Fraternity and Panhellenic-

Inter-sorority relations—Panhellenism—was fostered by national women's fraternities, culminating in National Panhellenic Conference and later in the College Panhellenic and City Panhellenics. Today the role of the panhellenic organization in fraternity affairs is being confused. A familiar question, yet applicable, is "Which came first, the chicken or the egg?" It appears we need to answer the question "Which came first?" if we are to dispel confusion.

It was noted that women's fraternities were responsible for the formation of a "Panhellenic" at the national level. The already established chapters of those fraternities made possible the College Panhellenic; alumnæ intersorority groups followed the same sequences of development. Kept in proper order it is not

difficult to comprehend the role of panhellenic organizations.

Fraternity members recognized the benefits to be derived from an exchange of ideas, sharing of programs, and in mutual service—"Panhellenic" was born. Its primary purpose is the promotion of friendship among fraternity women and the development of programs to achieve that purpose and obtain the benefits. This is the role of "Panhellenic". The role of the fraternity in the scheme of things is to promote ways to achieve common goals which, in each group, aim for high standards in all areas. Understanding purpose and goals we need, too, to understand the place of authority.

Each fraternity is autonomous. Kappa Kappa Gamma does not presume to interfere in the affairs of another and we know they respect our right to auton-

omy. Authority is vested in the individual fraternity group.

Women's fraternities are responsible for the panhellenic organizations they created. Kappas are urged to support continuing efforts to fulfill the traditional purpose of "Panhellenic". At the same time we assume the responsibility to insure the proper role of "Panhellenic" in fraternity affairs.

Welcome to French Lick



Convention Chairman

The long awaited Centennial year is just around the corner. The 1970 General Convention will be celebrating the outstanding contribution Kappa has made in 100 years of education for women.

Plan to join other Kappas in the heartland of the USA at the French Lick-Sheraton Hotel, French Lick, Indiana, June 24-July 1, 1970. This location is convenient for delegates to reach from all corners of the country as well as being near where Kappa was founded October 13, 1870 in Monmouth, Illinois.

The hotel itself has a long history of catering to the pleasures of mid-westerners and convention-going people throughout the country. Nestled in the picturesque Cumberland foothills of southern Indiana, the French Lick-Sheraton today is one of the leading resort-convention hotels in the country, developing its fame in more than a century of existence.

The mineral waters in the area were the drawing card when the first hotel was built in 1840. However, it wasn't until the early 1900's when the elite of politics and society suddenly "discovered" French Lick Springs.

The hotel and Pluto Water both came into their own national fame. The wealthy and near-wealthy came for three and four weeks at a time, many in their private railroad cars. Pluto, too, was known by all and even today the spring flows with its same vigor. Still to be seen are the sawdust paths leading to the Pluto Spring House along with the ghost remains here and there of the "emergency" houses along the trails used by those guests who had their morning ritual of a drink of Pluto before returning to the hotel.

Almost equally as "notorious" as Pluto was the gambling that existed in the Valley from approximately 1904 to 1949. And at one time, there was a combination dice room and bowling alley right in the middle of the Japanese Gardens.

In 1955 French Lick Hotel became a member of the Sheraton chain and very recently has undergone a massive renovation and redecoration program. The rambling sixstory structure was built during four different periods, the first being the front section, with an Annex added in 1905-06; in 1911-12 the main building was constructed; in 1914 the A section; and in 1924-25 the North or Convention wing. Guest rooms are large, hand-somely furnished and comfortable. Many have a sitting room adjoining the bedroom.

A new dining area was completed in 1968 which is attractively appointed and which will give an enjoyable setting for evening functions as well as special luncheons. There are shops off of the lobby which will attract many.

One of the wings of the hotel contains very adequate convention facilities. In addition to the main convention hall, which is bright, cheery and seats 1,000, there are other smaller areas for meetings and gatherings of delegates, and display areas.

Please note that convention is one day longer than usual. It is hoped that the scheduled recreation time will give all an opportunity to enjoy the facilities of this complete resort hotel. There are tennis courts, golf courses, several swimming pools, horse-back riding for the more strenuous types of recreation. However, guests may want to just stroll through the woods surrounding the hotel or the gardens where they can sample the French Lick Springs.

The story behind the naming of this town is most interesting. Nearly 200 years ago when a trading post was established, these early settlers discovered that the deer, bear and fox came to the springs to lick the waters and the wet rock. Pathways from every direction led to the springs, and one of the early white pioneers named it "The Lick." Early in the nineteenth century, the French constructed a fort for protection against the Indians, thus the name French Lick.

In addition to this natural environment for recreation and convention business, there will be considerable entertainment of our own. This is THE CONVENTION Kappas have been waiting for, so make plans early.

Provinces speak out at Conventions

Spring 1969 was the time for Kappa's 12 Provinces to meet across the nation from Vancouver, British Columbia to Atlanta, Georgia. The general theme which ran through each of the conventions was "The Price of Privilege".

Keynoting each convention was the presentation of the Centennial film, Keys to a Second Century, and a report on the progress of the Centennial fund prepared by chairman Anne Harter.

For the first time this year, conventions were structured on a more informal basis with emphasis on a "Speak Up and Speak Out" forum. A free exchange of ideas between actives and alumnæ produced valuable comments which are being gathered and studied by the newly formed Chapter Study Evaluation committee headed by Sally Moore Nitschke.

In reporting the highlights of one convention, an officer said, "With the less structured format of this convention, everyone seemed to agree it had been an experience filled with Kappa spirit, friendship, and sisterly concern. It seemed as if the convention promoted real understanding and mutual respect between the actives and alumnæ, and between actives, alumnæ and 'National'."

As well as productive workshops for actives and alumnæ, convention delegates had the opportunity to hear from Council members and committee chairmen as they spoke on "The Price of Privilege" as it pertains to Kappa in today's world. Excerpts from their speeches follow.

Message from the President

LOUISE LITTLE BARBECK

hile adverse pressures continue against the social groups on many campuses, the Fraternity has much to be proud of.

"Sororities have never denied that they are selective in membership. Members have been chosen for almost one hundred years on the basis of congeniality, background, scholarship endeavor, and a desire to become associated with others of common interest. . . .

"The Fraternity is aware of the demands on today's student and sympathetic toward the ideal of individual independence. We have no quarrel with those who feel that, for themselves, sororities serve no purpose. They are free to make decisions as they wish, in accordance with the desires of their chosen future plans. However they should honor the right of others to join, or not to join, any organization . . .

"The Fraternity system is currently criticized for sponsoring members through alumnæ channels and seeking an unanimous vote for election to membership. Little thought is given to the Constitutional rights of citizens to select their friends upon a common basis of interest and mutual endeavor. Sororities are not campus clubs where membership ceases with graduation. It is the lifetime continuation of interest by members that has been the strength of the organization. Without alumnæ support, Kappa Kappa Gamma would dwindle in stature, accomplishment, and stability . . .

"The fraternity officers and those who serve in official capacities are bound by oath to preserve and uphold the Constitution of Kappa Kappa Gamma. It is not within their power to change rules that have been voted by the entire membership in order to satisfy exceptions requested by a few. Local autonomy means fragmentation and lessening of unity within the structure . . .

"Relinquishing the use of alumnæ references, or sponsorship, will not solve the criticism of discrimination. It will simply deprive the active chapters of necessary information requisite to electing members . . .

"Youth is not eternal and the active member graduates into alumnæ life for continued enjoyment of her membership. Having enjoyed active chapter life, she is qualified to refer others she feels will have a happy Fraternity experience and contribute to the over-all growth of the Fraternity."





Centennial Stamp receives Congressional support

The proposal that Kappa Kappa Gamma and Kappa Alpha Theta be the joint sponsors in 1970 of a Commemorative Centennial Stamp on the theme "higher education for women" is receiving support from Members of Congress. Every consideration by the U.S. Post Office Department has been assured from James M. Henderson, special assistant to the Postmaster General, Winton

In April Mrs. Virginia Brizendine, Director of the Post Office Department's Philately Division, advised that the proposal was on the agenda for consideration by the Citizens' Stamp Advisory Committee. As this issue went to press the members of this Committee for the new Administration had not been announced. The members, chosen from citizens experienced in the arts, history, philately and business, decide on all the U.S.A. Commemorative Stamps. Although there are many annual requests, comparatively few Commemorative Stamps are authorized.

Senator Gale W. McGee, Wyoming, chairman of the Senate Post Office and Civil Service Committee wrote to President Louise Barbeck: "I am hopeful you will receive a favorable decision from the Committee."

Following a most instructive session on stamps in his own office for Ann Scott Morningstar, public relations chairman, and Carolyn (Mrs. Don) Carter, Kappa Alpha Theta, Representative Thaddeus J. Dulski, New York, chairman of the comparable House Committee, wrote assuring his cooperation.

Corbett, Pennsylvania; Glenn Cunningham, Nebraska; H. R. Gross, Iowa; Lee H. Hamilton, Indiana; James M. Hanley, New York; David N. Henderson, North Carolina; Donald E. Lukens, Ohio; Thomas J. Meskill, Connecticut; Arnold Olsen, Montana; Graham Purcell, Texas; Jerome R. Waldie, California; Richard C. White, Texas; Charles H. Wilson, California; and Morris K. Udall, Arizona-all members of the Congressional post office and civil service committees.

Additional interest was expressed by the late Minority Leader Everett M. Dirksen, and Charles Percy, the two U.S. Senators from Illinois, and by Representative Earle Cabell, Texas, President Barbeck's Congressman, Eighth District, Texas. Kappa Alapha Theta President Norma (Mrs. Albert N.) Jorgensen has also received a gratifying number of expressions of support for the joint Commemorative Stamp.


