#### OCTOBER

- 7—Treasurer places monthly finance report in mail to fraternity accountant and province president.
- 7—Alumna finance adviser places monthly report in mail to finance chairman's deputy.
- 10—Treasurer sends chapter's subscription (\$2.00) for Banta's Greek Exchange to central office, check made payable to the Fraternity.
- 13-Founders' Day, wear Kappa colors.
- 15—Pledge adviser places order for hand books and pledge cards with the central office.
- 25—KEY correspondent places chapter news letter for December KEY, and pictures of Mortar Board members elected during last school year in mail to editor's deputy. KEY stationery provided by the central office.
- 30—President shall appoint chairman of music and history sales.
- 30—Corresponding secretary sends name of chairman of music to national chairman of music, also name of chairman of history sales to national chairman of history sales and copies to the central office. Send copy of current rushing rules to the grand president, central office, and province president—name and address of Panhellenic delegate to grand president and central office.
- 30—Registrar sends two copies to the central office of the names and school addresses of all active members; and a report of rushing conflicts with other fraternities to the central office and province president. Send order for year's supplies of catalog cards, etc., to the central office.

#### NOVEMBER

- 1—Treasurer mails return postal to finance chairman stating that charge sheets have been mailed to all parents of active and pledge members and letters to the parents of all pledges.
- 2—Treasurer places monthly finance report in mail to fraternity accountant and province president.

- 15—Treasurer sends copy of corrected budget to fraternity accountant, finance chairman, executive secretary, and province president, and mails return card to finance chairman stating that budgets have been mailed.
- 30—Treasurer sends to central office per capita tax report and per capita tax for each member active at any time during the first half year, as well as per capita tax for associate members, also check for treasurer's bond with information requested on blank sent for this purpose.
- 30—Standards chairman sends copy of standards program to director of standards.

1—Scholarship chairman sends to central office, national scholarship chairman, and province presi-

- dent a report of the scholastic standing of her chapter for the previous year (1934-35) in comparison to the other groups on her campus on blanks provided by the central office.

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

Kappa chapters are making in college and women's fraternity song contests.

From the October letters we learned that first place had been won by Beta Tau in the annual sorority step-singing at Syracuse, by Lambda in the Greek women's song fest at Akron, by Beta Nu in a similar contest at Ohio State, by Mu in a Y.W.C.A. song fest at Butler in which Sigma Nu took first honors for the men, and by Gamma Delta in the all-university sing at Purdue for the second year in succession. Delta Eta at Utah has a silver loving cup awarded in a song fest last May.

At Cornell Psi placed second in the intersorority song contest, and at Minnesota Chi was second in a song fest sponsored by Panhellenic, with 17 entries. At Arizona Gamma Zeta placed third in the annual university song contest.

Significant in Beta Lambda's letter was the news that the chapter had entered the Shi-Ai sing at the University of Illinois "for the first time in many years and all got a thrill from the new arrangements of our chapter songs."

But as a resident in England perhaps I can convey to you some of the atmosphere of the occasion, or I should say occasions.

Officially the Jubilee started with Their Majesties' drive to the Thanksgiving service at St. Paul's cathedral. The enthusiasm created by the press,

ers of nearly every nationality mingled with the throng.

The London police organization is notable for its efficiency and good humor, and ability to keep crowds in order. The V.A.D. was busy with fainting women and lost children, but all the crowd kept happy and gay, like a huge family picnic gathered together to do honor to the head of the family.

If any of you heard His Majesty's broadcast the night of May 6, you will realize what I mean by the family tie. King George is a lovable, kindly man devoted to his Empire. The affection with which he greets his people in these broadcasts is a real emotion.

In the 25 years of their reign Their Majesties have proven themselves real people interested in the welfare of all classes in their huge Empire. Coming to the throne after Edward's 10 years of peace and plenty, young, inexperienced, not expecting ever to be King, he has taken the job on his shoulders in a real way.

The Great War coming early in his reign was a great force to bring this about. Not only was his Empire involved, but his own son, the Prince of Wales, was in the front line many times. From the end of the war until

the Jubilee one after the other of his sons have helped to create a personal contact with Their Majesties in various parts of the world.

In the light of our experience with events in England since the war, I like to think King George and Queen Mary have a wish to be real friends to their people.

Their Majesties' home life is simple and wholesome, a real example for millions everywhere. Queen Mary is first a woman and a mother and afterward a queen. To see her in person is to realize you are meeting an extraordinary woman. She radiates a queenly presence and is interested in all that is taking place around her.

A friend of mine in the consular service was presented at Court some time ago. She said as she came to her feet after her presentation curtsy, the Queen's eyes looked right into hers. She felt the personal interest of woman to woman. This element seems to be present in all the Royal Family. When a great ceremony takes place they seem to look into the hearts behind the outward display. In some inexplicable way the consciousness of this interest seems to have entered into the hearts of the people.

An amusing incident occurred outside Buckingham Palace, where a lady photographer was taking some close-up views of Their Majesties on the balcony. Near her stood some Cockney women discussing the scene.

One woman turned to the other and said, "One thing I will say about our Queen. Whatever she does, she's a lady."

Through a mutual acquaintance I heard not only this story but the sequel.


The photographer had the privilege of showing her pictures to the Queen to decide on which Her Majesty wished used. In the conversation the photographer told her the remark she overheard. The Queen was much amused and said, "Oh, I must tell that to the King." She went at once to his

library, where laughter was heard.

These intimate little stories circulate among the people and they feel the friendly interest the Royalty have for them.

The Jubilee week was full of occasions, but night after night thousands thronged the gates at the Palace, shouting, "We want the King," until night after night Their Majesties appeared, once, often twice, to wave to the cheering multitude.

During the months of May, June and July there were drives into every part of London, during which the children were given the front rows to cheer their King and Queen. One Saturday in June I noticed thousands of children in the parks and later read that 70,000 school children from all parts of London had been given seats

She is a united state devoted to her Royal Pair.

There will be tennis and riding and a picnic on the wide-winged veranda of the Sports club from which those of us too busy for golf may view part of the fine course or vision winter fun at the club as we observe the ski jump in the distance.

The traditional things of a Kappa

convention will be there and, in addition, there will be much that is new. The entire week will be an inspirational one.

In 1924 when the Kappas convened at Bigwin inn, Beta Psi chapter did the honors alone. ### Province Conventions

### Epsilon Province Met on Founders' Day

VITH AVID interest the Beta Lambda Kappas anticipated the arrival of their scattered sisters at the chapter house, Friday, October 11, 1935. Their expectations were more than realized when the throng of loval Kappas from eight chapters and 10 alumnæ associations united for the solemn opening ritual, with Mrs. L. T. Gregory, our beloved province president, of Urbana, Illinois, presiding. A great pleasure to us all was the presence of Mrs. James F. McNaboe, grand vice-president, and Mrs. Helen Rugg Condit, province vice-president, who, by helpful suggestions and friendly criticisms, showed us a firmer road to a loftier destination in the future.

The round table discussions proved most instructive, and the fine points gleaned from them were constructive to a great degree. The merit system was explained clearly for those chapters which had had difficulty in using it for their pledge training, and a program of cultural meetings was decided helpful to all freshmen. Better libraries were thought essential in all chapters to promote higher scholarship, an important Kappa ideal, and to aid in the promotion of which suggestions were made as to prizes for those who kept theirs consistently high in their respective chapters.

The standards decisions were that pledging legacies is not mandatory; that all Kappas should observe great temperance in the modern liquor problem; and that it should never be forgotten that transfers from one chapter to another are always to be treated as sisters.

The alumnæ discussions plead for more frequent meetings and more businesslike procedure, carried out primarily with a well-planned budget system. It was stressed that alumnæactive rushing relations be more congenial, and that all chapters respect the

recommendations of their distant and widespread sisterhood. After Upsilon and Gamma Sigma had both extended cordial invitations for the next convention to all those present, the report of our province president was given. This excellent report closed with a deep and sincere appeal to all Kappas throughout the nation to seek constantly cumulative knowledge, and everlasting and evergrowing culture.

Perhaps the one single and greatest thrill to Beta Lambda Kappas was the unanimous reelection of their two sponsors, Mrs. Gregory and Mrs. Condit, to the offices of province president and vice-president. Mrs. Gregory has been the chapter's excellent adviser and staunchest friend for several years, and though we unfortunately

lose her in the first capacity we always hope to keep her in the second, and we feel that in giving her up as our own we merely widen her chances of giving loving and wise counsel to other Kappas who will know her better and appreciate and love her more in the years to come. I NALETTER received recently by the Vocational Guidance bureau this statement was made: "I want to say that I feel Kappa is meeting a great need through the establishment of its Vocational Guidance division. Everywhere one meets with young men and women groping for information that will largely make or mar their lives. . . . Certainly guidance is one of the great needs of the present day."

Last year in one issue of THE KEY we mentioned that you can procure guidance leaflets from the Superintendent of Documents, Washington, D.C. The subjects covered are journalism, library work, law, medicine, home economics, forestry, pharmacy, commercial art and design, dentistry, nursing, music and veterinary medicine. The price is five cents each. You may also write for information to the American Association of Social Works, 130 East 22nd street, New York City: the National League of Nursing Education, 450 7th avenue, New York City; the regional Art council, 65 East 56th street, New York City; the American Occupational Therapy association, 175 55th avenue, New York City; the Decorators club, 745 5th avenue, New York City; the American Institute of Interior Decorators, 820 North Michigan avenue, Chicago; the American Library association, 520 North Michigan avenue, Chicago; and the National Recreation association, 315 4th avenue, New York City.

If you are going to look for a job after you are out of college the advantages will all be in your favor if you know what you want and have had definite training in a certain line. A college background is not the key to a job. Take stock of yourself right now and see what special abilities you have and start training them.

W. B. Pitkin is running an interesting series of articles in the *Rotarian* on "Careers for Youth." He says, "Regardless of the applicant or the job, employers today pay little or no attention to job mendicants." "Business men seek specific abilities for specific jobs."

He will cover the following subjects: What new opportunities are now opening or will soon be promising young men and women of superior intelligence? What old opportunities in well established fields of work are still promising for our Forgotten Americans? What fields that once offered fine careers are today obsolescent or else completely done for? What jobs are still active but with a surplus of workers that shows no signs of diminishing? What jobs have a marked shortage of workers in certain parts of the country but not in others? In what fields is there now a serious surplus of competent workers which will probably not exist some five years hence? In what parts of the country are young people likely to become best, most easily and most quickly established?

If you are choosing a vocation, it would be well to look into these questions.

### Memory of Kappa Is Honored by Jund

The Lucy Elliott Memorial Fellowship fund committee is pleased to announce the awarding of the fund's first fellowship. The recipient, Miss Barbara Clarke, of Northampton, Massachusetts, is doing grad-

uate work in English at the University of Michigan this year.

The fund, started in December, 1930, by friends of Lucy Elliott in an attempt to build an appropriate memorial to her, is not complete. It must be an endowment, sufficient in size so that its income may provide the money to be awarded annually. The present fellowship is the accumulation over several years of interest on the money already deposited with the treasurer of the University of Michigan. Hence, unless more money for the endowment can be collected or pledged during the current year, another awarding of a fellowship in the name of Lucy Elliott will be impossible for several years. It seems appropriate to write of this project, in which all

Kappas have a vital interest, during this month, the fifth anniversary of the untimely death of Lucy Elliott, B  $\Delta$ .


It is significant of the esteem in which Lucy Elliott was held by Michigan alumnæ that the board of directors of the University of Michigan Women of Detroit proposed immediately and unanimously to establish a fellowship which would bear her name.

It is also significant of the breadth of her interests and of her wide contact with people that the members of the fellowship fund committee represented a myriad of her activities -from her professional circles to the social and cultural groups with all of whom she had a real sympathy. At the mere announcement of the formation of the fellowship fund, there came messages of encouragement, and contributions, from people in various stages of acquaintanceship with Lucy Elliott. With the exception of a few pledges, such as the one for \$500 assumed by the Detroit association of Kappa Kappa Gamma alumnæ, it was by such informal means that the present sum came into existence.

It is noteworthy that the fund committee members agreed on insisting that the award of the fellowship should be upon as broad a basis as possible, feeling that in so insisting they would be best serving the spirit and ideals of Lucy Elliott's life. Consequently, the award may be made to any graduate student, man or woman, in any field of worthwhile study, and may be used at the University of Michigan or at any other college deemed suitable for the student's purposes. The selection of the person on whom the award is conferred is left to the regular committee at the University of Michigan which administers the other fellowships and scholarships. Most fitting it has seemed that the establishment of a fund which would provide means for the education of youth should be named for Lucy Elliott, whose life had been spent in joyful, untiring service to youth, in teaching in the high schools of Detroit, in doing administrative work in the Detroit schools, as well as in being director of Helen Newberry residence in Ann Arbor and acting dean of women at the University of Michigan.

To those Kappas who desire to help the work which does honor to the

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### B.C. Women Take Motto to Heart

In February, 1935, at the suggestion of the Kappa Alpha Theta alumnæ, a meeting was called of representatives of all sorority alumnæ associations to organize an Inter-Sorority Alumnæ club. This was done with Mrs. Reilly Bird, K A Θ, as president; Alice Morrow, K K Γ, sec-

retary; and Mrs. William Murphy,  $\Delta \Gamma$ , treasurer.

It was decided that the immediate objective of the club should be the founding of a scholarship or bursary at the university. With the eight sororities associated it was comparatively easy to promise an annual amount of \$150, whereas any one of the groups alone would have found the task too great.

It was felt by all concerned that academic standing alone should not be the deciding factor in awarding the scholarship, but that the need of the applicant should be taken into consideration. As this, in the case of the women students, is a matter most familiar to the dean of women, it was suggested that the committee of prizes and scholarships consult her before making the award. It was also suggested that it be open to any woman student in the university. This scholarship with the suggestions was accepted by the university and is known as the Inter-Sorority Alumnæ club scholarship. The first award was made at the fall congregation, October 23.

The first recipient is a woman in first year social service. She has already proved her ability to do work in her chosen field by experience, and is planning to train as a psychiatric social worker, completing her course at Smith.

We in the alumnæ association feel we have taken a real step forward in organizing with the other alumnæ for this purpose. It has turned our thoughts and ambitions back to the university and has made us again conscious of our responsibility as graduates to help others to enjoy the privileges that were ours. The need among the women students has been great during these last years and we have

wished that some of those blessed with this world's goods would see their way clear to giving some of the scholarships that are so urgently needed. Now instead of wasting time wishing we have taken our university motto "Tuum est" to heart. The slang translation of that is "It's Up To You."

Among the alumnæ associations, Washington, D.C. has jumped from 25 to 75%; Chicago Intercollegiate from 150 to 250%; Ames from 0 to 50%; Springfield from 100 to 200%; State College from 0 to 33%; Columbus from 20 to 67%; Winnipeg from 25 to 50%; Long Beach from 167 to 200%; Lafayette from 50 to 75%; North Shore from 33 to 55%: Baltimore from 40 to 60%; Boston Intercollegiate from 57 to 71%; Detroit from 31 to 43%: Pittsburgh from 14 to 21%; and Boston from 111 to 122%. The new Monmouth association already has four sales to its credit.

It is the committee's sincere hope that many of you will take advantage of the newly reduced price to get your long-cherished personal copies and archive copies without which no association's records are complete.



#### MARGUERITE ISABEL ROWE

January 29, 1890-September 9, 1935 Initiated into Chi Chapter of Kappa Kappa Gamma, October 13, 1909

Marjorie Rowe, one of the most beloved of Chi Kappas, died September 9, 1935, at the home of her brother, Dr. Harry Rowe, in Minneapolis, Minnesota, after an illness of several months.

At the end of three years of active service in Chi chapter, she went to the University of Chicago to receive her Ph.B., then to New York to take a secretarial course which she discontinued in order to be with a Chi sister who was fighting tuberculosis. With Mary Miles, she traveled from Florida to Colorado, sustaining her friend with a fine courage and a disregard for her own health and career

until that friend's death, an example of a friendship rare as it was beautiful.

After several years spent in preparation for social service, she specialized in recreational work and went to All Saints' school in Sioux Falls, South Dakota, as recreational director. From there she went to Ver-

mont, where, in the spirit of both adventure and service, she worked in rural communities. Across the continent to San Francisco was her next step, and while on the west coast, the opportunity came for study and service at Hull house in Chicago, and it was at that famous center where she spent three of the happiest and most profitable years of her varied and useful career. Sharing an apartment with Jane Addams, she enjoyed a priceless intimacy with the beloved philanthropist and drew from her an inspiration which rooted deep in her desire to share her life with those less fortunate than herself.

When the depression made it necessary to cut down the working personnel in all institutions, she undertook the recreational service at the Hospital for Epileptics at Dixon, Illinois. She bought a car and kept in touch with her associations at Hull house and other settlements in Chicago, bringing to her charges at Dixon a sane, yet warm apprecia-

tion of their peculiar needs.

She was called to Kansas City to organize the recreational work in a new community center, but before entering on her new duties, spent several months in Europe with a friend and associate from Chicago. Soon after her return she underwent an operation which relieved her only temporarily and resulted several months later in her death.

All who knew Marjorie felt in her a fineness of character, a deep understanding, a whimsical humor, and the kindly tolerance of her outlook on people and events. A rare reserve kept her always a distinct personality, one to trust, to turn to for constructive help. to count on as a friend in fair or stormy weather. Her loss will be felt in many places. To her intimate friends it is a deep and abiding joy to have known her, and to feel that she still lives in that spirit of service, which, through contact with personalities such as hers, moves on in ever widening circles to make a happier world.-Mercy Bowen-THOMPSON (Mrs. Luther S.), X.

October 8, 1859—August 11, 1935 Initiated into Chi chapter of Kappa Kappa Gamma, April 21, 1880

To most of those who were present at the banquet in April, 1930, at which Chi cele-

brated the fiftieth anniversary of its establishment, the outstanding features were the speeches by two of our charter members, Augusta Perkins-Gillette and Adelaide Wyman-Partridge.

On that anniversary, Mrs. Partridge told us, with so much of the charm and vivacity that were characteristic of her, about her girlhood days in the university from 1879 to 1881, and of the little group of eight girls who held the initiation of their first senior, Bessie Lawrence-McGregor, at the Wyman home within a month after the chapter's establishment. We were touched and amused to see how inextricably the early affairs of Kappa were mingled in her mind with the affairs of Chi Psi of which Mr. Partridge was an outstanding member.

From the time of their marriage in 1882 to their golden wedding which Mr. Partridge lived to celebrate, they were both associated with the furtherance of educational and civic interests. Mr. Partridge was for 15 years a

regent of the University of Minnesota. Mrs. Partridge was a worker for the suffrage movement. The ball-room of the spacious and beautiful house which they occupied for years was opened many times for lectures, meetings and philanthropic benefits. It was the scene, too, of brilliant social events, and of Chi Psi and Kappa parties. When in 1900 Julia Ward Howe, then a saintly old lady, was in Minneapolis, all the Kappas were invited to meet their distinguished honorary member in the Partridge drawing room.

Mrs. Partridge was the mother of four daughters, three of whom survive her. Chi chapter, active and alumnæ, would like to express to her daughters their affection for her, our chapter's first marshal, and their gratitude for her hospitality and generosity throughout the years.

- 7—Alumna finance adviser places monthly report in mail to finance chairman's deputy.
- 15-Chapter president appoints KEY correspondent.
- 15—Corresponding secretary sends names and addresses of officers and alumnæ advisers to central office on blanks provided for that purpose.
- 15—Treasurer sends names and addresses of finance committee to fraternity accountant, finance chairman, executive secretary, and province president.

#### APRIL

- 7—Treasurer places monthly finance report in mail to fraternity accountant and province president.
- 7—Alumna finance adviser places monthly report in mail to finance chairman's deputy.
- 15—Unhoused chapter treasurer places budget for 1936-7 in mail for fraternity accountant.
