — a strategy — so that our later years can be as challenging and interesting as were our early years. On the other hand, there are those who advocate "Live in the NOW — tomorrow will take care of itself." I say, why not both? Live in the NOW — give it your best, but always with the thought that tomorrow, we reap what we sow today.

A very dear lady of my acquaintance lived to be 102 years old. Throughout her life she was admired and respected by all who knew her. Left a widow at age 35, she had three children to raise and almost no money. She gave herself totally to those children with never a thought for her own comfort and pleasure. With hard work and determination, she miraculously enabled all three of them to graduate from college. She taught them the value of work, respect for the truth, the joy of giving. She sowed the seeds of unselfish love. It was returned to her 100 fold.


Her sense of freedom came from the fact that she had accepted her responsibility, given it her best, and lived to enjoy the fruits of her labor. Probably most of us would agree that we experienced the greatest feeling of freedom in our lives when we went away to college.

One such freshman was receiving some kindly assistance from an upper classman who asked if she'd like to have a date that weekend. Of course she would. "Would you like to date a Southern boy or a Northern boy?" "What's the difference?" asked the freshman. "The Southern boys are sort of romantic and very polite. The Northern boys are more daring and exciting." After a moment of thought, the freshman said, "I'd like a Southern boy who lives as far North as possible."

Can you remember how it was for you

as a Freshman? Mom and Dad weren't there to check up on you day in and day out. Oh yes, there were classes to attend, studying to do, dorm rules or house rules to abide by — but on the whole you could do your own thing — be your own person — no one was checking up on you like parents do!!

Oh, what parents endure! Some I know received a letter from their



daughter: Dear Mom and Dad: I'm writing to you from Alaska. My boy friend and I both decided to drop out of school. We drove up here in my car. Bob was able to find a job so we'll be OK. I'm pregnant, but I feel fine. I'll keep in touch. Love, Jane. PS — None of that is true, but I did flunk Chemistry!

When you were starting out in college did any of you ever have thoughts like these?

Dad has put money in the bank for my expenses. I have a checking account of my own for the first time in my life. The sky is the limit!

Mom isn't here to tell me what to wear, how to behave, what to say, what not to say.

When Friday comes, I can skip dinner if I want to and go drinking with the gang.

If I want to sleep in some morning, it's no one's business but my own. I can still make by grades. Cutting a few classes doesn't matter.

No one is going to tell me who to go out with — I can date that dream boat Mom always thought was wild — what does she know?

OR — did you think like this when you went away to college? This is my chance to prove myself. I want to make the most of this four years — to prepare myself for a career and a life that will give me a feeling of accomplishment. I want to meet new people, experience the best that life has to offer.

TWO ENTIRELY DIFFERENT REAC-TIONS TO FREEDOM. How has it been for you? Socrates walked the streets of Athens accusing his contemporaries of spending their lives in the quest of goals they never critically examined. "The unexamined life," he said, "is not worth the living."

Let's examine our life in Kappa. It starts as a pledge. You were excited and proud — your thoughts might have gone something like this "the Kappas like me — they are one of the top groups on campus — their parties were great — they seemed to have so much fun — I'm lucky to be one of them."

Then there was the Pledge service when you saw ceremony for the first time — when you realized there was more to Kappa than parties.

At weekly pledge meetings, you learned that you had joined something much larger than this group of girls on your college campus.

You learned history, dates, names — though none of it really had much meaning then.

You were told that Kappa had standards — academic, behavior and financial standards that you were expected to live up to.

You made friendships.

You observed upperclassmen — some of them inspired you, because they lived up to those standards you were learning about — perhaps others didn't, and you wondered about that. But you were busy and the time passed quickly. YOU MADE YOUR GRADES!! And suddenly it was time for initiation. Again, as at the pledge service, you became aware that you were becoming part of something much greater than you had known.

You heard beautiful and inspiring words — you saw a vision of a sisterhood that had meaning, not just for college days, but for a lifetime. At that moment you had the freedom to choose — remembering that responsibility is a necessary corollary to freedom.

You could choose to be one of the supportive members who contributed to chapter activities in every way possible, hoping to be one of the leaders some day —

OR you could choose to emphasize the academic side of college life and bring honor to your sisters through your academic achievements and leadership on the campus —

OR you could choose to be a party girl and live it up —

OR you could be a detractor who brought dissension and conflict within the chapter. Each one of us had the freedom of choice as to what kind of a person, what kind of a Kappa we would be. Our chapters reflect the choices each individual Kappa makes. If your (continued on page 12)

(continued from page 11) chapter is on top scholastically, it means that the majority of your members have chosen to uphold Kappa's academic standards. If your chapter is a smooth running efficient organization, it means that many of your members have been willing to devote time and energy to upholding Kappa's standards of efficiency. If you are gracious hostesses, it means you are proud to welcome your friends to your house, your lodge or your room. If your parties are such that you are proud to invite anyone to attend, you are upholding Kappa's standards of social behavior. If your budget is adhered to and your bills are paid, it means you are upholding Kappa's standards of financial responsibility.

Now let's tackle that very sticky question of how we deal with those members who choose not to uphold the standards that we profess as Kappas. It seems to me that here again we have a very clear choice. If we are influenced by what appears to be the common popular philosophy today of "Let her do her own thing - it's none of my business" then we are well on the way to allowing a sister to flunk out of school or incur more debt than she can repay, or become a drug addict, an alcoholic or an unwed mother . . . Lest you think I exaggerate, please pay attention to what is happening in our country today.

On the other hand, if we are influenced by the philosophy that it is our responsibility to be supportive and encouraging to a sister, then we will search for ways to give our friends the courage to live a life that emphasizes truth, that embraces beauty and goodness.

It is not easy to say NO today.

Although the legal drinking age in most states is 21, there are dozens of ways to get around that if you want to drink.

Drugs are illegal, yet they are easy to obtain, and accepted as normal by too many people.

Permissive sex is the order of the day. Yet I cannot believe that our young women want to say yes to these things. Who is giving them the courage and the know-how to say NO?

That is where the alumnae come in. As we were examining our life in Kappa, we went only as far as the undergraduate. We all know that Kappa is for a lifetime. You alumnae sitting in this room this evening are the support group for our young college women. You have made your choice to remain a participating member of Kappa after college. YOU can make a difference. Living by the values that Kappa gives us is our responsibility just as surely as it is the responsibility of the newest initiate.

Ouoting Robert Muller again, I want to share his pattern for living with you: "decide to be happy render others happy love passionately your miraculous life do not listen to promises do not wait for a better world be grateful for every moment of life switch on and keep on the positive

buttons in yourself - those marked optimism, serenity, confidence, positive thinking, love

pray and thank God every day meditate

smile laugh whistle

sing dance

look with fascination at everything fill your lungs and heart with liberty be yourself fully and immensely act like a king unto death feel God in your body, mind, heart,

and soul and be convinced of eternal life and

resurrection" Isn't it wonderful that we are FREE to

live like that - if we choose to do so. It all depends on our attitude toward what happens to us. Robert Schuller's book, "Be Happy Attitudes" shows us the way.

Now let me be personal for a moment. Examining my own Kappa life, there is the realization that I have been richly blessed. It is my hope that as I mention the names of some who have influenced me, you will at least recognize the names, though that may be expecting too much! In one chapter recently, the mention of Clara Pierce brought blank uncomprehending response. (I gathered that pledge training had not been all that effective!) When you've lived as long as I have, one has a vast storehouse of rich memories.

It was my good fortune in 1940 to meet Louise Bennett Boyd, then the only living founder of our Fraternity. I wish I could paint a verbal picture of that charming little lady for you. Though she was almost blind, her eyes still sparkled with the same excitement they must have had when she said these words:

"Minnie Stewart, Jennie Boyd and I met for a "Pow-wow" and concluded we would have something new. The world was moving too slowly for us. We determined that nothing short of a Greek letter Fraternity would satisfy us. Our aim was to draw into the society the choicest spirits among the girls, not only for literary work, but for social development."

I often wonder what she would think of Kappa as it is today.

Two years after graduating from college I went to work in Kappa's Central Office — what we now know as Headquarters. Then it was a series of 4 rooms in a downtown office building in Columbus, I'll never forget the day May C. Whiting Westermann walked into the office. I remembered enough of my pledge training to know that she had written our History, that she had been our Grand President for 3 terms. What an impressive person she was! That day she had on a black dress and a black hat - the essence of dignity and intimidating to say the least. But when she smiled, she was radiant with warmth and friendliness that immediately put me at ease. When her Kappa history was finally published in 1932, she said this:

"The History has been on my mind for 26 years, on my conscience for five, in my hand and under my feet, literally, for more than a year."

To Mrs. Westermann, and to all of the other great ladies who have labored to publish our historical records, we owe

enormous gratitude.

No listing of great Kappa ladies would be complete without the name of our Grand President, Charlotte Barrell Ware. I met her at my first Convention in 1940. Of the volumes that have been written about her, I like the words of her 1930 biographer, Mary Kingsbury Simkhovitch. She said: "Charlotte had an aristocracy of the spirit which creates a healthy ambition in admiring followers. No one liked being commonplace when associated with her." We need more women like Charlotte today.

Two great Kappa ladies with whom it was my privilege to work very closely were Edith Reese Crabtree, our president from 1952-56 and Clara O. Pierce, our Executive Secretary for forty years, until she retired in 1969. Though very different from each other, each in her own way taught me to reach for the stars.

As I examine my life in Kappa, there are literally hundreds who have enriched it, many of whom are here tonight - women who have given tirelessly of themselves to help each other maintain the values that our rituals declare.

Our rituals say all the right things. We repeat the words. Do we live the meaning? Each and every one of us is FREE to live those words or not to live them. ARE WE BIG ENOUGH FOR FREEDOM?

The future of mankind, the future of America, and certainly the future of Kappa, is dependent in some measure on how you and I use our freedom. Let us pray that we will use it well, with wisdom and with love.

Good night, and goodbye until we meet again. God bless you.

Chapter Awards Kappa Kappa Gamma 1986

On Saturday evening, June 23, outstanding chapters were recognized at the Chapter Awards Dinner.

STANDARDS AWARD

(Rotating)

In 1934, Lyndall Finley Wortham, Beta Xi, presented a silver urn to the Fraternity which was used as the Standards Award. This has since been retired to Fraternity Headquarters. In its place, Mrs. Wortham gave a beautiful silver punch bowl, tray and cups to be awarded to the chapter with the best all-around performance and exemplification of Kappa standards.

This award is given in honor of Charlotte Barrell Ware, Phi, grand president from 1884–1888 while she still attended college. Mrs. Ware believed that "Kappa ideals, no matter by what name they are called, are the only ones on which to base a happy and useful life." Her desire for the Fraternity was that it represent the best of

everything.

EFFICIENCY AWARD HOUSED CHAPTER (Rotating)

In 1926 the custom of giving awards at each general convention began with the gift given by Georgia Hayden Lloyd-Jones in honor of May C. Westermann, Sigma, when she was grand president. Mrs. Westermann is the only Kappa elected to the presidency for three terms, 1902-04, 1922-24 and again in 1924-26. Her contributions to the Fraternity's progress were many but one of her greatest accomplishments was the completion of the HISTORY OF KAPPA KAPPA GAMMA, 1870-1930.

The traditional silver loving cup has been retired and has been replaced with a silver footed water pitcher. It is presented to the housed chapter with the most efficient chapter management, capable officers and reports, and all around chapter excellence in performance.

UNHOUSED CHAPTER (Rotating)

This award is a silver ice bucket and is presented to the unhoused chapter with the most efficient chapter management, capable officers and reports, and all around chapter excellence in performance.

ADVISORY BOARD AWARD (Rotating)

In 1966 the Mu Chapter Advisory Board gave fleur-de-lis bookends to be presented to the chapters whose advisers have given outstanding service throughout the biennium. The award had to be replaced in 1976 with owl bookends purchased by Mu in honor of Elizabeth Bogert Schofield, a beloved adviser to her own chapter, Fraternity president 1940-44, and recipient of Kappa Kappa Gamma's Loyalty Award in 1958.

Because advisers play an important role in the Fraternity, this special recognition is given to the board with the best overall performance, meetings, contact with officers in the chapter, organization, use of total programming, overall knowledge of each adviser, and individual effectiveness. Members of the board receive Recognition Key pins.

CHAPTER/ADVISORY BOARD RELATIONS AWARD

(Rotating)

In 1958 Beatrice S. Woodman, Phi, gave this award, a silver fluted Salem bowl, so representative of Boston which has been known since the Revolutionary days as the home of great silversmiths. Miss Woodman served as chairman of Kappa's French Relief Fund in 1948 following World War II. For this service she was presented the gold Medal of Honor by the French government and received Kappa Kappa Gamma's Loyalty Award in 1962.

A chapter and an Advisory Board working together harmoniously spells success and enjoyment for both. In giving this award, Miss Woodman had known the importance and joy in the relationship of being an adviser, confidante and friend to her chapter. Each member of the board receives a Recognition Key pin and the fluted Salem bowl is given to the chapter.

PUBLIC RELATIONS AWARD

(Rotating)

The Fraternity regards the chapter newsletter as an essential public relations tool to keep the alumnae interested in the activities and accomplishments of their chapter. This award was first presented in 1946 and is based on editorial content, alumnae news, creative and informative reporting and readability.

This award is a silver Revere bowl and is given to the chapter with the best publication and public relations program.

In 1966 the Detroit Alumnae Association gave a silver Revere bowl in memory of a well-known journalist, Helen C. Bower, Beta Delta. She was an editorial writer and theater critic for the Detroit Free Press from college days until her retirement. From 1930-46 she edited THE KEY for Kappa Kappa Gamma Gamma.

Knowledge is the goal of the cultured and educated woman. Kappa was founded in the era when chapter members devoted their time to the study of the classics and their meetings to competition in oratory, poetry, and composition. This award is given to the chapter with the best cultural program.

In 1960 the Erie Alumnae Association gave this award to the Fraternity in honor of Florence Burton Roth, Beta Delta. Mrs. Roth was grand president 1910-1912 and presided over the 1910 National Panhellenic Conference. She was Kappa historian from 1912-1925, chairman of the Boyd Hearthstone Board of Trustees, and received Kappa Kappa Gamma's Loyalty Award in 1960.

This award is a silver footed pitcher and presented to the chapter based on excellence in Fraternity relations with alumnae, effective use of the Ritual, Fraternity education program, chapter history, and respect for Fraternity property.

GRACIOUS LIVING AWARD HOUSED CHAPTER

(Rotating)

This award, a silver julep cup, was presented in 1954 by Helen C. Bower and Marion Ackley Chenoweth, both Beta Deltas and Elizabeth Kimbrough Park, Beta Chi, in honor of Clara O. Pierce, Beta Nu. Miss Pierce served the Fraternity as executive secretary from 1929-69 during which time her dynamic personality brought growth, progress and innovative ideas to the Fraternity and the sorority world-atlarge. Every facet of the Fraternity felt the impact of her wisdom, executive abilities and foresight. One of Miss Pierce's first jobs with Kappa was raising money for the Endowment Fund, to be invested in loans for chapter houses. She believed that a chapter house needed to be more than a well constructed and well equipped house if it were to be a real home. Those who reside there must acquire the art of living and working harmoniously together. This award is given to the chapter based on chapter graciousness, hospitality at home and on the campus.

GRACIOUS LIVING AWARD UNHOUSED CHAPTER (Rotating)

This award is a silver Yorktown serving tray presented to the unhoused chapter which best exemplifies chapter graciousness and hospitality at home and on the campus.

GREATEST SCHOLARSHIP IMPROVEMENT AWARD (Rotating)

This eight-sided silver bowl award is presented to the chapter showing the greatest scholarship improvement on a campus with nine or less Panhellenic groups.

GREATEST IMPROVEMENT AWARD

(Rotating)

In 1962 the New York Alumnae Association presented this award in honor of Evelyn Wight Allan, Beta Beta, to recognize the greatest all-around improvement by a chapter. Mrs. Allan was the Fraternity grand president from 1890-92 and in that capacity presided over the first Panhellenic meeting in 1891. Because she had the ability to challenge people to do things and to be things, it is appropriate that the Improvement Award be named after her.

The award is a silver chip and dip server and presented to the chapter with the greatest all-around improvement during the biennium.

HOUSE BOARD AWARD

(Rotating)

The Fraternity Council presented this award for the first time at the 1982 General Convention to recognize House Boards and their valuable contribution to the gracious living of our chapters. It is given in honor of Catherine Kelder Walz, Beta Delta, who served as chairman of housing from 1939-70. During that time some 53 houses were constructed or remodeled and Kappa pioneered in supervising the financing of chapter housing. If chapter facilities which vary from the apartment, lodge, dormitory wing, suite, or house across the land reflect dignity, livability and gracious charm, it is because of loyal and talented Kappas who make it so. Mrs. Walz, who has long served with devotion on her own House Board, is the perfect example of what we desire in a member in the all important housing area.

This award is a silver Revere bowl given to Mrs. Walz by the Fraternity in 1962, and is presented to the board which provides a harmonious relationship between the House Board and chapter, the house director and Advisory Board, Fraternity awareness, use of resources and financial stability.



Affectionately known as "Doc," she is a distinguished professor in her field of English literature at the University of Alabama. Her dedication to Kappa includes service as NPC delegate, national scholarship chairman and thirty years as chairman of graduate fellowships. Kappa Kappa Gamma honored her with the Loyalty Award in 1974.

In 1962, the Fraternity gave Doc a silver Revere bowl for her outstanding service. Doc has graciously given it back to the chapter which best exemplifies an all-around philanthropy program which develops awareness and commitment in its members and the group.

Mrs. Jones was vice president and association editor of The Tulsa Tribune for many years. She was a brilliant woman of great charm, a writer and eloquent speaker who made significant contributions to Kappa. She served the Fraternity as president from 1926-1930.

This award is presented to the chapter showing the greatest improvement on a campus with ten or more Panhellenic groups.

Mrs. Crabtree received Kappa Kappa Gamma's Loyalty Award in 1964. In recognition of her leadership, Miriam Locke, Gamma Pi, and Mary Turner Whitney, Beta Rho, and Katherine Burn Pierce, gave a silver footed salver in her honor in 1962.

The award is presented to the chapter providing the best leadership in Panhellenic, responsibility and adherence to high standards of fraternity life.

The award is a silver footed pitcher and presented to the chapter with the best programming overall in the six point positive personnel area.

SCHOLARSHIP AWARD

(Rotating)

The Fraternity has always stood for scholastic excellence and a purposeful interest in higher education for women. At the 1902 General Convention an alumnae recommendation was passed to create a committee to study the advisability of establishing a scholarship or endowing a chair at the Marine Laboratory at Wood's Hole, Massachusetts. Minnie Royse Walker, lota, was appointed to this committee and later became its chairman. The Founders' Memorial Fund for Students' Aid has grown from this small beginning. The Fraternity's first historical record was written by Mrs. Walker in 1903.

In 1935, Mabel McKinney Smith, Beta Sigma, selected an English tankard from Mrs. Walker's silver collection as an appropriate award to present to the Fraternity in her honor as the first Scholarship Award. This award is given to a chapter on a campus where there are ten or more groups competing

for the top position.

The first recognition paid the alumnae was at the 1940 Convention when the province vice presidents who served with her, presented a silver bowl (continued on page 22)

and silver three legged carved vase to the Fraternity in "affectionate appreciation" of Almira Johnson McNaboe, Eta, grand vice president in charge of alumnae 1936-1940.

Because the alumnae organizations had grown both in size and number, a third award was presented at the 1960 Convention. This, a silver tray, was a gift from the director of alumnae from 1956-1958, Claire Drew Walker, Beta Pi, and the province directors of alumnae.

At the 1964 Convention a fourth award was added in recognition of alumnae associations with over 200 members. This award is an original fleur-de-lis pin, executed by a Boston jeweler, under the supervision of Beatrice Woodman, Phi Chapter. It is a gift from the alumnae groups of Theta province and their immediate past province director of alumnae, Portia Pettinger Rissler, Mu.

An award is also presented to an outstanding alumnae club by the Fraternity.



In 1910, her great-grandmother, who was a Kappa, gave birth to a daughter, Alice Louise. When Alice was a week old, her mother died.

Shortly after her mother's death, Alice received a beautiful silver baby spoon with KKG engraved on the handle. With the spoon was a note: "This spoon is given to you in memory of our beloved Kappa sister. We hope that you will grow up to understand the sisterhood of KKG." Signed, The Kappa Club.

Last Christmas, Emily Cox received a shadow box frame holding the letter and the spoon. Emily, an EP Kappa from Texas A&M is serving as a Chapter Consultant for $Z\Lambda$ -Washington and Jefferson this year. "They helped me realize just how special Kappa is to me," Emily confided.

Emily is one of Kappa's 13 special ladies serving the Fraternity this year as either Traveling Consultants or Chapter

Consultants. She took time out in August to chat with Bonnie Griswold $\Delta\Gamma$, former Traveling Consultant and current Chapter Consultant to ZM-Virginia Tech. They shared their reasons for choosing this Kappa career

"I plan to stay in the Northeastern part of the country and work in Greek affairs." Maureen Kelly, ZB-Lafayette College

and how they think the experience will impact future employment and their ties with the Fraternity.

Emily Cox comes from a long line of Kappas. Her mother and grandmother are Kappas as was her great-grandmother. And it was from her mother that Emily first learned about Kappa

careers. "Mom was a Graduate Counselor [Chapter Consultant] from Epsilon-Illinois Wesleyan University who advised EA, Texas Christian University." She was prompted to consider a Kappa job when Fraternity President Marian Williams-Θ visited her chapter and again when talking to Traveling Consultant Maureen Kelly, ZB.

"A great opportunity to work with a chapter and to pursue a pharmacy degree," is what attracted Emily to her position, too, she told us. She believes that this special opportunity is also a wonderful resumé item for her future work in pharmacy and related areas.

Lisa Higham, Θ -Missouri, echoes Emily's thoughts that a Kappa job provides excellent references for the future. "I'm interested in a career as an investment or financial planner and the skills I'll be developing as a Traveling Consultant are bound to impress a

future employer." Lisa lists some of these strengths as decision-making, leadership and public relations skills. She believes these things will be important in the handling of her position this year. To Lisa, working for Kappa in this way helps bring the central organization closer to its members. As she works this year, her hope is to help unify the chapters she visits and to help them see beyond the confines of their own chapter boundaries. Lisa also hopes to "give something back" since she has so enjoyed her years in the Fraternity.

Susan McLendon-I-DePauw explained, "I was so interested in Kappa and wanted to give something back to the Fraternity, that a position as a Chapter Consultant with a chance to attend graduate school in zoology

seemed ideal."

Susan first heard about "Kappa Careers" through her pledge program and saw a Chapter Consultant in action first hand when Sarah Hanlon, Ψ^Δ-Cornell was her chapter's adviser. Witnessing Sarah's devotion to the


Fraternity and the skills she developed through this job made Susan's later

choice a simple one.

Susan feels that a medical school admissions committee is bound to recognize the merits of the Chapter Consultant position and realize the responsibility she is able to handle. She views her position as a chance to "bring something directly from Kappa to the chapter — to give ΔΩ-California State University at Fresno a sense of the Fraternity beyond the chapter walls and even beyond their province."

Colleen, Blough, AO-lowa State, believes that the incredible spirit of voluntarism and the friendship developed throughout a lifetime are the reasons that Kappa has thrived so beautifully over the years. It was at the 1984 Jonvention in Camelback, Arizona, that Colleen first studied the role of Traveling Consultant and considered it as a post-college job.

Colleen sees her own strengths of enthusiasm, zeal for Kappa and her flexibility as those that will help her in the job. And she recognizes that a future employer - perhaps in the student affairs area - will appreciate the experience she has gained while working with Kappa. Colleen decided to

apply for the Traveling Consultant position because she is interested in people and because she, too, would like to give back to Kappa some of what she has gained.

Linda Schink, TH, was already in an internship program at Washington State when the idea of a Kappa Career

"I took the summer off after Convention and got ready to look for a job in a large city, hopefully in real estate or sales." Krista Harmes, TA-Kansas State

came up. While she intends to return to hotel management/operations when she finishes her Traveling Consultant obligations, she says that her manager at the hotel encouraged her to take this job. Linda cites the handling of

responsibilities as one of the key selling points for the Kappa position. Her other reasons are the strong friendships that support you and the strong organization Kappa supplies to support its members. She had been "eyeing the position" she confesses, since she first got to know the travelers who visited her chapter. "It seemed like the perfect opportunity for me," Linda confessed.

Sheri Purvis, AII, couldn't have been more surprised and pleased than when Kappa followed her to Yale University with the colonization of ZE. Sheri, who did her undergraduate work at the University of Tulsa, said, "I think Kappa has lots to offer the women at lvy League schools. I was thrilled when I heard we were colonizing here." Sheri is pursuing a law degree and thinks that the skills she acquires from her Kappa work will definitely enhance her law practice in the years to come.

Sheri's favorite reasons for pledging Kappa were that she sees the Fraternity as a progressive woman's organization that doesn't try to mold its members but instead encourages diversity. She feels that future employers in her profession will recognize Kappa's interest in helping its members build character and intellect while offering development outlets (like her own Kappa job) that other organizations might not offer.

Mary Clarke, ΔZ -Colorado College, joined Kappa because she liked the close organization it offered and the satisfaction that was fostered by this successful group. Her acquaintance with Traveling Consultants who visited her chapter helped her realize the need to expand Fraternity awareness beyond a chapter's confines. With no immediate plans for post-graduation days, Mary decided to select a Kappa job as a possible "first job."

Mary views "everything about this job" as a positive entry for her resumé. And she hopes that she can answer some "real life" questions on her Kappa travels and help to bring the total Kappa organization to those she visits. She wants our chapter members to know that each of us shares the same goals and high standards — that Kappas everywhere have similar concerns and

challenges.

Connie DelVecchio, ZK-Bowling Green, is a Chapter Consultant to $B\Omega$ -University of Oregon this year. This Kappa job was ideal for someone like Connie who wanted to attend graduate school but also continue her Kappa work. Her career plans include teaching and counseling and she believes the Consultant job to be an ideal entry for this field. She cites her strengths as being people-oriented and well-organized. These may be two very key strengths for Connie as she pursues this Kappa position.

"I got married on August 4 and moved to Oxford, England for a year. I'll be back to the States next year and living in Boston." Mary Sterner, \(\text{\theta} \)-Missouri

Carol Bender, ΔA-Penn State pledge and ΓP-Allegheny affiliate, headed to Psi^Δ chapter at Cornell this fall. She plans on a career in marketing and considers this chance to work with Kappa and some very special members as an ideal marketing experience. Some of her favorite reasons for pledging Kappa are its strong organiza-

tional structure, the tender balance of give-and-take, and the solid Fraternity heritage. She wants to show her chapter and others that we are all sisters and that what each of us does as a chapter definitely impacts the Fraternity as a whole. To Carol, being a unifier is an important part of the Chapter Consultant's role.

Jennifer Robinson, $\Gamma\Delta$ -Purdue, headed to $\Gamma\Omega$ -Denison University this fall. She pursues a graduate degree in nursing and brings a unique dimension to this position of Chapter Consultant for she has worked for two years since graduation as a nurse in a children's hospital.

The idea of working with a chapter

first struck Jenny while in undergraduate school. Before she left at graduation, she took information with her on rehabilitation scholarships — for she knew she'd go back to school — and Chapter Consultant information, too. When she felt she'd worked long enough without an advanced degree, Jenny applied for her position and is now happily working with the chapter. Jenny is quite certain that her work with $\Gamma\Omega$ will impress a future employer for she will be sharpening her people skills, a "must" in her estimation for the medical field.

Susan Ruckman, EM-Clemson, enjoys her work at ZN-the University of California-San Diego, because she is stimulated by work with the members and she is getting one step closer to her career in Public Relations. Susan believes she's a creative person who enjoys events planning which is where she can help at this new chapter. She cites the high-calibre of Kappa's members and the strong friendships developed through the group as reasons that made her want to continue Kappa involvement after graduation. By working as a chapter consultant, Susan also hopes to keep communication flowing from ZN to other chapters and back. "I realize that any group may feel far from the center of Kappa's organization, but I'd like to show them how close we really can be," Susan said.

Lisa Temple, I'Z-UCLA, is touring our United States and Canada this year as a Traveling Consultant. Lisa, who realizes that Kappa sustains its chapters by this contact from travelers and through

strong communication, hopes to bring the positive image of Kappa to the chapters while visiting. She realizes that visits from "Fraternity representatives" may be misunderstood, perhaps intimidating. She wants to show the chapters that she's just a part of their total organization.

"Prior to accepting the job as Traveling Consultant," said Lisa, "I interviewed with a bank." The interview helped her see that by working for Kappa, she could provide assistance to the chapters while indulging in travel, which she so loves. And, she'd have a chance to polish her communication skills which will help her when pursuing a position in Public Relations. Lisa's outgoing nature and flexible outlook will certainly be welcomed by those who hostess her visits.

Bonnie Griswold, $\Delta\Gamma$ -Michigan State, is working with Zeta Mu chapter at Virginia Tech this year. Bonnie, who traveled for Kappa during 1984-1985, worked for Proctor and Gamble in advertising for a year before returning to Kappa work. It was through traveling and the year following in corporate work, that Bonnie realized her interest in returning to school for a degree in higher education.

"I didn't think I'd attained my highest potential," she said recently. By returning for her graduate degree, Bonnie thinks she may have found her

niche.


As an assistant in the bond section of an Indianapolis law firm during the summer of 1985, Tracy helped to piece together loans to enable corporations to bring new business to Indiana.

Lucy Davidson (Dyer), EE — Emory, is the project director of a two-year study on teenage suicides for the Centers for Disease Control in Atlanta, GA. A medical epidemiologist with the CDC and a clinical assistant professor in psychiatry at Emory, Lucy is part of a Task Force on Youth Suicide of the Department of Health and Human Services. She is doing primary research in adolescent

suicides, with emphasis on "cluster" suicides or the "contagion" factor.

A number of reports have come through the news media regarding cluster suicides in recent months . . . 3 in a five-day period in Omaha, NE; 6 in seven months in Plano, TX; 9 in seven weeks in Wyoming . . . and so on . more than we would like to list. However, this is not a new phenomenon. Suicide contagion has been reported since ancient times, but recent publicity has focused attention and initiated study of the possible causes and contributing factors in young people. Among the aims of the projects and studies now in progress are: complete reporting and accurate classification of suicides, development of computer programming to detect suicide clusters, characterizing those teens at highest risk, and documenting details of behavior and events leading to cluster suicides.

A recipient of a Kappa Graduate Fellowship, Lucy has earned degrees in English, elementary education and medicine. Her background in teaching includes work in the social sciences and in language arts. Married, and the mother of a young son, Lucy's research into cluster suicides among young people will help to provide lifesaving insights into a serious threat to today's teens.

Ann Lee Howell Clark, M — Butler, internationally recognized as a world class septugenarian runner, was featured in the January 1986 issue of *The Ladies Home Journal* as one of four women who "had the courage to make their dreams come true."

Actually, Anne would be the first to admit that her new career resulted from a desire to see if exercise might help her ailing joints. She had retired at age 64 after 25 years as a second grade teacher. Enrolling in an exercise class at the YMCA, within five years she was jogging three miles daily, with no more arthritis or bursitis symptoms.

In 1979 Anne entered her first race, Chicago's Bonne Bell 10K (6.2 miles) for women only. She finished in 69 minutes . . . the oldest entrant in the race . . . wondering during the last couple of miles if she'd ever reach the finish line.

Now running about forty races a year, Anne has more than ten National Age Group Records, has been pictured on the cover of The Illinois Runner and Running Times Magazine, and was featured in the Chicago Sun Times as one of the "top ten exercise instructors" in the metropolitan area. She was named "Outstanding Woman of DuPage County in the Field of Athletics" by the West Suburban YWCA and has won the Chicago Area Running Association's Invitational Age Handicap Run-Off for the third consecutive year.

As if that wasn't enough, in 1985 Anne won the 70+ category for women in America's Marathon-Chicago in a national record time of 4:49:08 for women 75-79...10 minutes faster than her time in any of the four other marathons she has run.

Anne teaches five fitness classes weekly at the Glen Ellyn YMCA and two a week at the Beacon Hill Retirement Center. Radio

interviews, television appearances on national networks and some cable shows have left barely enough time for her to remain active with Kappa alumnae, P.E.O., church and book clubs.

One of her greatest boosters, and partner in 54 years of marriage, is "Ham", Hamilton Clarke, a Sigma Nu from Butler. He not only drives her to races, TV and radio interviews and speaking engagements, but with sewing as a hobby, he also makes many of her street clothes, running outfits, leotards and swim suits.

To make her dream come true, Anne hopes that through the publicity her post-retirement accomplishments have received, many more men and women of all ages will adopt a sensible, active and above all, regular exercise and diet program.

Sally Saunders Toles, BE — Texas, and husband J. Penrod were named Citizens of the Year by the Roswell (NM) Board of Realtors. Honoring their thirty years of contributions to the civic life of Roswell, it is the first time that the award has been given to a couple as joint honorees.

A leader in educational, cultural, health care and civic causes, one of Sally's prime interests has been the City Beautification Project. She is a member of the Chamber of Commerce board of directors and chairs their Beautification Committee, as well as serving on the board of directors of the Roswell Museum and Art Center and as a volunteer for the Chaven County Historical Society.



Miley Busiek

Miley Tucker Busiek, BE — Texas, captured the imagination of government officials with her "Family of Eagles" design. It will be used on \$50 gold bullion coins minted and introduced by the Treasury Department in the fall.

A sculptress who usually designs in traditional, classic sculpture to be cast in bronze and stainless steel, Miley's attention was caught by a small notice announcing the development of a new coinage. It is required by law that the obverse side of the coin be a representation of Liberty, while the reverse side be an eagle in some form. Miley feels that her Family of Eagles helps to represent the United States as a peace-loving, caring



nation . . . a more symbolic representation than the single bald eagle usually pictured.

It took more than four years for the original design to be approved and actually used in minting the coin. Since Miley was not employed by the U.S. Mint, the design had to be included as part of a law and passed by Congress! A bipartisan grass-roots marketing survey brought unqualified enthusiasm for the design. Everyone felt that the concept was a symbolic tribute to the American family and represented the values for which America stands.

Having made her way through the winding paths and byways of governmental processes, Miley hopes that a system may be set up for private artists to have an opportunity to have their work reviewed.

Married to a commercial real estate broker and the mother of two boys, Miley's family is her first priority. However, she greatly enjoys being able to sculpture her favorite subjects . . . realistic portrayals of wild life. Anne Kendall Clark, M — Butler, is the first woman to serve on the board of directors of First Citizens Bank, Greencastle, IN. For several years she has operated Anne's Fashion Corner, a boutique in the downtown area, where she plays a large role in revitalization plans. She has also served as vice president of the Chamber of Commerce.

In between duties as wife, mother, successful businesswoman and participant

in community affairs, Anne maintains Kappa ties as alumnae membership reference chairman and as an adviser and house board member for Iota Chapter, DePauw.



Province Officers To Be Elected at the 1987 Province Meetings

Convention Delegates Vote To Retain Election Procedure for Province Officers

This spring the chapter and alumnae delegates to the province meetings will again elect the Province Directors of Chapters and the Province Directors of Alumnae. The delegates to the 1986 Convention rejected an amendment to the Bylaws which would have changed the method of selecting Province officers by providing for Council appointment rather than election by the delegates to province Meetings.

The amendment had been proposed by the Long Range Planning Committee, in part because of the difficulty in finding qualified Kappas who are interested in serving as Province Officers. While recognizing this problem, the delegates at Convention believed that it was important to retain the election procedure so that the membership would have a direct voice in the selection of their Province Officers.

In order to make the election process work successfully, the Province Nominating Committees need your input. The slate which they present to the delegates at the Province Meetings is based on recommendations submitted by you — individual Kappas, chapters, advisory boards, alumnae groups, house boards.

The Province Officers are Kappa's middle management team, working under the direction of the Director of Chapters and the Director of Alumnae, to provide programming, resources, policy interpretations and assistance to Kappa's undergraduates and alumnae.

Your recommendations are essential to ensure that there will be qualified candidates for these important positions in each Province.

If you know someone whom you think would make a good Province Officer, fill out the recommendation form included below (as completely as you can) and send it to the Province Nominating Chairman. The Province Nominating Chairman will then contact the individual recommended and send her a biographical data sheet to complete.

REMEMBER — this is your opportunity to participate directly in the selection of your Province Officers and to assist the Province Nominating Committee in identifying the best qualified individuals.

1986-1987 CALL FOR RECOMMENDATIONS: At the 1987 Province Meetings, the Province Directors of Alumnae and the Province Directors of Chapters will be elected. Every initiated member, active or alumna, has the privilege to recommend those you feel are best qualified to serve the Fraternity in these important positions, or in other Fraternity positions.



They are for the chapter showing the greatest improvement during the Province Meeting biennium and for the most outstanding House Board accomplishments.

The Clifford and Agnes Guthrie Favrot Family Trust has given for many years a \$500 scholarship to the Fraternity and Aunt Aggie was known to award other scholarships privately, to deserving BO members. Each year, a senior from the chapter was honored for outstanding accomplishments with the Agnes Guthrie Favrot Award.

Whether you had the opportunity to visit Aunt Aggie's home for a post-rush meal or for the annual Alumnae Christmas Coffee — or whether you know her through her work with our Fraternity for a good many years, you can't help but be proud of this special woman. We are proud to have called her our sister.



The Quest for Kappa History

Kappas are notoriously sentimental. We save Convention programs, will our badges to cousins and to the daughters of dear friends, squirrel away issues of *The Key*, and store in our hearts fond memories of people and places. When our Founders selected a key as the badge, they viewed it as a symbol of sisterhood, a sharing of high ideals. And, indeed, wearing the key remains today our visible sign of all that is noble in life and thought and character.

Yet, ours is a secret society, based on a beautiful ritual, which is experienced only by initiated members. Because each of us receives our badge in an inspirational service, we tend to see that little golden key as the means for locking up all things Kappa. What are we locking up?

In a Kappa attic, basement, garage are Kappa treasures. In drawers, boxes, trunks, carefully packed away, are precious relics of our past, meticulously kept and often moved from place to place or passed from member to member. Throughout the world are thousands of irreplaceable Kappa documents, records, pictures, badges, and all kinds of momentos —all the things we lovingly describe as Kappa memorabilia. Our chapter archives are valuable as strong boxes for safeguarding Kappa's past.

Just what is a Kappa treasure? It is any scrap of paper and any object which capture — no matter how briefly — a piece of Fraternity history. Kappa history is the record of each member, each chapter, each alumnae group, all

links in the unbroken chain of sisterhood. We forge the excellence of today and tomorrow on the keystones of yesterday. But where are these visible traces of our glorious past? While we have on display at Headquarters Delta's Red Book, there are other invaluable but so far unidentified fragments of our history in Kappa homes and chapter closets. We so insist on locking away our memorabilia that we are beginning to forget what we have so industriously put away and why we are so dedicated to storing these various odds and ends.


Chapter Registrars, Marshals, and Catalog Advisers are especially encouraged to explore the chapter storage areas. Let the Historian help you identify your historical assets and then work with you on how to share these treasures with each other and with the Fraternity. Who knows? One Kappa may discover the original charter, while another may find one of the first handcut keys — after all, we have not yet located the charter written by Alpha Chapter and, the first badge order placed was for 12 keys, yet only six

Kappas wore the badge into the Monmouth College chapter on October 13, 1870. Where are the other six keys? The documents of closed chapters were frequently passed to newer ones, big sister chapter minutes tell the story of extension, and both alumnae and chapter presidents wear exquisitely jeweled badges designed to commemorate a special event or honor a beloved member.

At our 56th Biennial Convention in Philadelphia this summer, several alumnae and actives brought Kappa items to be identified, such as an old badge, an autograph book bearing the signatures of Louise Stevenson Miller—A and Tade Hartsuff Kuhns—M, a sigma-within-the-delta stick pin worn by a great aunt.

In conversation many fond memories were recalled and shared: the powdering of hair for the final gala evening of Convention, meeting one of the Founders, establishing a Central Office, cleaning up from the fire at Headquarters.

As a new biennium gets underway, let us embark together on a quest for Kappa history. Each member is part of the glowing candle of Fraternity heritage — the wick, the wax, the keepers of the Kappa flame. Let each of us share in passing that historical light and in taking steps to make sure that it continues to shine, a beacon of our sisterhood from past to present to future.

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

Shaping Tomorrow's Leaders

Kelly Sorensen, ΓΞ-UCLA, is a leader with promise. This was proven by her successful completion of the pilot program of The LeaderShape Institute, an intensive six-day educational experience sponsored by the Alpha Tau Omega Foundation. Alpha Tau Omega is a men's National Fraternity dedicated to the development of our nation's leaders. The LeaderShape Institute is ATO's creative response to society's demand for change and is ATO's fulfillment of its promise to young people and their personal development. The purpose of the Institute is to significantly improve a young person's knowledge of, and ability to demonstrate, basic leadership skills in daily life.

The program, designed by prominent education and leadership consultants was structured around a non-traditional process which deals with self-awareness and self-assessment, interpersonal communication, group dynamics and decision-making, ethics and power, social awareness, and responsible service.

This summer program — two week-long sessions — was the first of many to be offered by the ATO LeaderShape Intitute. The pilot

programs were held at the University of Illinois Conference Center near Champaign, III., and attended by 98 young students from colleges and universities nationwide.

LeaderShape Institute attendees included men selected from ATO chapter nominations and one woman from each of 26 National Sororities. All attendees have demonstrated campus and/or community leadership, a desire to

reach higher levels of personal achievement, and a willingness to help others do the same.

Participants enhanced their leadership skills through cluster group activities, awareness and interpersonal skill modules, and case presentations. In addition, a guest panel of leaders in a variety of professions shared their leadership experiences and counsel with the young people.

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
